

VINES GIVE FINISHING TOUCH

Hardly Too Much to Say That House is Not Really Complete Without Green Growth.

No farmhouse is complete unless it has something green growing over the porches or beside the doors. If you happen to have a house of brick, stone, or concrete, you can use a climbing vine, like the Virginia creeper. For the northern states you had better use Ampelopsis Engelmannii, which is particularly hardy. You can also use Eustoma vegetus, a remarkably fine climber, which takes the place in the North of the English ivy, the latter vine not being hardy. It keeps its green leaves all winter, and when well grown produces a large number of attractive berries, resembling bitter sweet. When you have a wooden house you can make choice among many different vines, like bitter sweet, Clematis, mannikata, Hall's honeysuckle, Akebia, Dutchman's pipe, and various roses. Indeed, some of the climbing roses are almost indispensable. This does not necessarily mean the old-fashioned Red Rambler, for some of the newer sorts are cleaner and better. Among the good hardy kinds are Excelsa, American Pillar—one of the finest of all; Dorothy Perkins, Lady Gay, Taussendschön and Aviateur Bielefeld.

Now that peace is returned there is a notable tendency to grow more flowers and flowering plants. This means that a great amount of planting will be done, and it should mean the improvement of country homes everywhere throughout the country.

BEAN CROP SAID GOOD

Japanese Competition Lessened by Fear of United States Tariff, Better Market Predicted.

In spite of the competition of Japanese white beans and a large hold-over in the American crop, beans are still a good crop for the better Michigan grower, declares Prof. J. F. Cox, head of the farm crops department at M. A. C. It is reported on good authority that the Japanese acreage has not been expanded during the past year, owing to the fear that an effective tariff might be placed on beans by the United States.

The Japanese have not competed heavily with red kidney beans. These are in great demand and it would seem that a considerably larger acreage of red kidneys could be planted on the better soils of this state. As for white beans, Michigan's product is so well known for quality that it can stand very strenuous competition.

For the good bean grower who thoroughly understands bean production and are located under conditions that will produce good beans, this crop should be a good one during the coming year. However, many of the marginal growers, or those who produce very near or below the average yield, may do better with some other crop.

The present shortage of labor has increased the importance of securing larger yields per acre, and thus lowering the production cost per bushel of beans. Thorough and at the same time early preparation of the seed bed, planting the highest yielding varieties, and the use of fertilizers will aid in securing this increased production.

The usual time of planting beans

ranges from June 1st to 20th. If the seed bed is not in good condition spend a week or ten days in working thoroughly, even though it makes planting time come a little late—but not later than June 20th. All indications are that Michigan bean growers will find a better market next winter for Michigan grown beans than the pessimistic forecast of the past fall and winter indicated.

RIVALRY HAS GOOD EFFECT

Competition of Towns in Showing Community Progress Worked Wonders in West Virginia.

Cities at least, have the stimulus to make improvements whether they do so or not. The village and rural communities lack the stimulation that comes through contact with the outside world. It is not surprising to find them narrow and unprogressive. A unique experiment along the line of community betterment has been in progress for two years in 23 small West Virginia communities. A system of points is used to score community progress, 1,000 being a perfect score. Nine general headings are used to cover the field of community development—history, government, business, farm, clubs, homes, schools, churches and health. As examples of the way it works, the absence of gaudy and ugly advertising signs, scored two points; increased use of school buildings for regular school work and as a social center, four points, and one point each for better housekeeping as the result of activities of the farm women's clubs, installation of bathrooms, and running water in kitchens, and extension and improvement in the rural telephone systems. The experiment has produced no Utopia, but has raised standards in the communities involved.—Leslie's Weekly.

Garden Cities.

To those who really understand what garden cities mean, who have seen them in actual being, and maybe, lived in their midst, there are few things that appear as more utterly right than this new development in the great scheme of the world's housing. The ease with which ugliness is avoided and beauty attained; the generous way in which nature, at every turn, enters into the plan, responding at once to the smallest touch of art with a quite superabundant generosity; the wonderful outflow of public spiritedness from all concerned, once the way is opened up, these and a hundred other welcome graces are to be found everywhere within the garden city.—Christian Science Monitor.

ORCHARD GLEANINGS

ANNUAL PRUNING OF PEACHES

Tree Requires Constant Care for Profitable Crops—Ice and Snow Liable to Injure.

