

French Villages Americanized.

Vitruvian - Abandoned village of a group of California cities, is one of the first of the hundreds of French devastated towns to be entirely restored, according to a report of the American Red Cross. The ancient Gothic church of the town has been replaced by a modern stone structure which, while in conformity with the lost traditions of French taste nevertheless presents in its broad eaves a suggestion of Los Angeles. Likewise, the reconstructed "Majestic" or town hall contains features which are reminiscent of some of the most classic outlines of San Diego structures. Other buildings in the town were said to be representative of the architecture of San Francisco and various other California cities.

Good Teachers a Requisite.
