GOOD ROADS

BIG GOOD ROAD BOND ISSUE

Dallas County, Texas votes \$6,500,000 for Construction of Complete Road System.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

The largest bond issue ever submitted in any county in Texas and one of the largest voted anywhere in the country was ratified by a big majority recently in Dallas county, Texas. It provides \$6,500,000 for a complete belt line around the county, with 12 roads radiating from Dallas to all sections and six inter-state roads connecting the main highways. The system provides for 700 miles of road, and in addition 700 miles amounting to about one hundred miles will be improved by the decrease in maintenance expenses. Federal aid

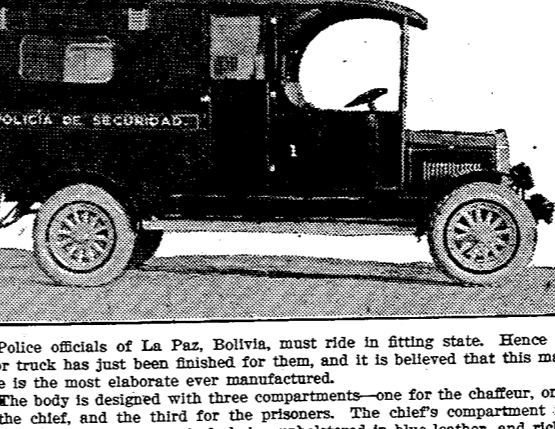