The peach is a fruit that requires constant care or profitable crops cannot be produced. Annual pruning is necessary and the low-headed tree must be developed carefully for it is a tree of that type which is easiest to harvest, thin and spray. The low-headed tree is less apt to break when covered with ice and snow or heavily loaded with fruit, writes R. G. Kirby of Ingham county in Michigan Farmer.

The peach wood is brittle and if long limbs are not carefully pruned and headed back, it is sure to result in breakage, especially at the crotches. If a strong limb on the young peach tree grows in the direction of the prevailing winds in the section, it pays to encourage that limb to develop and thus prevent the tree from becoming lop-sided. If some judgment is not used in heading the young tree into the wind, an entire orchard may soon show the unsymmetrical effect of allowing too much of the wood to grow in one direction.

As soon as the trees are set out cut back the tops. Peaches and plums should be headed 18 inches from the ground and apples and pears 32 inches. Young trees require the best of care and cultivation. Practice frequent cultivation during the summer and plant a catch crop in July or early August. The best crop for this is one to supply humus and nitrogen to the soil. It is also advisable to plant a cover crop for winter, this being turned under in the early spring.

instead of being dull and green. It is the sunshine on the fruit which makes the blush and by so keeping the middle of the tree open, the grower is able to bring the light to the peaches and they are improved in appearance and market value.

Limbs should not be allowed to cross. If this occurs, one of the limbs may be weighed with fruit and bent down upon the other, increasing the danger of breakage. Head back the twigs with a pair of shears on a pole and thus avoid climbing trees more than necessary. When the twigs cannot be cut back from the ground it is better to use a step-ladder than to climb into the trees and risk splitting the limbs or scraping the bark.

The fruit buds of the peach are formed on the previous year's growth of wood. In pruning out the new wood be sure and leave enough to insure a good crop. Moderate thinning of the new wood helps to thin the crop and this is a much less expensive form of thinning than the removing of a part of the young fruit after it has been formed.

The amateur grower can learn a great deal about the pruning of peaches by visiting the orchard of a skilled grower and studying the symmetrical form of the trees.

MUCH POWER IN RAISIN

Early Map Indicates That Settlers Recognized Value of River as Power Source.

The Enterprise is in possession of perhaps the first map ever made of this village. We do not know what year it was published, but it must have been at an early date after the settlement was made, anyway back in 1846.

It was in possession of Capt Chandler Carter, who built and owned the place on Water street now owned by Mrs. Corwin. After Capt. Carter's death his daughter and her husband, Mr. and Mrs. Talmán Case, owned the place, which they sold to Charles Tricketts, and he conveyed it to Mrs. Corwin. The map shows the contemplated route of the Jacksonburgh and Palmyra railroad, via Clinton and Manchester, chartered in 1836, and its entrance into the village by Railroad street to the mill, and that appeared to be the end of the road when the map was made.

The old millstand where Mr. Hotter's mill now stands, though it was much larger and extended westward on a line with Railroad street. This mill was burned in 1853. The site of Mr. Brown's mill is shown on the opposite side of the river.

Along the river is written on the map, "Extensive Water-power." The two mills and the hotel are the only buildings indicated on the plan. The names of some of the streets have since been changed, but there is much real value in this ancient map.

Pencil notations on the map show who were among first owners of property here, namely the Gilberts, Kiers, Farnes, Cases, Gears, Farns, Merriman, Clarkson, Stowell, Hendershott, Baxter, Anthony, Clark and others.

Long after this map was made the railroad above mentioned was surveyed through the village on the present route.

Best to Patronize Reliable Nursery as Near Home as Possible—Be Cautious of Agents.

Always buy trees of a reliable nursery as near at home as possible. It is all right to buy of traveling agents if you like, but it is advisable to gather a little information beforehand for yourself so that you will not be taken in. You can learn a great deal, and might get enough discount on your order for buying direct to pay all your expenses. The trouble with most agents is that they do not try to understand your situation, but try to sell you as many trees as possible of every kind and variety they have listed. Unless you know what you want they can do it too.

GOOD LOCATION FOR ORCHARD

Purely Home Affair Should Be Near House—Put Commercial Orchard Anywhere Convenient.

The purely home orchard should be near the house, and a combination orchard should be as near the house as the proper land for it may be had. It matters little where the purely commercial orchard is placed, if it has good soil, provided you see that it is placed convenient to the road so that no time will be lost in handling the fruit when harvesting time comes.





