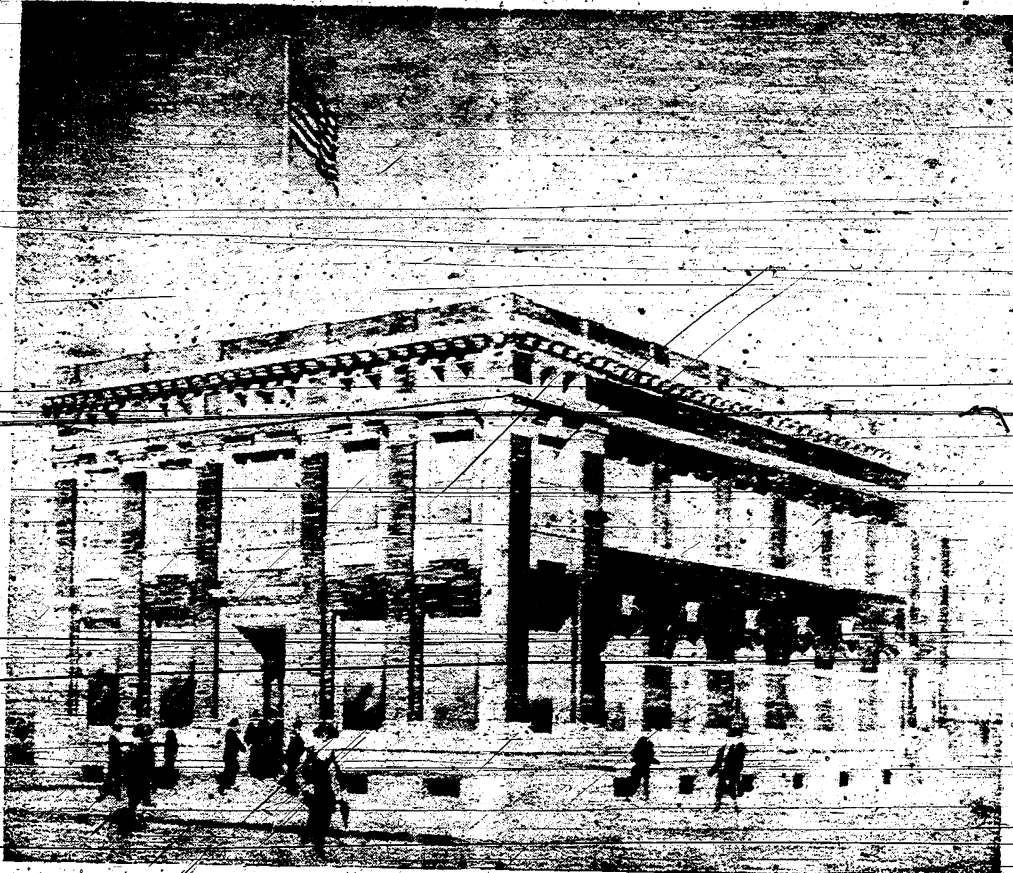

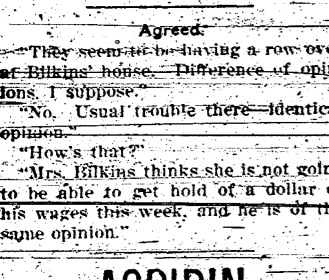
"PLENTY NEXT DOOR"

Record Harvest Predicted for Canada.

After having made a careful survey of the wheat producing area of the United States, experts whose business it is to keep the people informed on the acreage sown to wheat state that this year there will be a falling off in the wheat production in the States, due to a considerably less area cultivated. The opinion of these experts is that the decrease will be several hundred million bushels of wheat less than in previous years, which, according to past experience, will be scarcely sufficient to meet the requirements of the demands of the people of this country.

In Canada, however, the situation is different. Reliable reports on the crop situation throughout Western Canada, are such as to create the most substantial optimism. Never before were the prospects so encouraging for a bumper harvest. It is predicted that the yield this year will be even greater than in 1915, the year of the record harvest in Canada, when the total production was 333,542,600 bushels.

WASHING CAR IN EFFICIENT WAY

Unusual Care Must Be Exercised During First Months of Use of New Auto.

VARNISH EASILY SCRATCHED

Only Pure Castile Soap or Nonalkali Soaps Should Be Used in Removing Grease—Wax Polishes Are Quite Efficacious.

No automobile owner should forget that unusual care must be taken in washing a new car during the first few months of use.

The best of varnish requires considerable time to harden, and until that time the finish is easily scratched. Only pure castile soap or non-alkali soaps should be used for the removal of grease. Gasoline is out of the question.

Lukewarm (not warm) water should be used in washing, and accumulations of mud or dirt should be carried off by means of a one-inch stream of water from the hose.

After a thorough rinsing, the varnish should be dried by means of a chamois skin wrung out continuously in clear water. A long sweeping movement of the chamois produces better results than a rotary motion.

