The advantages of this form are said to be: Power-no matter in wha direction the wind is blowing; noise less operation; the windmill does not have to turn about, with conse loss of time; there is ne danger from five times the power derived from usua y no upkeep or operating expense undertake the building of such wind mills in all capacities from one half to mended to be run in con storage battery, so that, when the wind is blowing, electrical energy is stored up for use during the calm weather. However, it is estimated that the windmill can operate in practically any weather, and but very few idle days are encountered throughou the year, writes Hereward Carrington in Leslie's. This windmill may prove of the greatest practical value to many farmers and those desirous of obtaining power cheaply and easily.
