HOW TO MAKE POOR LAND PRODUCTIVE

Some Spots in Michigan as Unpro. ductive as the Desert of Sahara,

Prof. Carl O. Sauer of the U. of M. in a speech Friday before the National Convention of Geographers, at Ann Arbor sald: "A great part of America remains to be discovered right at our own doors." He used the state economic land survey made at Charlevoix to illustrate his point that much wealth thereof house. that much wealth through proper use of land may be discovered where it is believed the land is exhausted. The geographer can help by survey-ing and pointing out the uses to which poor land of particularly bar-

ren spots may be put, the professor stated, appealing for wider scope and greater service among the scientists. This reminds us of a piece of land of 160 acres up in Clair county in this state. The late Nicholas Van Derwerken owned it and the late Dr. Lynch came in passession of it. Lynch came in possession of it. Wilbur Short went up there after the doctor died to see what it was worth. He had no difficulty in locating it and found it barren of vegetation, a sand waste upon which nothing-whatever was growing. He asked a neighbor if the land was exhausted and the reply was, "Why, that land is just as God Almighty made it, just sand, and nothing ever grew on it."

There are several of those spots of land scattered here and there up in the northern part of the state and occasionally farther south. Per haps those geographers may be able to find use for that kind of starva-tion, if so, get busy.

One of the unique cities of the world is the city of Brunel, a couple of miles up the river of that name on the island of Borneo, known as the Venice of the East to dwellers of that land, but known not at all to the outside world.

It is built entirely on piles placed over the river, and stretches for a couple of miles on each side of the river. It is really a lot of little towns in one, with a population of 10,000 mostly Malays.

The respective trades are apportioned each to an area of their own; thus you go to one part of the town to see the metal workers and the merchants. Streets of bamboo the rows of dwellings. The city market is the only one of Its kind in the world, for all marketing is done in boats on a certain portion of the river set aside for the purpose. Here daily the people of the town meet the people from the jungle and exchange manufactured goods for fruit, vegetables and game.

AUTO ACCIDENT

Run Into by Passing Driver They · Escape With Minor Injuries Other Driver Is Killed.

Charles Burtless and Bert Marshall had a narrow escape from death when the automobile which Mr. Marshall was driving was run into on the road about 40 miles north of Bay City last Saturday by Ralph Denrich of that locality. Denrica was killed.

Messers Burtless and Marshall were on their way here from a visit to the Burtless ranch near Prescott and when on the road as above mentioned saw a small coupe approaching at a high rate of speed. As the oncoming car skidded on an fey spotsome distance away Marshall pulled his car to the extreme right side of the road, but as the coupe slid again it struck their car whiched shows it struck their car, whirled about and struck them head on into their side, the terrific impact pushing their car out of the road and doing much damage, though both cars were up-

The driver of the coupe was found dead in his seat with hands dropped to his sides, his skull and face hav-ing been crushed evidently by contact with the side of his car. Little is known of him except that he was evidently about 30 years of age and was a member of the Mennonite colony located not far from where the accident occurred. He never spoke after the fatal skid and it is not known where he was going or what was his idea in driving at reckless speed on a slippery road.

Information as to Respiration of Insect Said to Have Been Accurately Ascertained.

A scientist abroad has constructed delicate instrument that registers and measures the respiration of in-The apparatus is composed of a crystal tube with an aperture in the end. Imprisoned in this, the locust, in the effort to extricate itself, turns over, bringing his thorax immediately under a needle having a ball in the point. In this way, thanks to the ascending and descending movement of the needle working over a lever, the movements of the thorax are registered on a plate or metal leaf. It is thus possible to study attentively the quickness and the length of each breath of the insect and what is more important, the strength and action. By this means it has been as certained that insects respire in a anner directly the reverse of human beings. We are required to put the necessary strength into the inspiration, while expelling it is largely automatic. The locust, on the other hand, inhales automatically, but expels with more, trouble.

What Is "Sheffield Plate"? The process of welding silver plates on both sides of a copper sheet took the name of "Sheffield plate" from the English town. Electroplating superseded this practice, and today the term is used recklessly in the trade, for products of superior and inferior quality alike, because it conveys a suggestion of "quality" to the buyer in conference with the federal trade commission, have condemned this practice, defined the word as meaning "an article well plated on a base metal of nickel silver of not less than 10 per cent nickel content," and agreed to abide by this definition in their own business.