A soft woolen duster is preferable to a feather duster for the interior of the car.

Plate-glass windows are best cleaned with soapy water to which a small

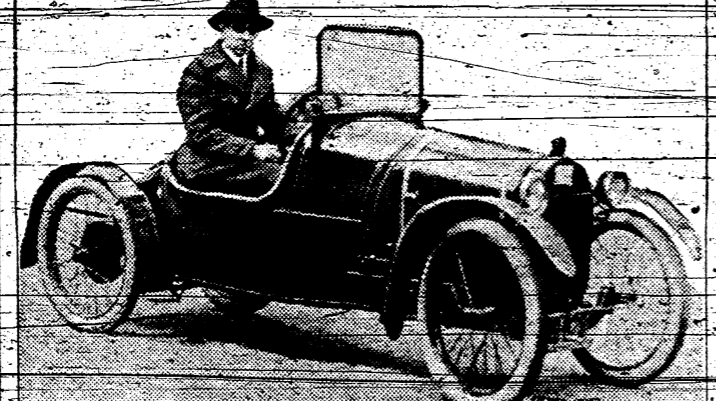

Don't overinflate. If you like the sensation of sound tires, buy a wagon.
Don't ignore small cuts. A patch in time saves dollars.
Don't buy tires smaller than recommended by the manufacturer for a car of the weight of the one you own. It isn't economy.
Don't forget to remove and reverse your inner tubes every three months. They appreciate a change and will pay for it.
Don't buy a nameless tube of casing. The manufacturer who is afraid to put his name on his product is ashamed of the goods.

TO CLEAN ENGINE CYLINDERS

Important to Have Piston in Uppermost Position of Its Sweep to Protect Surface.
It has long been customary to clean gasoline engine cylinders with long-handled scraping tools, the cutting edges of which are hardened. In scraping a cylinder in this manner, it is important to have the piston in the uppermost position of its sweep, since otherwise the scraping tool is likely to slip into the groove of the cylinder and injure the smooth surface of the cylinder wall.

AVOID ANY UNDERINFLATION

Chief Reason Why Many Tires Do Not Give Maximum Mileage—Regulate Proper Pressure.
Underinflation is the chief reason why many tires fail to give maximum mileage. To determine quickly what air pressure to carry on tires, for three-inch tires divide the weight of load by 32; for four-inch tires, by 48; and for five-inch, by 64. Tire mileage will be increased greatly if the motorist regulates air pressure properly.

CLUB WORK PAYS BOYS WELL

Many California Members Repaid Loans for Purchased Animals Out of First Litters.
Agricultural club boys in Eldorado county, Calif., borrowed \$502 in March, 1918, from local banks to start their pig club projects. In August, 1919, inventory showed that these boys owned or had sold \$5,328.25 worth of stock. Eight girls, exhibited by the Eldorado boys at the State fair brought an average price of \$36.50. They were from the first litter out of the original sows.

Owing to the high prices of pork last year, 63 per cent of the 1919 enrollment in the California agricultural clubs went into either the sow and litter or the pig-feeding contest. Many club members in the State paid high prices with borrowed money for purchased animals, and in most cases have more than repaid the loans out of the first litters, says the United States department of agriculture.

Occasionally the purchased pig clubs in California have found difficulty in securing adequate prices for the stock they raise. To eliminate this trouble they have resorted to the means used by other organized breeders, and have organized auction sales. Two were held in the past year, one at Lerdo, Kings county, and one in Fresno county. At Lerdo 38 animals brought a total of \$2,751 or an average of about \$72 a head, which is about the

SHEEP AS SOURCE OF PROFIT
Clean-Grazing Animals Will Thrive on Short Grass and Rough Land—Worthy of Trial.
Sheep would be a source of profit on many farms where they have not been given attention. They are close-grazing animals and as such will thrive on short grass and rough land where other animals would find it difficult to live. Why not get a few sheep and give them a chance on your farm?

EARLY PIGS REQUIRE GRAIN
Young Animals Cannot Be Expected to Get Heavy Enough for Market From Cornfield.
Pigs farrowed in late April, May and June can be fed on the same general plan but cannot be expected to get heavy enough to be marketed to the best advantage from the cornfield, but will require grain feeding up to late December or January at least before they will be heavy enough.

