Taking Care of Indoor Plants. To make ferns grow rapidly indoors and look fresh and green, chop a few oysters fine and mix with the soil and then water well. This may be done every fortnight. Wash the leaves of your rubber plant with a cloth wet with olive oil. This nourishes the plant and keeps the leaves dark green and velvery. Add a few drops of ammonia to a quart of lukewarm water when you water house plants. The chemical acts as a tonic and fertilizer and makes the foliage fresher. And be careful, when real winter weather. comes, not to water your plants with water too cold. Water running from a faucet in January is far too cold-for tender plants. Add enough hot water to make the drink you give your plants lukewarm—as rainwater always is in summer time.


