FALLING PRICES FELT

Export Demand for Dairy Products Fails And Over-Supply Results
—Culling Heris Advised.

The Pontchartrain hotel building in Detroit, which was recently purchased by a banking institution, is to be razed and a 24-story building erected in its stead. The city is to acquire ferry dockage 100 feet square at the foot of Woodward avenue, to be used when the municiality finds it advisable to run boats to Belle Isle. The proposed subway opening on Woodward avenue will be near the ferry dock. We expect to hear that the city is to construct a 30-story building on the site of the antiquated city hall. HE purpose of galvanizing wire for fencing is to protect it against rust or corrosion. "Galvanizing" consists in covering the wire with a coating of zinc, or spelter as it is commonly called.

After being properly cleaned, the wire is passed through a bath of molten zinc. The wire is never passed through the zinc bath more than once, because to pass it through the second time would melt off the first coat of zinc.

The terms "double galvanized" or "triple galvanized" are, therefore, entirely untrue, because no double or triple galvanized wire is made.
