How the name "doughboy" originated as applied to infantrymen is related by Col. John S. Bersey, adjutant-general, in pointing out that newspapers and persons commonly err in applying the word to artillerymen, cavalrymen and other soldiers. "Back in the days of the Indian wars," related the colonel, "trouble was so frequent that often all cavalrymen would be out from a post when another outbreak would come.
