From the number of inquiries received concerning the span of horses advertised in the Enterprise lines, we are of the opinion that good draft horses are still in demand. Also in conversation with farmers we learn that though many are talking and even buying trucks, there is an opinion that horses can do farm work cheaper if not better than tractors, especially on hilly farms. The high cost of hay and grain, however, influences many to sell their horses in the fall rather than feed them all winter, preferring to run the risk of buying a team when the farm work opens in the spring.

BEST MEN NOW NEEDED

The Times Demand Competent Men To Fill Various Offices of The Village.

With the bonding of the village for \$7,000 to increase our electric lighting system, thereby giving our citizens for residence and business a continuous service, the village needs to place some of her best men in office this year. A village office is looked upon as a thankless job, but if it is conscientious work it ought to have the approval of the people. We also anticipate a greater increase in business if not a larger growth in population than the village has had in several years. We have one manufacturing concern about ready to begin operations here, which will employ a considerable number of men and women. Another concern is expected to begin preparations for starting a factory here as soon as spring opens. These industries will require some attention and the village will wish to encourage and assist them locate as many workmen here as possible. There will probably be more street work than has been done in past years. The water mains may have to be extended and no doubt there will have to be repairs and improvements made at the municipal light and water plant. All these call for close attention from the village officers, from the president down to the nightwatch. The matter of selecting good men for every office is now in the hands of our citizens—men and women—and there being no politics in our village affairs, it should be a question of qualification rather than one of popularity in choosing our representatives. Think it over, talk it over before you go to the caucuses and be ready to vote for men who will be competent and willing to do their duty to the village.

Jacob Rommel of Waterloo, who was for many years a resident of this village and with the late Garrison Underhill bought the little old mill that used to stand on the east side of the river and was known as Brown's mill, and afterward acquired the roller mill, died recently. After

leaving Manchester some years ago, he bought a mill at Waterloo which he conducted until his death. Mrs. Fred Briegel of Detroit is one of his daughters.

It was brought out at the farm bureau meeting at Lansing last week that the sugar factories make three times as much profit on sugar as the farmer does on the beets he raises. The increase in cost of sugar, they claim, cannot be laid to the farmers.

The canvass of the county for membership in the farmers' Farm Bureau was discontinued on account of there being too much sickness throughout the county, also on account of the blocked roads. Now "Most Desperate
in World," Says Hoover.**



Herbert Hoover, who has now become a member of the Executive Committee of Near East Relief, which is caring for nearly 2,000,000 Armenian and Syrian refugees and who, if any one speaks with authority when he tells of human suffering, says in a formal statement:

"In my opinion, the situation in the Near East is the most desperate in the world."

Mr. Hoover has sent a letter to Cleveland H. Dodge, treasurer of Near East Relief, 1 Madison avenue, New York, in which he says:

"In accepting your invitation to become a member of the Executive Committee of the Near East committee, I do so with reluctance, but out of a sense of duty towards one of the most difficult situations in Europe. Until some political settlement can be obtained for the Near East and some government established in responsibility for the care and repatriation of the Armenian population in the Caucasus, this mass of people must live sheerly by the charity of the United States. There are in the Caucasus approximately 1,800,000 Armenians, of whom 800,000 are entirely destitute—refugees from Turkey—and amongst them a tremendous mass of children.

"I cannot too strongly urge upon the members of the committee and their supporters the critical necessity of concentrating every possible effort to support Colonel Haskell's administration in the amounts that he requires; otherwise we shall witness one of the greatest tragedies of the entire war."

**DEATH RATE DROPS
WHEN RELIEF ARRIVES**

Lives of thousands of Armenian children already have been saved by the Near East Relief taking over the Armenian orphanages, according to detailed reports, which have just reached the headquarters of that organization. These institutions had been run by the Armenians since the beginning of the war to care for the children whose parents had been murdered by the Turks. Because of lack of food, clothing and medicine, the death rate among the children in these institutions averaged as high as twenty or thirty a day in some cases.

When Armenian funds became inadequate the Near East Relief took charge of the orphanage. Since that time the death rate has been greatly reduced. Given good food and care the children are quickly returning to normal physical and mental condition. It is estimated by persons who have made a survey of Armenia that 120,000 children will die during the next year unless they are given food and care. Near East Relief is the only organization now operating in Western Asia and it is making an appeal to save these Christian children.


A PROGRESSIVE LODGE
