



### JACKSON COUNTY

Jackson Masons are having an indoor carnival this week at their temple and will give away a Studebaker automobile.

Michigan Center, four miles east of Jackson, will soon have a fourth-class postoffice from which 400 rural route-patrons will be served.

Mrs. Ellenore Hardenburgh, who has been clerk and bookkeeper in the Anderson dry goods store in Tecumseh for many years, resigned and left Monday for Brooklyn, where she has accepted a position in the Culver-Parker store, having purchased an interest in the concern. St. John's, the first Masonic lodge in Jackson county, was started in Brooklyn in 1833. After a few years it was moved to Brooklyn and was quartered in the old stone tavern there until 1845 when it was returned to Brooklyn; but was disbanded when the grand lodge granted a charter to St. John's Lodge No. 3 at Jackson. Two years later that lodge surrendered its charter, but in about two months a new dispensation was granted and a charter issued in 1848, as Lodge No. 17. The order flourished and a few years later another lodge, No. 50, was started. Some of the prominent men of the growing city were members of one of the lodges. Now all the Masonic orders of the city are quartered in a fine temple on Cortland street.

## AMERICANS PAY FOR GOVERNMENT

### \$220 Paid by Each Worker in The United States for Government.

Washington, Feb. 15.—By computation by the National Budget committee, the cost of governing the United States is almost \$3,500,000,000 a year.

On the basis of 40,000,000 workers, whose gross income is \$80,000,000,000 a year, this means that the burden of government on every man and woman in business or profession is about 89¢ a year, or 2¢ a week. On the basis of 100,000,000 persons who are on the public payrolls in nation, states, cities, counties and other municipalities, would be about \$220 annually. If they should contribute labor instead of dollars, every worker would give as his or her share more than two weeks' labor every year. Every week every one of us would work approximately one day without pay as our contribution to the cost of preserving life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness under our intricate and far-flung system of government. These estimates are based on such official records as are available for 1921. These show the number of public servants in the United States to be not less than 2,000,000. In other words, we have working for us today in civil life and in the national defense, 20 times as many as the number of all the military forces we sent abroad during the World War. In the lists are more than 50,000 town and city firemen, 32,000 policemen, 115,000 guards, watchmen and doorknockers, 107,000 common laborers, 22,000 detectives and 10,000 sheriffs, 56,000 city and county inspectors of various kinds, 32,000 postmasters, 25,000 sailors, soldiers and marines, 2,500 life savers, and so on down to snake doctors and star gazers.

On the basis of five persons to a family, the cost of government is about \$400 a family a year. One person out of 20 is on the public payroll.

## ODD IDEAS CONCERNING RATS

### Belief That the Rodents Could Not Live in Certain Parts of Scotland—Witchcraft Symbols.

Many curious beliefs formerly prevailed in Scotland concerning the rat. One of the most common of these was that there were certain districts where rats could not live, and could not even be introduced. The old Scottish historian Hector Boece states that there were no rats to be found in his day in Buchan, while a later author, Sir Robert Gordon, made a similar statement regarding Sutherlandshire. He says: "If they come thither in ships from other parts, they die presently, how soon they do smell the air of that country." At the same time, according to a correspondent of the Sportsman, he asserts that rats abounded in the neighboring county of Caithness. Even so late as 1794 the belief prevailed. The writer of the articles on Morven and Roseneath in "The Statistical Account of Scotland," states that attempts were made to introduce the rat into these parishes, but without success. With regard to Roseneath, he says: "From a prevailing opinion that the soil of this parish is hostile to that animal, some years ago a West Indian planter actually carried out to Jamaica several casks of Roseneath earth, with a view to kill the rats that were destroying his sugar-canes. It is said this had not the desired effect, so we lose a valuable export." During the period of the witch-mania rats were looked upon as the symbols of witchcraft. That they could be exterminated by a course of rhyming was a belief common to both Scotland and Ireland, though more popular in the latter country than the former.

### Fall of the Roman Empire.

The fall of the Roman empire was in A. D. 476, when the western empire was finally extinguished by the deposition of Romulus Augustulus as emperor of the West, and the proclaiming of Odoacer as king of Italy. The later Roman or Eastern empire, with its capital at Byzantium (Constantinople), continued to exist for a thousand years longer. Its history may be divided into four periods: (1) That covering the struggle with Persia, ending in favor of the empire about 630 A. D.; (2) the struggle with the Saracens, who were practically crushed in the Eleventh century; (3) the wars with the Seljuk Turks in the Eleventh and Twelfth centuries; and (4) those with the Ottoman Turks in which the Roman power at last went down in 1453, when Mohammed captured Constantinople, and the last emperor, Constantine XI, was killed.—Literary Digest.

## MANCHESTER BOY ADVISES EMPLOYERS

### Preacher's Son Is Now Expert for Babson, Famous American Statistician.

George E. MacIwain, who attended the Manchester high school about 1886-7, when his father, Rev. MacIwain was pastor of the Methodist church, but who is now director of the human relations department of the Babson Statistical Institute, of Boston, addressed the Open Forum in the auditorium of the Northern high school, Woodward and Josephine avenues, Detroit, Sunday afternoon on "The Fundamentals of the Labor Situation."

Mr. MacIwain acts as adviser to some 4,000 of the principal industrial concerns of the country in matters pertaining to their relations with employes.

He says the best thing his clients can do for themselves and the country in the labor situation is to get off the Communist hunt, devote themselves to building up prosperity in business and to dealing fairly and squarely with their employes, contending that there is no time to waste just now in "Red hunting."

