While Michigan has more fishing places and perhaps more fishermen than any other state, yet there is a right smart lot of fellows who come here from other states to try their luck. In 1914 when the state began to collect a revenue from non-resident fishermen, \$20,000 was the total received. Last year \$40,000 was contributed and this year \$50,000 will help the cost of restocking the lakes and streams. In truth they take the lion's share of fish because they come prepared and stay on the job every day as long as their vacation lasts, while we Michiganders only go occasionally when we can get away, and frequently that is on a day when conditions are bad and the reward in fish is meager.

When Thunder Roars.
When caught in a thunderstorm, don't rush for any shelter.

Remember that any tall, isolated object, such as a tree or a flagstaff, or even a tall building, is liable to attract lightning, and for that reason, should be avoided.

If trees are chosen as shelters during a storm, select a group in preference to one standing by itself, and avoid the highest.

Never run to escape the rain, as a flash is likely to be diverted to the vicinity of the air thus set in rapid motion.

In a house, keep away from open windows—it is best to shut them—and fireplaces.

It is safer to be soaked by the rain than dry under an umbrella; wet clothes will be chosen by the lightning in preference to the wearer, and the wearer in preference to his dry clothes.

The Calling of Wild Geese.
There are certain bird notes which strike strange chords, whose vibrations are lost in a mist of dreams. I remember a little runaway boy who stood in a clover field in a gray twilight and heard the clanging calls of wild geese shouting down from midsky. He said he was home a vast distance—at least the width of two fields. As he ran there seemed to come back to him the memory of a forgotten dream. If it were a dream, in which he lay in another land on a chill hillside. Overhead in the darkness passed a burst of triumphant music and the strong ringing of voices not of this earth. From that day the trumpet notes of the wild geese bring back through the fog of the drifting years that same dream to him who heard them first in the gray, long ago clover field.

TRIP TO NEW SCENES

Thrills From Danger and Grandeur
Move Former Manchesterites
While Sight Seeing.

While on their recent trip west, Mr. & Mrs. B. F. Burtless of Lansing visited the famous Estes Park, near Denver, about which Mrs. Burtless writes the Enterprise as follows:

"Whoever thought that I would come up to Estes Park? We heard a good deal about the place when we were west last time, but I surely had no idea what a wonderful place it is.

"From Denver we drove up Big Thompson Canyon in a Cadillac car very comfortably. Words failed to express our delight when coming through the canyon, though we exclaimed every foot of the way. It was indeed grand, and the beautiful river flowing along so clear and rapid, together with the coloring of the trees and foliage—red, yellow and brown—and the green pines, made a picture that must be seen to be appreciated.

"The hotel is located on a high point overlooking the mountains, the higher peaks of which are covered with snow. Much of the way up there are most attractive cabins located along the river where one can fish for trout or on the mountain side from which point one can explore via numerous trails. Fred is very much taken with the idea of coming out some time and take a cabin for a month. It would certainly be a grand place, but is a long way from home.

"This afternoon we went up Fall River Canyon. On the trip one can get all the thrills desired. Velvet is the most subtly becoming of all sorts of fabrics that are used for women's clothes and there is promise that the coming fall and winter season will see this material used in great abundance.

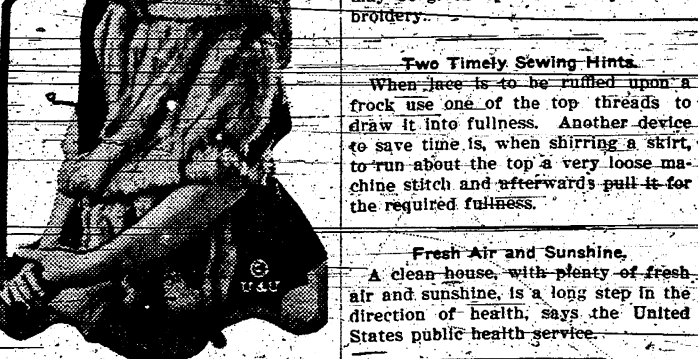

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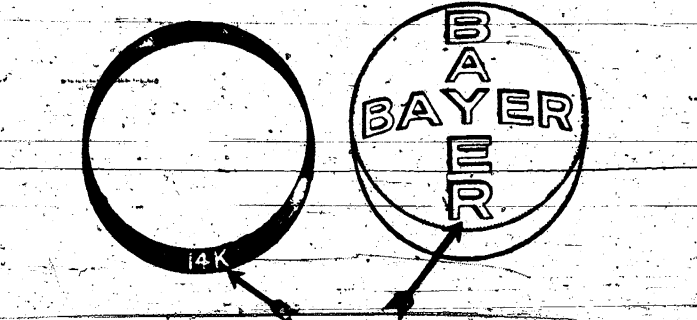
