STORY OF LOST CHEROKEES Part of Tribe Never Seen After Moving West of Mississippi.

Grove, Oklahoma ... The removal of a number of Cherokee Indians from Délaware county to the com-munity enterprise that the Kectoowah society of that tribe is founding wah society of that tribe is founding in Cherokee county, has served to recall here the story of the Lost Chrokees, a story that is included in all of the later day Indian histories, but in varying accounts. Old time Cherokees of this section have lately brought forth what they declare is the only true account of the Lost Cherokees ever given to the public.

It happened in 1838, the account runs, when the Cherokees living in

runs, when the Cherokees living in what is now called the Old South were persuaded to sell a portion of their land to white men. The proposal had been much discussed in the tribe and the final action of those who were not opposed to the white who were not opposed to the whites created an extreme bitterness among a faction that was opposed to disposing of the tribal property. Members of this faction prophesied that such a sale would be only the beginning of the white man's encroachment and argued that it would be ment and argued that it would be only a question of time when the In-dians would be robbed of all. Finally the faction opposed to the

rinary the faction opposed to the sale delivered an ultimatum that if the sale went through they would migrate west. The sale went through and the dissatisfied Cherokees, true to their word, started westward.

When the Mississippi river was reached the advocates of the sale, whe had followed the sale, who had followed the others, turned back to their homes and the other faction crossed the stream. That was the last seen of them. They were thereafter referred to as the Lost Cherokees.

WILD LEMONS IN PROFUSION

According to Traveler, They Are a Generous Gift of Nature to Island of Norfolk.

Lemmis grow wild all over the island of Norfolk, a British possession in the South Pacific seconding to Thomas J McMahon, in the Trans-Pacific Magazine. He writes that in every garden and paddock are clumps of trees ever bearing fruit in wonderful abundance and of a variety full of rich juice and with a rind most suitable for lemon pecl.

Little factories, family concerns, are dotted all over the islands. They are usually roughly constructed wooden buildings divided into three rooms There, with rather primitive matruments the women cut and source

the lemons in huge frames, and the skins are scaked in brine preparatory to making lemon peel. During the lemon season, which is most of the year, the boys and girls are engaged daily in nicking the fruit.

While there are only \$00 people on the island, it could comfortably and prosperously house 5,000 persons according to Mr. McMahon. The island is five miles long, three miles broad and contains \$,600 acres.

Finding Speed-Rates of Insects. Experts of the United States Department of Agriculture have just been carrying out some tests to discover the speed-rates of different species of flies. in a district of northern Texas 234.-000 flies of various species were powdered red chalk, and were then liberated. Fly-traps, baited with food especially relished by flies, were place at measured distances from the point of release. It was found that most flies would travel distances up to 1,000 feet in a few minutes. house-fly covered over six miles in less than 24 hours. The maximum distance traveled by it in these experiments was 13.14 miles.
