Ancient Citadel of Athens.

The Acropolis of Athens was the ancient citadel of Athens, sometimes called Cecropia, from its reputed founder, the mythical Cecrops. It was built upon a rock 500 feet above the Atric plain. This eminence was 1,150 feet in length from east to west and 500 feet in width from north to south. and was accessible on the west side only, through the Propylaca or "Pn-trances" built by Pericles. Upon its summit were the world famous Parthenon, sacred to Minerva, the Temple of Wingless Victory, the Erechtheum, and other structures

Between the Parthenon and the Erechtheum stood the colossal figure-of Minerva, the protectress of the city, 70 feet in height.

Discovery in Sweden Proves That Arts of Civilization Are Older han Has Been Thought.

A cloak of woolen cloth, believed to be 3,000 years old, has been found in a peat bog in Sweden. The slightly acid water of the peat formation acted as a preservative

This is the oldest complete garment ever found in Europe, though the British museum has several bits of cloth that are considered still older. But 3,000 years is a fairly respectable age. When that cloth was woven, Homer's father or grandfather was a boy, playing in the streets of some Greek town. The Israelitish monarchy was not yet thought of-Saul, its first king, probably was not yet born. Egypt, rich but defenseless, was verging to decay; but the founding of Rome lay farther in the future than the landing of the Pilgrims now lies in the past. Through most of Europe, bronze, rather than iron, was the chosen metal.

Yet even in that mistily distant time, the northern barbarians either wove woolen cloaks for themselves or carried on trade enough to buy them from more advanced peoples.

A good many of the arts of civilization date farther back than our grandfathers dreamed, and were more

Visitor Asserts View From Summit of Andes is Such as Almost to Defy Description.

The view from the summit is magnificent in whichever direction one turns, but it is rather more interesting and varied toward the Pacific. That ocean is not over a hundred miles in a straight line from the crest of the divide, but all sight of it is cut off by the intervening summits. The scenery in this, or any other part of the Andes is on too vast and imposing a scale for a man to come to any adequate comprehension of it. Still more hopeless is the possibility of conveying any offective impression of it to others. You may think you can describe it until you try; then you find that you are but stringing meaningless adjectives and shopworn similes together.

At first you are inclined to be disappointed at your impotency; then you begin to feel small and ashamed that you should have presumed to attempt such a thing: finally, like a man covering up traces of guilt, you hasten to tear up and burn what you have written before some one comes and finds what you have been doing. There are some men who can draw better than others word-pictures of these great manifestations of nature, just as some men can paint better pictures on canvas than can others; but the best descriptions are only sounding brass and tinkling cymbal imitations of the un-speakable grandeur of the originals. THOSE REINDEER

"Our Dumb Animals," Published at Boston, Mass., We Clip the Following:

The several great tribes of natives who roam over a vast section of Arctic Siberia and Northwestern Asia, many thousands of miles from civilization, give their whole time to civilization, give their whole time to the raising and breeding of rein-deer, the motor power of the frozen north. In fact, these animals, be-sides being their sole source of food, clothing and transportation, play also an important part in their bur-ial rites and in all of their ceremon-ies. These nomads can neither read nor write; they have no money, and no government. All trade is and no government. All trade is carried on exclusively by barter. They live out their nomadic lives in their own way, wandering around with their reindeer herds and living in skip tents. in skin tents.

in skin tents.

The Siberian natives raise refudeer in immense numbers. They are the most successful breeders of them in the world. Their herds often number from 2,000 to 5,000 head, and all the time and energy of the herdsmen and their families are devoted to keeping these herds. are devoted to keeping these herds together. For at least nine months in the year the camp is changed every few days, for the herds are continually kept on the move in search of fresh pasture. Large herds especially have to move forward after a few hours, and actually keep moving the whole winter. The herdsmen drive the flocks before them and wander with them for the entire time without shelter, carrythem and wander with them for the entire time without shelter, carrying their spare clothing on their backs and living practically the same life as their animals. Reindeer cannot remain too long at one place, since the constant scraping of their hoofs hardens the snow, and thus makes difficult reaching the moss under it. They scrape the snow with the hoofs of their forefeet, the sharp rims and pointed ends of which penetrate even a very hard crust. Reindeer moss grows throughout the year, but if too much trampled upon, it will wither and throughout the year, but if too much trampled upon, it will wither and

trampled upon, it will wither and dry up.

If well pastured and not overworked, a trained, harnessed reindeer is swift and a pair can make 100 miles a day, provided the snow is thin and hard on the tundra. When tired, the deer must be given immediate rest. If compelled to when the tree the must be given immediate rest. If compelled to make further efforts to travel, they will become exhausted and often drop dead on the spot. The Shierian people also ride the reindeer the reindeer, same as we do the horse.
