## ORIGIN OF "DOUGHBOY"

History of Name Started in Derision But Now Used as Term of Endearment.

How the name "doughboy" originated as applied to infantrymen is related by Col. John S. Bersey, adjutant-general, in pointing out that newspapers and persons commonly err in applying the word to artillerymen, cavalrymen and other soldiers. "Back in the days of the Indian wars," related the colonel, "trouble was so frequent that often all cavalrymen would be out from a post when another outbreak would come. Then the infantrymen would be sent on foot. Walking in the soft mud at certain seasons of the year, their feet would make a noise like a baker kneading dough. The cavalrymen as a term of derision began calling them 'doughboys.' It is applied to infantrymen only."
