Comes to Constitution English Is the Proper Language for Americans.

The German Lutheran church at Coldwater has discontinued the use of the German language in its services. This action was taken at a meeting of the executive board held last week. It was thought advisable to adopt this plan, as German immigration to this country has practically ceased. It was also believed the church would forge ahead more rapidly in the missionary and other fields if such action was taken. The congregation is now composed almost entirely of English-speaking people, who have broken away from the tongue and the customs of the fatherland.

MILLET FOR HAY CROP

Can Be Planted Until Early July— May Be Used to Make Up for Hay Shortage.

In response to questions from many farmers of the state as to crops that may be sown at this late date in order to offset the shortage of the hay crop, C. R. Mege of the M. A. C. farm experiment department is sending out word that millet may be safely sown as late as the first week of July. Sorghum is also mentioned as possibility for a late crop to meet the hay shortage.

One of the most dependable late crops is millet. Common millet will mature in from 60 to 75 days and yields of from one and one-half to two tons per acre were secured the previous year on the college experiment station field when millet was sown the latter part of June. Millets are usually sown with the ordinary grain drill at the rate of from 25 to 30 pounds per acre.

Sorghums may also be used for this purpose, the Early Amber variety being best adapted to Michigan conditions. Good yields are usually secured by drilling solid with the grain drill at the rate of from 35 to 40 pounds of seed per acre.

DOPE GRASSHOPPERS

Method Given of Doing Away With Pests Should They Visit This Part of State.

The grasshoppers that are destroying crops, etc. in the northern part of the state may visit this section before fall and the Enterprise wants its readers to be prepared.

The following method of preparing and distributing the poison bait is given by Prof. Pettit. Into a bushel of screened sawdust, thoroughly mix by sifting, a pound of poison, either paris green, white arsenic or crude arsenous oxide. In a gallon of water dissolve three-fourths of a pound of salt and add one-half of a cup of molasses. Slowly pour this into the poisoned sawdust while the mixture is being stirred. Add enough more water to make good stiff mash.

This poisoned bait can safely be taken in the hands and spread broadcast. It should not be left in piles around the field, but should be well scattered. A bushel of this poison ought to cover about three acres of ground. The best results from the use of this poison are to be expected when it is used late in the afternoon.

This it will not dry out over night and will be fresh when the hungry hoppers go for it in the morning. If put out in piles the chances are that there will be some danger to cattle from the use of this poison, but if applied as recommended no trouble is likely to result. However, it is best to salt the cattle before applying the poison to their feeding grounds, as they will then be less attracted to the mixture.

CUT SWEET CLOVER EARLY

Sweet clover for hay should be cut early just before the blossom buds appear. Sweet clover becomes very woody after blooming and is

not nearly so palatable and does not make as good a hay as when cut at the earlier stage. This fact is overlooked by many farmers, since the aisle and red clover are usually cut after the blossoms have appeared. Sweet clover does not propagate from a crown as does alfalfa, and consequently the stubble should be cut high enough so that a number of branches will develop into the second crop, which may be used for either hay or seed. If the crop is cut very close to the ground these branches will be removed and the second crop will not develop.
