

Titus Tatius, king of the Sabines, ruled jointly with Romulus six years. Numa Pompilius, son-in-law of Tatius; Titus Hostilius, murdered by his successor; Ancus Martius, grandson of Numa; Tarquinius Priscus; Servius Tullius; and Lucius Junius Brutus, who was the last king. And Annual Township Election.

To the qualified electors of the Township of Manchester, County of Washtenaw, State of Michigan: Notice is hereby given, that the next ensuing Biennial Spring Election and Annual Township Election will be held at the Village Hall within said township, on

Monday, April 4, A. D. 1921

For the purpose of voting for the election of the following officers, viz.: State—Two Justices of the Supreme Court, full term; one Justice of the Supreme Court, to fill vacancy (term expiring Dec. 31, 1923); two Regents of the University; one Superintendent of Public Instruction; one Member of the Board of Education; two Members State Board of Agriculture; one State Highway Commissioner.

Township—One Supervisor; one Township Clerk; one Township Treasurer; one Highway Commissioner; one Justice of the Peace, full term; one Member Board of Review; full term; Overseer of Highways; four Constables.

Propositions—Also for the purpose of voting upon the following propositions:

Proposed Amendment to the Constitution.

To amend Article 13 of the Constitution of the State of Michigan, by adding a section thereto, to stand as Section 20 and to read as follows:

Sec. 20. The State shall borrow not to exceed Thirty Million Dollars, pledge its faith and credit and issue its notes and bonds therefor, for the purpose of paying to each person who entered into the military, naval or marine forces of the United States between April sixth, nineteen hundred and seventeen, and November eleventh, nineteen hundred and eighteen, and served honorably therein, during the late World War and who was a resident of this State at the time of entering such service, the sum of fifteen dollars for each month or major fraction thereof, of such service, up to and including August first, nineteen hundred and nineteen, relative to Opening and Closing of the Polls.

Act No. 20, Public Act of 1919, Special Session.

Sec. 1. On the day of any election the polls shall be opened at seven o'clock in the forenoon, and shall be continued open until five o'clock in the afternoon and no longer. Provided, that in townships the board of inspectors of election may, in its discretion, open the polls at twelve o'clock noon, and in such case the township board in townships and the legislative body in cities and villages may, by resolution adopted 15 days prior to the election and published with the notice of election, provide that the polls shall be opened at six o'clock in the forenoon and may also provide that the polls shall be kept open not later than eight o'clock in the evening of the same day.

Twins and Quadruplets.

Once in a while one reads about a birth of quadruplets. Very rarely quadruplets are born, and there have even been instances of sextuplets. When four or more babies come into the world at a birth, almost never do more than three of them survive. A tendency to the production of twins is undoubtedly hereditary. It runs in families. A woman whose mother and grandmother have had twins may fairly be expected, if married, to have one or more pairs into the world. That curious anomaly, the armadillo, the armadillo, common in Texas and Mexico, nearly always produces four young at a birth; and the most remarkable thing about them is that they are "identical" quadruplets, i. e., produced by the splitting of a single fertilized cell. The phenomenon of splitting is known to occur only in the armadillo and in man. Identical human twins (produced by a single cell) are very exceptional, but not extremely rare. They are in effect duplicates of one individual, and might almost be said to share a common identity. Ordinary "fraternal" twins may be more or less alike, but identical twins resemble each other so closely that it is hard to tell them apart.

Improved Paint Spray Guns.

Painting or varnishing by the spray method has so clearly proved its advantages that improved tools for its use are of general interest. A spraying nozzle, of automatic-pistol form, now being made in Missouri, handles all kinds of liquid coatings, including heavy asphalt paint, with pressures of 50 pounds and less. One model is made to fit the top of an ordinary screw-top jar or metal container. Jars containing different colors may be interchanged in about 30 seconds, the nozzle being cleaned by blowing kerosene and air through it. This method covers up to 50 or 40 square feet of surface a minute, while a larger type arranged for connection to a special pressure tank covers as much as 85. An important feature is its easy adjustment from fine shading to heavy-flow coating—Popular Mechanics Magazine.

The "Drys" of Bombay.

Mohammedans in Bombay have started an anti-drinking campaign to "reform" their co-religionists. They are picketing the liquor shops and the Moslems coming out have their faces blacked and are marched through the streets. One man found drunk was decked with a "garland" of old shoes and was taken round the city by an escort bearing empty oil tins.—London Mail.

Corrugated Cardboard for Insulators.

Corrugated cardboard of the kind used for packing cases can be used for insulating buildings against the cold, such insulations being particularly desirable in barns and poultry houses. The boxes are opened along the joints and flattened out; the material being applied with short nails and tin washers, such as used for the application of roofing paper.

een Franklin, Detroit

Like many of us today, Franklin was no churchgoer, but he believed in the desirability of other people's attendance at public worship. In the goodness of his heart, however, he was desirous of making the Church of England's morning service less onerous to the faithful. So, while representing the Colonies in England, he proceeded to abridge the Book of Common Prayer. He was assisted in the task by an English clergyman, the once notorious Lord De Spencer.

The whole episode reminds us of the day when, as a small boy, he suggested to his astonished parent that much time and trouble might be saved if grace were said over the whole family pork-barrel at once.—Ann Don Dickinson in the New York Times.


