## FOR BETTER POTATOES

Michigan Growers Plan Improvement Campaign to Boost Average Production.

A campaign to raise the present low average yield of potatoes in Michigan has been launched by a committee of county agricultural agents who are located in the potato sections of the state. The Michigan Potato Growers' Exchange, United States Bureau of Markets, and the Extension Division of the M. A. C. will cooperate in the effort to secure high class seed potatoes for farmers of the state.

According to the plan outlined, each association of the Potato Growers' Exchange will grow a plot of five acres or more of seed, under the supervision of some competent man appointed by the board of directors of the association. This man will cooperate with the local county agent and the extension specialists from the agricultural college in handling the work.

When the seed is grown it will be offered to members of the local association for their following season's planting stock. These members will exchange first-class table stock of their own production for the improved seed when they market their potatoes. In this way every grower in the county will have an opportunity to get hold of the pedigreed seed stock.

In view of the fact that the very low average yield of potatoes in this state is due to a considerable extent to the use of poor seed, this movement to improve the seed stock of the state growers is expected to result in a substantial addition to the average production.

## CORN BORER IS FEARED

Growers Advised to Watch Shipment of Nursery Stock to Keep Out Insects.

That there is danger that the European corn borer, a dangerous insect which has gained quite a foothold in the East, may be introduced to Michigan in shipments of nursery stock, is the opinion of L. R. Taft, state inspector of orchards and nur-

series. The corn borer has become quite widely distributed throughout eastern Massachusetts and in certain sections of New York, and it is now feared that Michigan may become infested with the pest.

Practically all forms of farm crops are attacked by the borer, and the fact that it attacks all of the larger weeds, concealing itself in the pith, makes it well nigh impossible to exterminate the pest when it once gets a foothold in a section. It is known to attack more than 100 of our common plants, but as the name would imply, is most often found in the ears and stalks of corn.

The most likely means of the corn borer's introduction into Michigan is with nursery stock, it is thought. The danger is not so much from its being in the stock itself, although it might be found in herbaceous perennials such as iris and peonies, but from the straw, rushes, flags and other coarse grasses and weeds with which the stock might be packed. For this reason it is advisable to burn all packing material which may come around nursery stock.

Although there is as yet no general quarantine against shipments from the infested districts, we would strongly advise against bringing in nursery stock from New England, or from eastern or south-western New York. There is not likely at this time to be any danger from Rochester, Geneva, Newark, Dansville or other points in central New York.

The larvae of the borer are grayish in color, smooth, and about one inch in length. The pupae are cigar-shaped and about one-half inch long. If anything suspicious is found samples should be sent by mail to the state inspector of nurseries and orchards, East Lansing, with the specimens in a tin box, as the larvae can eat through a paper box.

## INDUSTRY IS REVIVED

Result of Election Monday Will Put New Life Into Village—Chance Now to Do Something.

Snowman, who represent an association consisting of G. J. Haeussler, Son, Fred Widmayer, A. A. Snowman, Wuerthner Bros., G. H. Brunschwisher, Yocum & Marx, J. E. Spangler, R. G. Soritor, M. J. Pardee Bros., Fred Houck and J. E. Bowler, who have raised \$5,000 to purchase the above property and fit it for the coming factory.

The building will receive extensive alterations, work on which will be begun at once. Subscriptions for stock in the new stove and furnace foundry will now be pushed. A large part of the stock has already been subscribed.

## MORE ELECTRICITY NOW

Special Election to Bond Village for Election Carried by an Overwhelming Majority.

With the largest vote ever polled at an election in the village, the proposed electric plant with Clinton carried by an overwhelming majority.

Monday was one of the coldest days this winter and early in the day it was thought the very severe weather would cut down the vote, especially among the women, and those who were particularly anxious that the plan should carry and had devoted their time and energies to the matter were somewhat in doubt as to how the result would turn out.

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Indeed, it was rather a big problem all the way because never were so many women registered, and though many thought they would mostly favor the plan—one never can tell about an election.

As the voting proceeded, guesses of as high as 85 per cent in favor were made, but when the ballots were counted and only those lone-sones 18 noes were found all were surprised.

There was no particular demonstration over the affair. Men met in bunches and expressed their satisfaction and informed by phone others who were not at the count, but there were no bonfires nor noisy demonstrations. It seemed to be considered as a piece of business to be taken care of and when finished that was all there was to it.

Work on the new line to Clinton will be taken up as soon as material can be purchased and holes dug for the poles.

As a matter of fact many women who registered did not get to the polls, and judging from the nine ballots that had been written upon and otherwise mutilated, some voted for the first time and were not quite clear on the Australian method of voting. We must lay these shortcomings to the women now, because the men have been voting by this system so long that they certainly should be well informed—though it has been a hard lesson to learn.

In the proposed scheme to unite with Canada and build a deep waterway from the Great Lakes to the ocean, thereby making Detroit, Cleveland, Chicago, Duluth and other lake cities seaport cities, the north and middle-west of the United States will receive great advantage. Naturally New York is opposing the scheme, because the city and state are deriving much business under the present system and they fear that the building of a rival waterway more direct will be of great injury to them.

We do not believe it. New York has always been a great seaport and will remain so regardless. There are great sections of the west and south that are tributary and New York has become a well established trading center. Millions of tons of produce annually go to New York to be distributed throughout the country. Of course some goes abroad; but with increased facilities for foreign shipments the great undeveloped country tributary to the Great Lakes will pour out its commodities and New York will continue to get her share.

By all means use whatever influence you have in favor of Senator Townsend's plan to secure a deep waterway to the ocean. It will be of vast interest to this section of country. The direct transportation of grain, etc., from our lake ports to Liverpool and other markets, and the saving of the expense of carrying the goods to New York will greatly facilitate matters and the farmer will get the benefit.

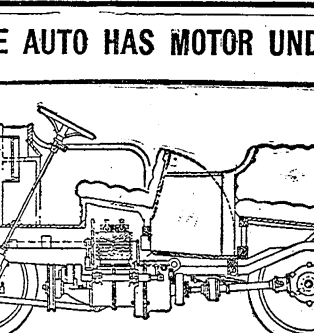

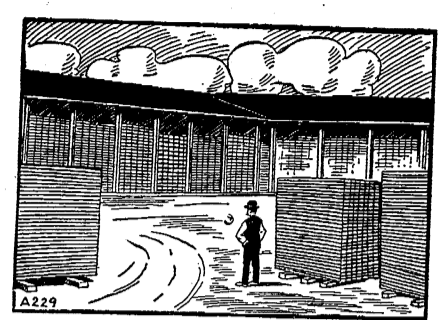
