HELPFUL HINTS.

Now that butter is so costly, as in fact are most fats, housewives are finding it expedient, if not necessary, to substitute the cheaper fats whenever possible.

As bacon is such a commonly-used breakfast dish the fat accumulates and unless carefully treated is not palatable as a general purpose fat.

Take bacon fat, add cold water and heat until melted and hot on the back of the stove, then set away to cool.

The fat will be washed clean from bits of charred bacon, and the smoky taste, which is so objectionable to many, is nearly removed. Such fat may be used in spice cakes, spleed puddings, fruit cookies and in other dishes in which the flavor of spices or fruits predominates.

All meat drippings may be treated
