GAS ENGINE HAS MANY TROUBLES

Like Every Other Piece of Delicate Machinery It Has Its Little Peculiarities.

AMATEUR DRIVER IS PUZZLED

Disarrangement of Ignition System Is Cause of Much Worry for Inexperienced Person-May Be Simply Loose Wire.

The gasoline engine in an automo bile, as a general thing, is reliable and as built at the present time gives excellent service, although like every other piece of machinery it has pe-cultarities and one of these which is sometimes annoying is that of unexpectedly stopping and refusing to start when at the same time there seems to be nothing wrong, at least as far as the amateur driver can dis-

In case an automobile engine does not run properly or stops, there are, in general. three places in which one may look for trouble. The first is in the ignition system, the second, carburetion and the third, mechanica trouble. An experienced driver can very often tell from the performance of the engine on stopping which of these three places causes the trouble.

Faulty Ignition System. If the engine stops suddenly the fault is likely to be in the ignition system. If, on the other hand, it simply begins to lose power and gradnally dies down or pops back through the carburetor several times before stopping, the trouble is likely to be in the carburetton system.

Trouble in the ignition system is complicated for an inexperienced peralthough many times it is due simply to a loose wire which may easily be located if you made some previous study of the ignition system and know something as to where the wires should be placed. Ordinarily, there should not be any loose ends, which means that if you find a loose wire hanging underneath the hood, it is disconnected and should be replaced on some binding post and if you have studied the position of the wires, you will be able to replace it and continue on your way. Usually, the posts loosen and the

trouble will occur before the wiles have entirely fallen away and by going over the various posts with your fingers, and seeing that they are tight will often locate the trouble.

If trouble is located in the gasoline system, first look in the tank to see that there is plenty of gasoline and if you find this all right, open the gas oline drain valve on the carburetor and allow the gasoline to run for a few seconds to see that it runs through freely. If there is no drain in the carburetor remove the gasoline pipe line from the carburetor and see if the gasoline runs through freely If it does not run it is possible that the shut-off valve at the tank has worked around and closed itself and, if not, it is possible that dirt has worked down into the bottom of the tank and plugged up the line.

The easiest way to clean this out emporarily is to blow back through that it can slip over the door along-

This remedy is only temporary as the dirt will sooner or later plug the line. Sticking of the valves, breaking of alve springs, the valve tappet adjust ments working loose, and out of adstment or actual breaking of some part of the engine, are things which fortunately seldom occur and they

can usually be repaired only by an experienced workman. Study Instruction Book.

"Study your instruction book and isk someone to help you on the parts you do not understand," is a phrase which has been used. It will save you a great deal of time, temper and money to know the general operating principles of your car, even though you do not wish to make repairs on it yourself.

Often small parts will work out of adjustment when you are a long way from help and a little knowledge at such times will save you a lot of an-noyance. Dig out your instruction ok and put in some studying.





PUBLICITY NEEDED

Chicago Expert Puts Her Resou Ahead of Other Cities in State

Wm. Clendenin of Chicago, called a municipal expert, speaking at a Chamber of Commerce smoker at Jackson, Friday evening, is quoted as saying:

"I know of no municipality in the United States, east or west, north or south, big or little, which combines so completely all the strategy of sound economic advantage without a weak link in the chain, as does this your own city of Jackson"

Continuing, the speaker said:
"Jackson is the home plate in the
baseball field of business. The greatest producing section in the world lies between the Rocky moun-tains, Alleghanies, Great Lakes and the Gulf. This is the bread basket of the world. And the handle of this basket is Michigan. Now look at the map and Jackson lies at the heart of this region. It stands at the apex of a magic triangle, Det roft at one corner, 75 miles east and straight on into eastern and New England markets; Toledo the other angle, 70 miles from Jackson, with ramifications in that direction. Jackson has an advantage over Detroit son has an advantage over Detroit and Toledo because straight south of you lies the line of the Cincinnat Northern railroad, which avoids all the congestion which is the curse of Detroit, Toledo and Chicago. Jack Detroit, Toledo and Chicago. Jackson from a congestion point of view
is the only free city in all this central territory. The Cincinnati Northern is Jackson's walking stick. It
avoids all congestion and crosses all
east and west lines except the Grand
Trunk of which you have a branch
yourself. yourself.

"Jackson alone of all competing cities in Michigan can ship her products direct to Milwaukee and thence into the great market of the west and southwest.

The speaker claimed that Jackson exceeds Lansing, Flint, Battle Creek Grand Rapids, Pontiac and Kalama-zoo in financial resources in prozoo in financial resources in pro-portion to population, adding "your industries are diversified. Imagine what would happen to one of these other cities if the peanut and alfalfa

other cities if the peanut and aifalfacrops should fail, or the auto give place to the flying machine."

Building of more houses was recommended immediately, and then Clendenin came to Jackson's advantage in rates of iron and steel.

"The rate from Pittsburgh to Chicago is 30.5 cents per hundred cago is 30.5 cents per hundred pounds. The rate to Jackson is 29 cents. From Pittsburgh to Flint the rate is 32 cents; to Kalamazoo 31 cents; Grand Rapids 34 cents; Lansing 32 cents; Pontiac 31 cents.

This lower rate on iron and steel is one of Jackskon's great advan-tages from the point of view of a manufacturer.

Rates on steam coal were shown to be lower in Jackson than to Kalamazoo, Battle Creek; Lansing, Flint, and other cities.