John Collins of the Chicago Americans takes no stock in the rumors being revived to the effect that certain members of the Chicago White Sox bet on the world series last fall.







SAUCES FOR VARIOUS DISHES



Mushroom Sauce—Melt one tablespoon of butter. Add one teaspoonful of flour and when bubbling hot stir in one cupful of rich milk. Stir until smooth and slightly thick. Season with salt, cayenne and celery salt. Add one-half can of mushrooms, chopped when hot serve on beefsteak.

Olive Sauce—Chop fine eight good-sized olives and just before serving add to the following:
Brown Sauce—Melt two tablespoons of butter; add two tablespoons of flour and a slice of minced onion, cook until dark in color. Add one cupful of brown stock; cook one minute and strain. A few drops of kitchen bouquet will add to the flavor and deepen the color.

Drawn Butter Sauce—Melt four tablespoons of butter; add two tablespoons of flour, salt, pepper and cayenne to taste. Add one cupful of water and cook until thick. Half of the butter may be reserved and beaten into the sauce very slowly. This takes more time but it improves the sauce. To serve with fish, add a tablespoonful or two of capers, or a few chopped pickles.

Potato Flour used in the same proportion makes more delicate sauces and does not need as long cooking.

More Good Things
The following is a good way to use stale bread and not at all common:
Poast Pudding—Take five or six slices of bread, cut half an inch thick. Mix one beaten egg with one cupful of milk; add one-quarter teaspoonful of salt and soak the bread in this for 15 minutes. Brown in hot butter on a griddle and serve with **Raisin Sauce**—Boil one-third of a cupful of raisins in one and one-half cups of water for 15 minutes; add one-quarter of a cupful of brown sugar and boil for 15 minutes longer. Thicken with one teaspoonful of flour, mixed with one teaspoonful of butter; add salt and nutmeg to taste. Stir well and serve.

Cream Puff Popovers—Take any popovers left from breakfast and make an opening in the side large enough to neatly fill the center. For six popovers take half a cupful of cream, sweetened with two tablespoons of sugar and flavored with vanilla and lemon juice. Add a little salt and whip the cream. Stir in one-tablespoonful of softened gelatine and set on ice to chill. When ready to serve, stir in half a cupful of any kind of fruit that has been well sugared and drained. Fill the popovers and serve at once.

Warm-over Beans—Put into a hot frying pan some of the pork cooked with the beans. When the fat is melted and hot pour in the beans; add a little hot water and set back where the beans will heat slowly. Fold over like an omelet and serve with savory tomato sauce or tomato catsup. Garnish with parsley.

Graham Cracker Sandwiches—Mix together chopped nuts, raisins and lemon juice; heat through, cool and spread on graham crackers. Press lightly together and crisp in a moderate oven.

Egg Sauce—Cook two eggs until hard in the shell. Shell and chop and add to the above white sauce, using one-tablespoonful each of flour and butter. Add a bit of onion juice and chopped parsley.

Corn and Tomatoes Scalloped—Put a layer of corn into a buttered baking dish, add a tablespoonful of minced onion, which has been cooked in fat until brown, cover with a layer of cooked tomato; add salt and pepper after each layer. Repeat until the dish is full. Cover with buttered crumbs and bake.

BIG REDUCTION IN CHOLERA
Decrease in Swine Loss of 72 Per Cent Noted in Six Counties in North Carolina.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)
An example of the benefit which may come to a community from the well-directed efforts of state and federal agencies, coupled with the cooperation of farmers, for the control of hog cholera is shown in a recent report of a veterinary inspector of the Bureau of Animal Industry.

Hog cholera control work was inaugurated in six counties in the northeastern section of North Carolina August 1, 1918. An intensive campaign was carried on for a period of 14 months. It included investigation of reported outbreaks, demonstrations in the use of serum and virus, and the disinfection of premises. As the services of practicing veterinarians were not available, a number of laymen were trained in the administration of the serum treatment for cholera. After that period of intensive activities the work was withdrawn to another section of the state; only general supervision being given to the original area.

During October a survey was made of the counties comprising the district in question, and a questionnaire was submitted to as many of the farmers as could be reached. Answers received and tabulated indicate that there has been a reduction in losses from cholera of over 72 per cent, and an increase of over 100 per cent in swine production, due to the protection offered by the immunization of the animals. 