## NEW AUTO TAX LICENSE PROPOSED

### Secretary DeLand Would Use Weight Of Car for Horsepower For Basis.

Secretary of State DeLand would readjust the automobile license fees to a weight basis as a substitute for the pending gasoline tax, and Gov. Grosbeck is said to indorse it.

The DeLand plan would disregard horsepower entirely in computing license fees. Small cars would pay at the rate of 80 cents per hundredweight, up to 2,000 pounds. Above that the fee would be \$1 per hundredweight.

Mr. DeLand estimates his plan would increase from \$7,000,000 to \$12,000,000 the present annual revenue to the state in the automobile license fees. He would readjust the manner of distributing this, giving the county one-third of the total and permitting the state to keep two-thirds, or \$8,000,000, a sum he declares would be adequate to meet this year's highway budget needs.

### Plants That Select Homes.

One of the chief popular distinctions between vegetable and animal life is that the animals have power of choice and of voluntary motion, while vegetables and plants grow only mechanically. But the microscope seems to show that many vegetable forms can move as easily as can animals. There is a plant called volvox globator, so minute that millions of it could be put in a drinking glass, which is seen to whirl like a top across the field of the microscope. Some plants found in ponds, which are still more minute, move habitually, as with an apparent purpose. Naturalists who have given closer study than others to climbing plants state that these seem to exercise the liberty of choice. Their tendrils, in climbing over pieces of wood with holes, will try one hole after another until they find one that pleases them. One investigator saw a tendril withdraw itself after having pushed itself in a hole for 36 hours.

## AIDED THE DEPUTY SHERIFF

### Humorous Incident in Which "Gunman" Figured Prominently in Early Days of the West.

In his "When the West Was Young," Frederick R. Beckhold tells of the meeting in Cochise county, Arizona, between young Breckenridge, a sheriff's deputy, and Curly Bill, a gunman with a price on his head. The young deputy had been sent out to collect taxes in a rough region and he would admire to have Bill ride along to help him take care of the roll. We read:

"Curly Bill was a great deal slower at thinking than he was at drawing his gun, and there was much food for thought in that bold proposition."

"He gazed at young Breckenridge for some moments in silence. Gradually his lips relaxed. Smiling, he turned and addressed the occupants of the room."

"Boys," he cried, "line up."

"And when the line was formed before the bar he waved his hand."

"This here's the deputy sheriff, come to collect the taxes in our end of the county; and I aim to help him do the job up right."

Here seems to be one of the reasons why they speak of "rare old days" in the American incident.

### Perfect Platonic Friendship.

The friendship between the great artist, Michelangelo, and the Roman noblewoman, Vittoria Colonna, is one of the world's most illustrious examples of platonic friendship, says Oliver Barton in the Mentor Magazine. When they first met, Vittoria Colonna was forty-six and Michelangelo sixty. She became the greatest influence in the life of the fiery genius. They were accustomed to meet outside of the church of San Sisto, and discuss painting and life. The gist of these dialogues was set down by another artist and later published as Michelangelo's "Dialogues on Painting."

After withdrawing to the cloister the Marquessa Colonna continued to communicate with the master. A book of her sonnets was always with him. She died in 1547, but until his death he remained as devoted to her memory as he had been to her in life.

### Indian Legend of Rattlesnake.

A Texan reports killing a rattlesnake in west Texas that measured eight feet and had 24 rattles and a button. But in the winter of 1908-9, when the Kansas volunteer regiment joined General Sheridan's command, the roving soldiers discovered, in Wichita mountains, a den of rattlesnakes which tops the record.

After the soldiers had taken their souvenirs and had thrown a number of the reptiles into the creek and hush, 153 were counted. Several, without their heads and tails, measured eight feet and were six inches in diameter. The sun total was estimated at 200.

As usual, the Indians claimed that the den was a "medicine" den. An aged Arapahoe chief had entered it, to die, and had turned into a monster diamond-back, the father of all the snakes in that country.

Charles Ellis, a former resident of Clinton, died Sunday morning at Lansing. The remains were brought to Clinton for burial Tuesday afternoon.

Henry Jessor, aged 84 years, died at Tecumseh Sunday night of pneumonia. He was called "Dutch Henry" and had no relatives.

## MUSKEGON ADDS NEW STATE PARK

### Sand Dunes Along the Lake, Virgin Forest With Animal and Bird Life There.

Auto touring in our dear old state of Michigan is growing more and more popular. Good roads and good parking places are built. To drive up to Cheboygan on one side of the state and back on the other is the proper caper. The state has pushed the building of good roads—perhaps we had better say that each county has pushed it with state aid—and they have provided camping places along the route, some in cities and villages and some outside where water, wood for fires, tables and stoves, besides shelter from the sun and storms add to the comfort and pleasure of tourists.

Near Muskegon, on the Lake Michigan shore, is a tract of land, 555 acres in all, that may be added to the state park list, and Supt. Hoffmaster says that it is the largest and in many ways the finest of the parks acquired for the people since 1919. Of course Mackinac Island is larger, but Belle Isle at Detroit is not as large. This Muskegon park has a two-mile frontage on Lake Michigan and one mile on Muskegon lake, providing excellent fishing grounds on the latter.

Within its borders are some of the best examples of Michigan sand dunes that remain in the state. Except for a broad, white beach all of its acreage is covered with virgin timber. There is oak, beech, hemlock, maple, basswood, tamarack and cedar; some 80 per cent in fact of all the trees that are native to Michigan.

There are no marks of civilization anywhere in the park, save some winding and half obliterated log roads. Far in among the trees, where the sand dunes stop, heavy thickets begin. Here, it is reported, may be found cover after cover of quail, grouse and Monongian pheasants as well as rabbits and squirrels.

Who will be the first of our readers to visit this favored spot and report it to the Enterprise.
