#### MANY BALLOTS SPLIT

Monday's Election Showed Voters Stood Not So Much for Party Lines as in Years Gone By.

"Split" seemed the watchword at the polls in Manchester on Monday To those who were watching the trend of affairs at the polls it early became evident that voters were not holding to party lines, but were taking pains to express their disapproval of the republican caucus which refused to renominate Frank Leeson for supervisor and George Sutton for

While giving no disapproval of J.
C. Matteson, the republican candidate
for supervisor, many voters admitted
the qualifications of the Democratic candidate, Albert Lowery, and decided to vote for him and thus put their stamp of disapproval, on the action of the caucus, which it is evident none outside of a very small chrole of voters anticipated. It is evident the same conditions held true in the case of the highway commis-sioner. With the defeat of two of their candidates, the Republicans may



#### OIL PUMP FIXED ON AUTOMOBILE ENGINE

Prevents Clogging and Burned-. Out Bearings.

Illustration Shows Plan for Arranging Force-Feed Oiling System at Small Expense-Operated by One of the Cams.

On an automobile engine which way iled by the "splash" system, it was found that the tube which conducted the oil from the flywheel to the front part of the engine became-ologged, and some burned-out bearings result ed. To prevent the recurrence of this accident, a pump was installed in the oil line and connected to be driven by the cam shaft, as shown in the sketch The upper part of the motor crank case, on the camshaft side, was drilled out and tapped opposite one of the ams, to take a brass tube, which was threaded with a standawl pipe thread This tube was reamed out to a snug fit for a small piece of shafting, which formed the plunger of the pump. Another piece of tubing was screwed onto the first at right angles, and to the ends of it, through two ball-check valves, were attached the oil leading to the crank case and to the bearings of the engine. 

#### LIVE STOCK NEWS

#### INCREASE LAMB PRODUCTION

Sheep Can Successfully Be Raised Without Danger of Stomach Worms or Other Parasites.

(Prepared by the L. S. Department of Agriculture.)

Specialized sleep farming, in which forage crops were used for the summer, pasture, and a study of the relation of autrition of ewes, at breeding time to the percentage of lambs produced were included in the experi-mental work conducted last year by the United States Department of Agriculture at the government farms at Beltsville, Md., and Middlebury, Vt. Data were obtained relative to the

comparative relish with which sheep ate different forage crops and the gains made while pasturing upon them. It was demonstrated that with the frequent foration, necessary in



pasturing forage crops, sheep could be successfully raised without danger of infestation by stomach worms or other internal parasites. Experiments in the last four years to test the effect of feed at breeding time upon the size of the lamb crop have shown an increase of 18.8 per cent of lambs produced by increased nutrition of ewes during mating season for both Beltsville and Middlebury. This is an increase of 25.9 per cent in the Belts ville flock and 8.55 per cent in the Middlebury flock.

In experiments with 120 Western ewes at the Middlebury farm to test the effect of running sheep in permanent pasture upon the growth of and the carrying capacity of the fields, it has been demonstrated that sheep are benefited in cleaning pastures of weeds, but that it must be accomplished gradually and should not be overemphasized as a reason for engaging in sheep raising.

#### NEW BREEDS OF LIVE STOCK

Columbia Sheep Are Particularly
Adapted to Range Conditions— New Type of Horse.

The United States Department of Agriculture is developing types of live stock believed to be more useful than some now represented by present breeds.

Range sheep breeding conducted in Clark county, Idaho, is resulting in a type which has become so fixed as to warrant its classification as a breed. These sheep, known as Columbia are particularly adapted to range conditions and are believed to be profitable both for mutton and wool production.

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

#### "PILGRIMS" ALL YOUNG MEN

Though We Are in the Habit of Speak ing of Them as "Fathers," They Were Youthful.

Among the contributions to the literature of the tercentennial of the landing of the "Pilgrim Fathers" is paper by Sir Arthur E. Shipley, maser of Christ's college, Cambridge, and vice chancellor of the university. In an editorial note introducing his article in the New York Times it is stated that he is well known as a zoologist, but why that qualifies him to write earnedly about our Pilgrim ancestors, evolution theory, is unrevealed in the note. We take it that the alleged "fathers" never claimed kinship with the anthropoids and that they looked much higher for information about their origin than to a noted zoologist. But, be that as it may, Sir Arthur does inject a new thought, while not tellthose valiant and earnest souls who embarked on the riny Mayflower—tiny in our eyes now, but not so consid-ered by them—and buffeted the Atlangoing to live in the tenant house on thic gales for two months in search of a land hospitable to them in the matter of religious freedom if not in climate.

When we speak of them as "fathers" men with long beards, venerable seniors bringing to the new world the wisdom of their ripe years and long experience in both the joy and the value of treading the narrow path, but it is illusion Sir Arthur, save years of age. That one was Captain Miles Standish, the valiant soldier, who was only thirty-six. They were allwhen the wonderful Spanish armada came to grief before the elements and the ships of Sir Francis Drake, and every last one of them was a loyal subject of King James and proud of that fact. They were young, vigorous, enterprising Englishmen; gennine colonists, seeking religious freedom but not political exile. It took men and women of such youthful vigor to endure the hardships and dangers incident to the first few years of their colonial life, Ever since that day it has been like young men and women who have ploneered the way across the country from the Atlantic to the Pacific taking with them the same spirit of attach ment to the home land while building homes in the new.
