**HOG CHOLERA SPREADS**  
**Measures Being Taken to Stamp Out Disease in Washtenaw—Hogs Must Be Watched.**

During the past week several new cases of hog cholera have been diagnosed. Most of the cases were located east of Bridgewater Station, in Saline township, on the Manchester-Saline road. The disease has been diagnosed on the farms of Cloughs, Walkers, Buchlers, Herman Gross, Christ, Rentschler, Stierle Bros. and Herman Klump. Two miles north of this, in Lodi, an outbreak has occurred on the farm of Fred Wild. In the central part of the township the disease has been diagnosed on the farms of Arthur Lutz and Alvin Luckhardt. The disease has also appeared on the farm of Henry Bredernitz, southwest of Saline. All well hogs on the above farms have been vaccinated. Most of the farmers in the neighborhood of the diseased herds are vaccinated against an outbreak of the disease. **PUT POULTRY IN CANS**  
**Housewives Advised to Make Double Saving by Canning Non-Productive Fowl.**

Some Michigan housewives are making a double saving this fall by culling the non-producers from their flocks of poultry and then canning the discarded birds for a winter meat supply.

Home canning of poultry is entirely practical and is being practiced more and more by farm women of the state. By putting up their own chickens these women are assured a supply of meat which has been raised in the proper way and canned under sanitary conditions. They avoid the danger of getting hold of very old birds on the markets, or of birds that have been killed too long or kept under unsanitary conditions.

Canning of poultry is not radically different from the canning of fruits or vegetables, the same general principles being followed. Among the general rules, however, are these: Birds should be killed and dressed the same day of canning; they should be singed, washed, cut up and cooled as for table use; neck rubbers should always be used; covers should be fitted and tested; the time of sterilization is important and should not be shortened a minute and time is to be counted after water begins to boil around the cans. The length of sterilization varies from 1 1/2 to three hours, according to the method used. Detailed information on canning poultry may be had by writing to the Home Demonstration Agent, Extension Division, M. A. C., East Lansing.

**FARM BOY IS HOG JUDGE**  
**Ypsilanti Youth Will Enter Contest in Judging at Big Hog Show in Chicago on 6th.**

Ivan Galpin of Ypsilanti, winner of the high score for dairy judging among boys' club members at the State fair last month, will uphold the honors of Michigan in a big sectional judging contest at the National dairy show in Chicago, Oct. 6. Galpin, a member of the Dixboro pig club of Ypsilanti, won the honor of representing the state in competition with local winners from all over Michigan.

Six states, Minnesota, Wisconsin, Indiana, Illinois, Iowa and Michigan, will compete at the Chicago show. Prizes of \$100, \$85 and \$75, respectively, will be given the three highest, while the three lowest boys in the contest will win \$65 prizes—enough to pay their expenses, win or lose.

Galpin was trained in his judging work by E. F. Lyon county boys' club leader of this county.

**SMUT IN STATE'S CORN**  
**Central Part of State Shows High Per Cent of Crop Infected—Rotation Is Remedy.**

That corn smut is worse in Michigan this year than ever before, is the opinion of plant disease experts of the agricultural college who have found as high as 25 per cent of the plants in fields of the central part of the state infected with the smut.

This does not mean that a fourth of the crop is lost, however, for many plants that are infected produce one or more fully developed ears.




