TO BENEFIT SCHOOLS

Consolidation of Schools to Secure New Courses—Subject Presented by Supt. Neverth.

Consolidated schools would mean that the pupils of Manchester and vicinity would have an equal chance with pupils of other towns. It would mean a good four-year course in agriculture, for which the state and federal government would pay annually from \$800 to \$1,500 and even more. Last year every school which complied with the Smith-Hughes law received \$743 as state and federal aid. This amount will be increased each year indefinitely.

Other towns are getting this money; why not Manchester?

If we are going to turn our farms over to our sons, why not have them get expert scientific knowledge about intensive farming and be able to compete with the boys who go to the factories? The place to lay the foundation for such training is right in our own schools. The government is ready and willing to pay for most of the expense for teachers. Our girls are entitled to a good course in home economics, for which the state and federal governments have set aside a large appropriation to encourage this important instruction. Our girls do not all have the opportunity to learn cooking and sewing and all the other achievements necessary to good homemakers at home. Give them the equal chance with their city sisters and let Uncle Sam pay the bill.

The writer has helped to establish the above courses and can say with pleasure that the district where the change was made would not go back to the old method of education for any price. They are thoroughly satisfied and results are just beginning to crop out among the young men and women.

The story of consolidation with ad-

joining districts may call for a more lengthy discussion than can be adequately treated in this paragraph. Suffice to say that Manchester is especially well located for consolidation for a large number of districts are situated so near the village that it would be an easy matter to transport pupils to an up-to-date school with less expense than it would cost to heat all the little district schools. Uncle Sam pays \$200 for each vehicle used in transportation. The teacher problem is also a greater problem than most people are aware of. Hundreds of schools are closed for lack of teachers, while a like number are being held by untrained teachers. And the next few years will see a greater scarcity than ever.

If you are interested in the boys and girls of today, the citizens of tomorrow, get your shoulder to the wheel and push. Start by attending the parent-teacher meeting the first Tuesday of each month. Don't economize on the biggest crop ever produced—our boys and girls.

BELGIUM RECOVERING

Men Working Cheerfully at Low Wages—Food High Priced—Factories Being Rebuilt.

The story of conditions in stricken Belgium, the home of those fearless fighters who upset all plans of the Hun on their march toward Paris, is told by Silvere Reynaert of Jackson, who has just returned from a visit to his native country and was interviewed by a News reporter.

"Everybody in Belgium is working," said Mr. Reynaert. "The population of Roulers, which was my home, and where I visited brothers and sisters, was 30,000 before the war, but now is only about 16,000. It used to be a mill town where many kinds of cloth were woven. These factories were destroyed by the Germans, but they are being rebuilt by big contractors from Antwerp and Brussels. There is no German left in the city. There are none in the country. They got out.

"Prices are about as high as in America, but some things are scarce. People have to buy coal a painful at a time. It costs double the price here and they have to buy a little every day, same as we buy bread. Wages are equivalent to \$1.50 to \$2 a day, and it is hard to get along on that. But they all work. Nobody is idle.

"Railroads in Belgium have all been fixed up and there are fine trains and big engines. They came from Germany. She had to give them up according to the terms of the peace treaty that President Wilson and the others made at Versailles. People have been forced to buy some things from Germany, because that is the only place where they can be obtained. Permits are required before anybody can buy anything there.

"New machinery from the United States and England is being installed in the factories that are being rebuilt and Belgium will have better manufacturing plants than ever when they are completed. It will take 30 years to level down the front. All you can see for miles is big holes. The ground was completely pulverized and some of it never can be used. Unexploded mines are under the surface and when they are touched they go off, so it will be a long time before the land can be cultivated, if ever.

"I tried to find some little towns and villages I used to know, but there was nothing left but ruins.

often not one stone left on another. Steeples were shot off some of the churches, others were wrecked entirely and of still others only the walls are standing. I shall never forget last Christmas day in Ypres, where the ground for 16 miles is nothing but holes. I saw trenches the German built of cement and iron with great rooms under the ground. I went to Dixmude and visited all the fronts. You can't imagine the sights along the old front. I counted 50 tanks that were battered in battle and abandoned, rails twisted in all shapes, unexploded bombs lying in soft earth, airplane parts and debris of all sorts which men were carting to the junk shops.

"One of the most striking changes I saw was the destruction of trees in Belgium. Woods have been shot away. The roads used to be lined with tall shade trees, but now nothing but stumps are left, four, six, or eight feet high.

"People said they would have starved if it had not been for food from the United States that was distributed by Mr. Hoover. The Red Cross has a school for orphans in Roulers and the children of the country appear well and strong."

So far as we can learn Belgium has accomplished more by earnest toil since the war than France, Germany or any other country over there. The way to rebuild the country is to get busy and work, not stand around and talk and complain of your lot.

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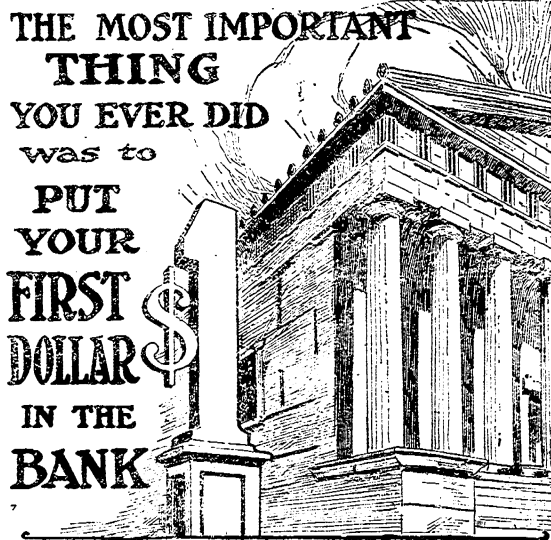

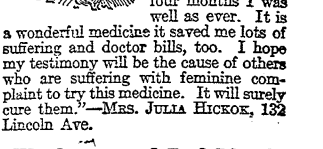

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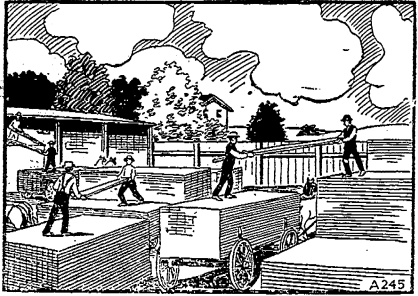
