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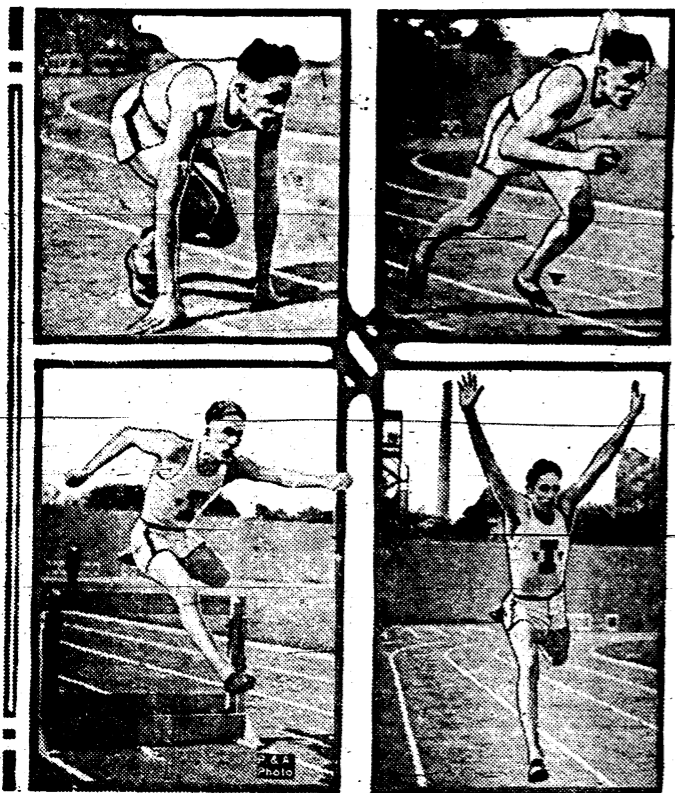
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BROOKINGS MAKING WORLD RECORD

This is not a record of total chances, but Bobby, when he handled nine assists perfectly, equaled the American league record in this respect, and his name will be in line with those of Terry Turner, Oscar Vitt and Buck Weaver, all of whom share in the honor. The best record in this line is held by Jerry Denny of old-time fame. On May 29, 1890, Jerry had 11 assists in a nine-inning game, and accepted them with ease and grace.

TY COBB REFUSES TO HEED TIME SUMMONS

Georgia Peach Not Yet in Bench Manager Class.

Tyrus Raymond Cobb, variously known as the "Peerless One" and "the Georgia Peach," is not yet in the bench manager class, despite his thirty-seven years and the thinning hairs on his head. Frequent predictions, first heard when he succeeded Hughie Jennings as manager of the Detroit Tigers two years ago, that he was through as a player, have failed of fulfillment. It is a different Cobb who guides the destinies of the 1923 Tigers from the player who flashed along the major league horizon in 1905, gaining its brilliancy and renown until in 1911 he became a .420 batter. The speed that gave Cobb a new major league record for stolen bases in 1915, with a total of 98, is waning, but in its place has come craftiness, and because he had so much speed to lose, he still is a great outfielder, still a dangerous man on the paths. At but, he is the same "Peach." His eye seems as clear as in his earlier days when he was the biggest of all pitchers in the league. He continues to meet the ball squarely and his facility of driving the ball out of reach of the fielders seems greater, if anything, than ever. From the start of this season he has had the "Tigers" among the league leaders. Close followers of the game have seen in Detroit the principal men, and to the New York Yankees in this season's race. Cobb's heavy artillery is conceded to be the equal of the New York club's "murderers row," and his pitching staff, considered the principal weakness of the club, has shown surprisingly well during the first month, the veteran Daus especially appearing near the peak of his form. Some critics see indications that Cobb may direct his club from the bench soon, in the acquisition of two slugging recruits. Fothergill and Manush, both of whom have been used effectively this year, but Cobb smiles and continues to take his stand in center field.

INTERESTING SPORT NOTES

More than 500 public tennis courts are laid out in the South Park system in Chicago. It must keep a pugilist in hot water trying to decide whether to be a heavy lightweight or a light heavyweight. Paul Kennedy, Lafayette, Ind., was elected 1924 track captain of Notre Dame. He has been a consistent 4:30 miler. In the Bronx park, New York city, which covers 4,000 acres, 250 acres are devoted to golf links. There are eighty-five tennis courts in the park system. A national fencing meeting is being organized in Spain, the winner of which will come to the United States to meet the victor of the American national fells championship. Midshipman Bob Mathews of the United States Naval academy, who is the intercollegiate boxing champion for 1922-23, is nearly six feet tall and weighs 200 pounds. To permit games to be played in the evenings, the municipal tennis courts of St. Louis, Mo., have been electrically lighted on spring, summer and autumn nights for three years. If you ask the reason for the great "craziness" of boxing, it is because the game has been cleaned up of a lot of shady promoters and shady boxers. The public wouldn't stand for fakery.

