FALL SEASON COOD TIME TO SEED LAWN

Winter Killing of Weeds Gives New Grass Better Chance, Says M. A. C. Man.

Fall is the best season of the year to seed a lawn, provided the work is done early enough to give the seed a chance to become developed suffia chance to become developed ciently to withstand freezing.

Lawns seeded at this time, be-tween Sept. 15 and the middle of October, are said to develop to better take advantage and with less for maintenance than spring seeded lawns. This is true because of the lawns. This is true because of the fact that any weed present in the mixture sown will germinate and the weeds will be destroyed during the winter months.

The soil should be well prepared to the depth of a foot or more, says Professor Halligan. It should then be thoroughly rolled. The surface of the soil should be raked finely to a depth of not more than an inch and the seed sown broadcast by hand and the seed sown broadcast by hand in such a manner as to insure uniform distribution. Select a day when the soil is moist and when there is little or no wind. After the seed is sown, the soil may be raked very lightly and thoroughly rolled.

Whenever lawns are to be developed under shade trees, such as maples and oaks, great care should

oped under shade trees, such as maples and oaks, great care should be used and the date of seeding should be made as early as possible in the fall. When seeded late in should be made as early as possible in the fall. When seeded late in the fall the gress is likely to be smothered where large trees drop their leaves if the leaves are not removed within a day or two after forming a mat.

Seed varieties used in the mix-ture to be sown should be adepted to soil and climatic conditions.

OLD FORM OF TELEGRAPHING HUNTERS AWAIT

Crude Method Employed by Ancient Peoples, but It Conveyed the Desired information.

tirely a product of modern science as many may suppose. It is tradition that Agamemnon telegraphed the fall of Troy to Greece by means of bouffres on the mountain tops. Although there may be much doubt as to whether this is not a mere legend, there can be no question that in the second century before Christ there was a system of telegraphing in Europe by which messages were sent from one place to another by means of fire, the words being spelled out letter by letter.

The letters of the alphabet were aranged in five columns, so that any letter could be designated by stating in what column it was contained and its number in that column. To convey this information to a distance two men, each having five torches, were stationed behind two barricades; the first, by holding up the necessary num-ber of torches, indicated the number of the column that contained the letter he was sending, and the second indicated similarly the actual numerical place of the letter in that column. It is evident that by a series of stations messages of any length could have been sent—say from Rome to Athena

- Denatured Alcohol.

Denatured alcohol is grain alcohol made unfit for use as Completely denatured alcohol is made by adding ten gallons of wood alcoho and a half gallon of benzine to 100 gallons of ethyl alcohol. This is free from government tax and may be bought by any one for use as fuel or

The denaturing must be done when the alcohol is produced and in bonder warehouses used exclusively for the purpose and for storing denatured al cohol, and is done under the supervi sion of the government, according to the law. The grain alcohol may be made from grain, corn, potstoes or similarly starchy products, but the conditions under which it must be produced make it impracticable except for well-equipped factories.

> Hunters in this section are anxiously awaiting Oct. 15th, the opening day for hunting rabbits and for squirrels, also partridge and wood-cock. They should have in mind that the shooting season for rabbits is from Oct. 15 to Dec. 31, inclusive. A total of seven may be taken by one-individual in one day, 25 in the season; not more than 10 may be had in possession at one time. It is unlawful to hunt with ferrets, except that farmers and fruit growers may use ferrets to hunt rabbits on their own lands on permit issued by John Baird, director of conservation,

Open season for fox squirrel is from Oct. 15 to 31, inclusive. Not over five may be taken in one day. 15 in the season; 10 may be had in possession at one time. It is unlawful to hunt and kill black and gray squirrels until 1924.

Open season on partridge (ruffied growse) is Oct. 15 to Nov. 20, inclusive. Five may be taken in one day; 25 in the season; 10 may be had in possession at one time.






