The awful catastrophe at Port Huron, Michigan, which has resulted in the necessity of eliminating grade crossings.

President Harding, in special message, urges ratification of the \$25,000,000 treaty with Colombia, and that started opposition among Senate Republicans.

Voters will be called upon to decide whether Michigan soldiers are to receive just compensation for their valued services during the war. If they concur, the state will be given authority to borrow thirty million dollars for that purpose.

Every farmer knows what proper drainage does for his land. Many farmers do some work along that line every year. We have used a more systematic drainage in this section. Next week at the agricultural college they will have a special course on drainage.

Frank Klingensmith, formerly treasurer of the Ford Motor Co., and Frank Beall, late of the Packard Co., have formed a company at Detroit to manufacture a four-cylinder automobile the engine for which has been tried out and it is claimed will operate a car at 27 miles per gallon.

A concurrent resolution was introduced in the lower house at Lansing, Tuesday, calling upon congress to divide Michigan into two states, the lower peninsula to retain the present name and government and the new commonwealth to be known as "Superior" to be created to the upper peninsula.

All hail to the morning that bids us rejoice will be sung by newspaper men and the public generally because President Harding has promised to better the U. S. postal service, and Postmaster General Hays says that he will do his best to carry out his wishes. It must be remembered that Mr. Harding is an experienced newspaper man, knows the needs of the people, and has a heart to meet them.

Attorney General Palmer, before retiring from office, ruled that the government has no power under the prohibition law to limit the quantity of liquors of whatever kind, made or sold for non-beverage purposes. The manufacture and sale of liquor for medicinal purposes has not been prohibited. He scolded the restrictions placed upon doctors authorized to prescribe liquors for patients. With reference to physicians' prescriptions for wine and beer, the government has no power, he said, to place limitations that would restrict the freedom of doctors.

Voters should read the instructions, how to vote, on the top of the ballot as it gives complete details. Many voters give no heed to it and fail to vote as they really intended it. In the matter of constables on the township tickets, voters should remember that they have a right to vote for "three," no matter if two are opposite, but must mark their ticket so the election board will know which ones they intended to vote for. A safe way is to scratch off the name of the constable you do not wish to vote for—and of course place an X before the names of those for whom you wish to vote.

GERMANY MUST COME THROUGH  
Allies Have Gained Across Border to Enforce Terms of Reparation.

The allied troops began marching into Germany Tuesday morning because of non-fulfillment of German reparations obligation. Dusseldorf, Duisburg and Ruhrort were invaded without resistance or serious friction. No U. S. troops were sent over, but mostly French who have taken over customs houses, schools, forts, etc. Pressure will continue until Berlin accepts terms imposed by the allies.

Notice is further hereby given that I will be at The Union Savings Bank, Manchester, on

March 12 and March 19, A. D. 1921. From 8 o'clock a. m. until 5 o'clock p. m. on each said day for the purpose of reviewing the registration and registering such of the qualified electors in said township as shall properly appear therefor.

The name of no person but an actual resident of the precinct at the time of registration, and entitled under the constitution, if remaining such resident, to vote at the next election shall be entered in the registration book.

Registration of Absentee by Oath. If any person whose name is not registered shall offer and claim the right to vote at any election, and shall, under oath, state that he or she is a resident of such precinct and has resided in the township 29 days next preceding such election, designating particularly the place of his or her residence, and that he or she possesses the other qualifications of an elector under the constitution, and that owing to the sickness or bodily infirmity of himself or herself, or some member of his or her family or owing to his or her absence from the township on public business or his or her own business, and without intent to avoid or delay his or her registration, he or she was unable to make application for registration on the last day provided by law for the registering of electors preceding such election, then the name of such person shall be registered, and he or she shall then be permitted to vote at such election. If such applicant shall in said matter willfully make any false statement, he or she shall then be deemed guilty of perjury, and upon conviction, be subject to the pains and penalties thereof.

Registration by Mail or Messenger. Under Act No. 7, Public Acts of 1919, the privilege of Absent Voters is extended to include registration. Upon compliance with this Act registration can be secured without personal appearance.

The time limit for registration by mail or messenger is the same as where personal application is made. Therefore the affidavit of an elector desiring to register by mail or messenger must be received by the Town-ship Clerk not later than the second Saturday preceding election, or application to the Township Clerk to have his or her name transferred from the registration book of the precinct from which he or she has removed to the registration book of the precinct in which he or she then resides. Such elector shall have the right to have such transfer made on Election Day by obtaining from the board of inspectors of election of the precinct from which he or she has removed a certificate of transfer and presenting the said certificate to the board of electors inspectors of the precinct in which he or she then resides.

Women Electors—The names of all qualified Women Electors not already appearing on the registration list will be registered, in conformity with the foregoing provisions. Dated March 4, A. D. 1921.

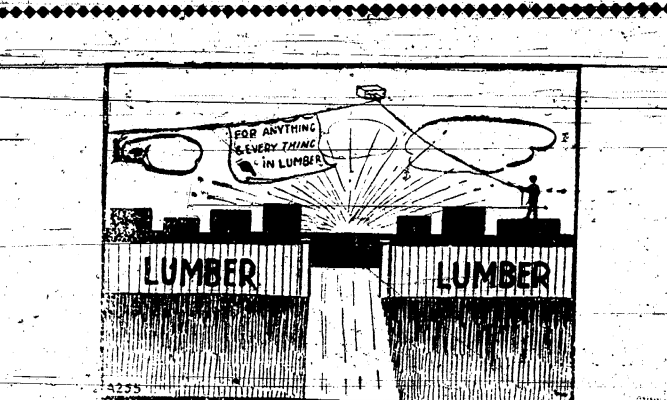