SEASONABLE SUGGESTIONS

To give variety and elegance to informal meals there is no better aid than a well-stocked shelf of jams, jellies and preserves. This is the time of the year when we fill our shelves. The following are a few suggestions in regard to the use of them:

Any pudding like rice, bread, left-over cake or plain custard, is richer and more tasty when dotted with bits of jam or jelly. Milk toast is delicious served with blackberry or loganberry jam or jelly. A firm jelly may be cut into squares to use in fruit salads, or to decorate cake frosting or ice cream. Jelly roll, jelly tarts, jelly doughnuts and jelly omelet are all easy to produce. Jams and jellies are good to serve on waffles or griddle cakes; piled with butter and jelly between, they may be cut like pie and served as desserts. Rhubarb jelly is particularly good with ham. Grape, currant, mint and pineapple jelly are served with meats. When serving game, a spoonful of currant jelly added to the gravy makes a delicious sauce. Tiny baking powder biscuits, opened and spread with butter, then with jam or jelly, make a tasty hot sandwich. Crush strawberries and mix with equal parts of sugar, stirring until the sugar is entirely dissolved, then can in tight cans and keep in a cool place. These may be used in winter for strawberry shortcake. If too sweet add a little sugar. Use rhubarb with various fruits—two parts of rhubarb to one of fruit such as strawberry, pineapple or raspberry, will make a delicious jam, with not only the flavor of the fruit, but with the increase in bulk which the rhubarb gives. Concentrate all your thoughts upon the work at hand. The sun's rays do not burn you, they are brought to a focus.—Alex. Balfour.

SUGGESTIONS AND RECIPES

Necessity being the mother of invention, the cook finding she had no sweet milk to pour over her slice of ham for baking, used a cupful of butter milk. Of course, when curdled, but when the baking was over the ham was deliciously flavored and tender. Potatoes were added and baked with the ham and the result was a purry, brown, well-seasoned potato.

Small dainty sandwiches spread with butter, marmalade and grated cheese and placed in the broiling oven to become brown on each side, are delicious for either tea time or a late supper, with hot chocolate or coffee.

Jungle Stew.—Soak one cupful of lima beans overnight in morning boiling water to cover and add salt when nearly cooked. Put a tablespoonful of butter in the frying pan and cook one large onion finely chopped; when the onion is brown add the beans with one-fourth of a can of tomatoes and one-fourth of a cupful of elbow macaroni. Simmer until the macaroni is done, season well and serve.

Dutch Pot Pie.—Cut into dice a half-pound of smoked ham, fry slowly until well-heated through, then add six potatoes sliced and three onions, also sliced. Cook for a few minutes, then add them to a kettle with three pints of boiling water. Cover with biscuits cut into squares and boil 20 minutes well covered. Parsley may be added if desired. Prepare the biscuit as usual, with either baking powder or soda and sour milk. A delicious biscuit (another discovery by necessity) made with butter milk and baking powder is especially delicious as dumplings.

Queen of Bread Pudding.—Take one pint of milk, one pint of bread crumbs, the yolks of two eggs, one cupful of sugar, a tablespoonful of melted butter, and one-half of a lemon to a cupful or less of powdered sugar. Beat the white of the eggs very stiff; add two tablespoonfuls of powdered sugar; cover the pudding with a layer of the sugar and lemon juice, then cover with the meringue and bake until brown. Serve with cream if desired. This may be served hot or cold.

Salsify Soup.—Scrape twelve good-sized roots of salsify and throw them at once into cold water. Cut into thin slices, cover with one quart of water and cook gently for an hour until tender. Add one quart of milk, two teaspoonfuls of salt, a few dashes of pepper and two tablespoonfuls of butter cut into bits. Turn into a tureen and serve with oyster crackers. For a more pronounced oyster flavor add a few pieces of soaked, shredded cod fish.