KILL ALL HARMFUL ANIMALS

Annual Loss Wrought by Predatory Wild Beasts and Rodents Mounts Up Into Millions.
Live stock and wool valued at \$20,000,000 are lost annually through the depredations of wild animals. The value of farm produce and forage destroyed each year by rodents is approximately \$300,000,000. It is estimated that the households of this country sustain an annual loss from rats and mice of \$200,000,000.
These figures sum up certain of the larger losses due to destructive wild life which the biological survey of the United States department of agriculture is engaged in reducing as rapidly as possible. A force of between 400 and 500 experienced hunters was employed by this bureau during the past year to kill predatory animals, many of which were infected with rabies;

BANK FAVORS BETTER SIRES

Concern at Fond du Lac, Wis., Urges Its Patrons to Improve Quality of Stock.
With the publication of a four-page farm news leaflet, of which a current copy is "Duroc Sale and Pig Club Number," a bank at Fond du Lac, Wis., is encouraging its patrons to improve their herds. The editor of the sheet has the unique title of "bank agriculturist," and his activities are devoted largely to financing farmers who wish to acquire well-bred animals or to become joint owners in valuable sires.

RATION OF COTTONSEED MEAL
One Pound Per Day for Each 1,000 Pounds Live Weight Is Most Satisfactory.
One pound of cottonseed meal per day for each 1,000 pounds live weight is the most satisfactory quantity to feed work animals, according to recent experiments conducted by the United States department of agriculture. A test in feeding cottonseed meal to work horses and mules at the government farm, Beltsville, Md., was begun in 1918, and continued last year. When the meal was fed in large quantities harmful effects were apparent, however, indicating that cottonseed meal, like any other high-protein feed must be fed with care to horses and mules.

Blackleg Vaccine Is Free
Department Report Shows That 3,339,815 Doses Were Distributed During Last Year.
Vaccine for immunizing cattle against blackleg is still in great demand. A report of the bureau of animal industry, United States department of agriculture, shows that 3,339,815 doses were distributed free to stock owners during the last fiscal year. The vaccine sent out by the bureau is in the powdered form.

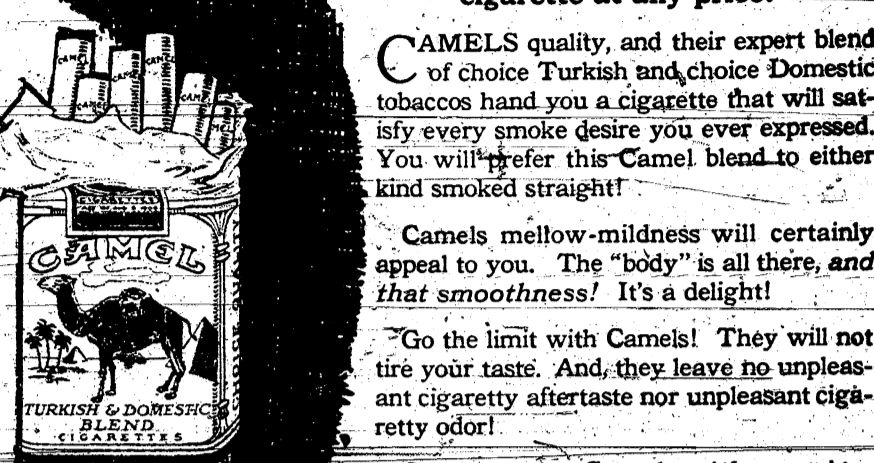

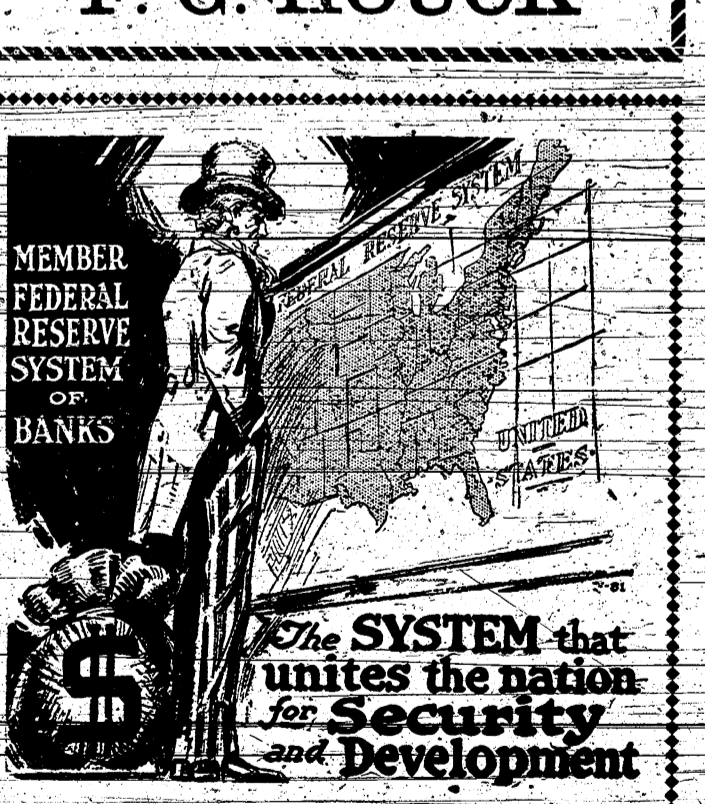
