During the past week several new ases of hog cholera have been diagnosed. Most of the cases were lo cated east of Bridgewater Station, in Saline township, on the Manchester-Saline road. The disease has been diagnosed on the farms of Cloughs, Walkers, Buchlers, Herman Großs, Christ. Rentschler, Stierle Bros. and Herman Klumpp. Two miles north of this, in Lodi, an outbreak has occurred on the farm of Fred Wild. In the central part of the township the disease has been diaagnosed on the farms of Arthur Lutz and Alvin Luckhardt. PUT POULTRY IN CANS

Saving by Canning Non-Productive Fowls.

Michigan housewives are making a double saving this fall by culling the non-producers from their flocks of poultry and then canning the discarded birds for a winter meat supply.

Home canning of Doultry is entire ly practical and is being practiced more and more by farm women of the state. By putting up their own chickens these women are assured a supply of meat which has been raised in the proper way and canned under sanitary conditions. They avoid the danger of getting hold of very old birds on the markets, or of birds that have been killed too long

or kept under unsanitary conditions Canning of poultry is not radically different from the canning of fruit omerent from the canning of truts or vegetables, the same general principles being followed. Among the general rules, however, are these: Birds should be killed and dressed the same day of canning; they should be singed, washed, cut up and cooled as for table use; neg rubbers should always be used; covers should be fitted and tested; the time of sterilization is important and should not be shortened a minute and time is to be couned afer water begins to boil around the cans. The length of sterilization varies from 1½ to three hours, according to the method used. SMUT IN STATE'S CORN

Central Part of State Shows High Per Cent of Crop Infected-Rotation Is Remedy

That corn smut is worse in Michigan this year than ever before, is the opinion of plant disease experts of the agricultural college who have of the agricultural college who have found as high as 25 per cent of the plants in fields of the central part of the state infected with the smut. This does not mean that a fourth of the crop is lost, however, for many plants that are infected produce one or more fully developed ears.

smut. Many farmers expect to treat corn in a manner similar to wheat treatment, but there is no such treatment for corn. Corn smut is not spread through the seed.

Control methods for corn smut include a rotation of crops in order to avoid planting corn on ground infected-the year before, and the cutting out of all smut early—before it matures enough to spread in the powdery form. Smut which is cut out should always be burned or burled. If it is left in or near the field it will mature and spread just as well as if it had not been cut off the plant.

Seed corn can be selected from

smutty fields with perfect safety. The fact that the smut is not spread throuh the seed makes this possible, and there is no reason why farmers selected from a field which is infected should hesitate to use good seed with smut. Seed corn can be selected from smutty fields with perfect safety.
