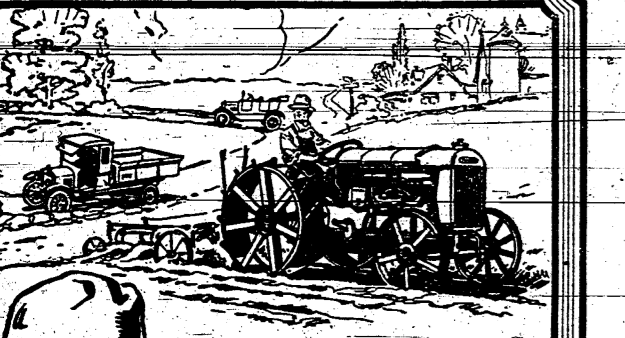

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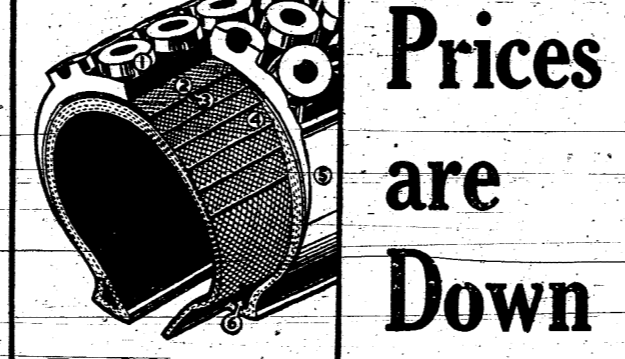

Island Prison of Emperor Napoleon Affected by Great Decrease in Visits by Ships. St. Helena, the island prison of Emperor Napoleon, is harder hit than at any time since the opening of the Suez canal. This is chiefly due to the great decrease in visits by ships. The failure of the flax industry, which was started with aid of a government grant after the war, is another cause of the slump. The population of St. Helena is a curious one. Many settlers came to the island in 1805. Others were originally slaves from Madagascar. The result is a colored race. The majority of the men are sailors. The climate is very beautiful, the trade winds being the most beneficial. Five-sixths of the island is barren owing to rapidly multiplying flocks of goats destroying the vegetation. There will not live on the island, and in consequence little fruit can be cultivated. 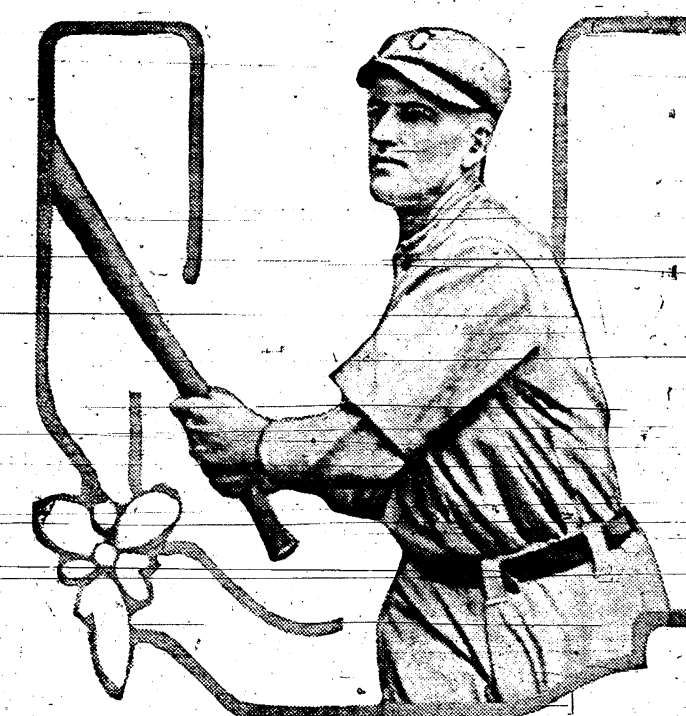

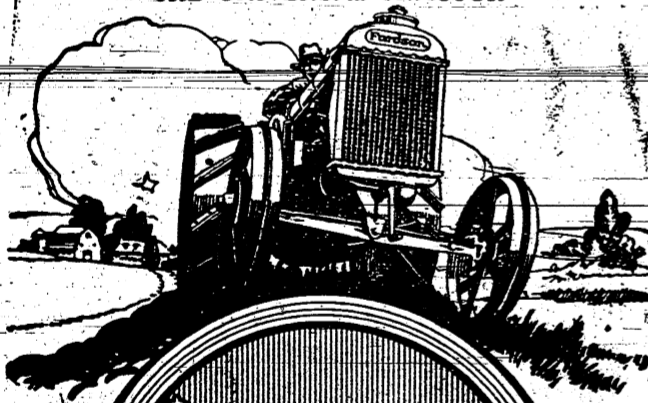

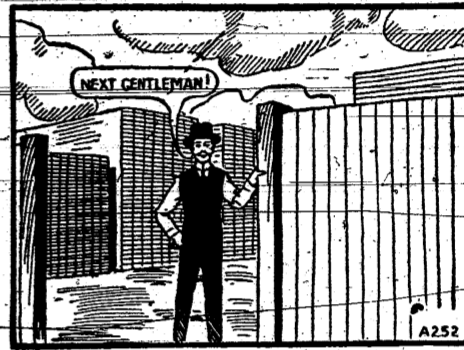
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
