## NEARING COMPLETION

Work of Months Now Shows as Front Part of Building Goes Up—Much Space Is Added.

The new front addition to the Huber & Wiedman garage is now almost completed so far as outward appearance goes.

The firm expected to build this front of brick, but were delayed in getting material, and as it is necessary that they have the building ready before winter, they concluded to build of wood and later use brick or other material for finish.