Reconstruct Famous Shrine

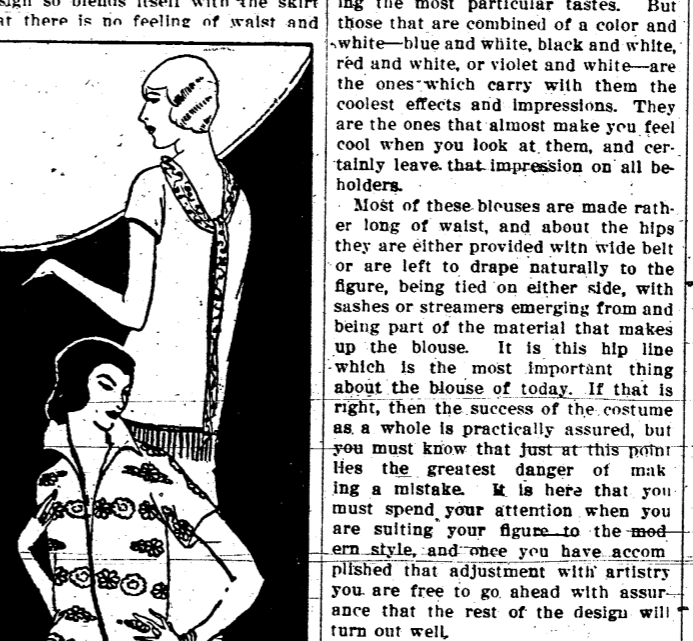

After a while you see that that same blouse would take on a totally different aspect if it were to have a brand-new skirt to accompany it; and so it goes quite indefinitely until after a while you find yourself the proud possessor of a wardrobe the extent of which you had never anticipated. You can at once see the economy of this scheme. Each separate expenditure amounts to nothing when compared to the outlay involved for a whole new gown or suit. And by the judicious placing of \$5 here and \$10 there, you can accumulate a collection of blouses and skirts that in the aggregate produces a worthy array. It's surprising, too, how many different sorts of figures can wear these separate blouses and skirts to advantage. If they are well composed, and thoughtfully arranged, they have the happy faculty of making each new combination conform to the demands of one's figure or social activities. Just now, of course, we are most interested in the strictly summer things.

Plaited blouses are all the rage. Some of them seem to be just plaited straight pieces of material that are put together at the shoulder lines, leaving the successions of plaitings to fall as they will. This makes the blouse very often they have no sleeves at all, but the generous width of the falls falls softly over the arms in lieu of sleeves and with a most attractive air, especially for warm-weather clothes. Plaited blouses with plain skirts are good, while on the other hand plaited skirts with plain blouses make quite an excellent combination. The knitted silk materials are being made into the most interesting sorts of blouses. The material, to begin with, is very heavy and lustrous. Then, it is woven often in tapestry effects, which look like a whole area of embroidery. These blouses are as new as can be, and very much to be desired for all sorts of outdoor wear. For instance, the little sleeveless jackets which fit over the more usual types of shirt waists and are worn for strictly sport occasions with strictly sport skirts. Then there are the little Jacquette coats which, for summer, are made in all sorts of new and interesting cotton materials that can easily take the place of blouses while, at the same time, they look enough of a cross between a coat and a blouse to be taken for either by those who do not draw fine lines of distinction when analyzing clothes.

Plaited Blouses Have Call

The variety of combinations of colors is perhaps the chief charm of these waist and skirt combinations, for you can have such vivid touches of color in this way that your love of color is peculiarly well satisfied, while no one would think of accusing you of being too gaudy in your dressing. Your skirt, for instance, may be dark, your blouse of a vivid hue—and then you can have a soft little black silk cape—a mere wreath of a thing—to wear over the gay color and to subdue it when that action seems necessary.

Sport Frocks Are Embroidered at Ends

Sport frocks for summer sport wear are of satin ribbon from seven to ten inches wide and are embroidered at ends in oriental designs, Japanese, Indian and Egyptian being especially favored. Whatever the design, it is carried out most effectively with very narrow plain or plisse ribbon. The plisse ribbon is particularly adapted to the stamped design as it is decorative in itself and gives the effect of shimmering without having to be shirred. It is not generally known that ribbons can be crumpled and that crumpled ribbons are found in most towns of any size where the operation of making ribbons waterproof is performed on piece-ribbon. For the woman who wants to appear well but sensibly dressed on rainy days the ribbon which has been crumpled will prove smart and economical.

Gay Colors Return

Colored cotton bedspreads are returning to favor. The gayly colored coverlet of olden days has its counterpart in the new season's production. Very brilliant patterns are seen on the bedspreads of cretonne which are now appearing in the shops. Masses of grape-colored flowers, wall-flowers and orange tinted foliage make a striking design on hand-block printed cretonne to be used as a bed coverlet.

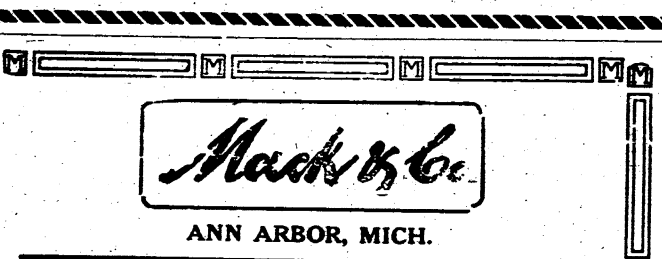
