It hasn't been as dry in many a day as at the present time. The level of the lake shows it and docks are high and dry.

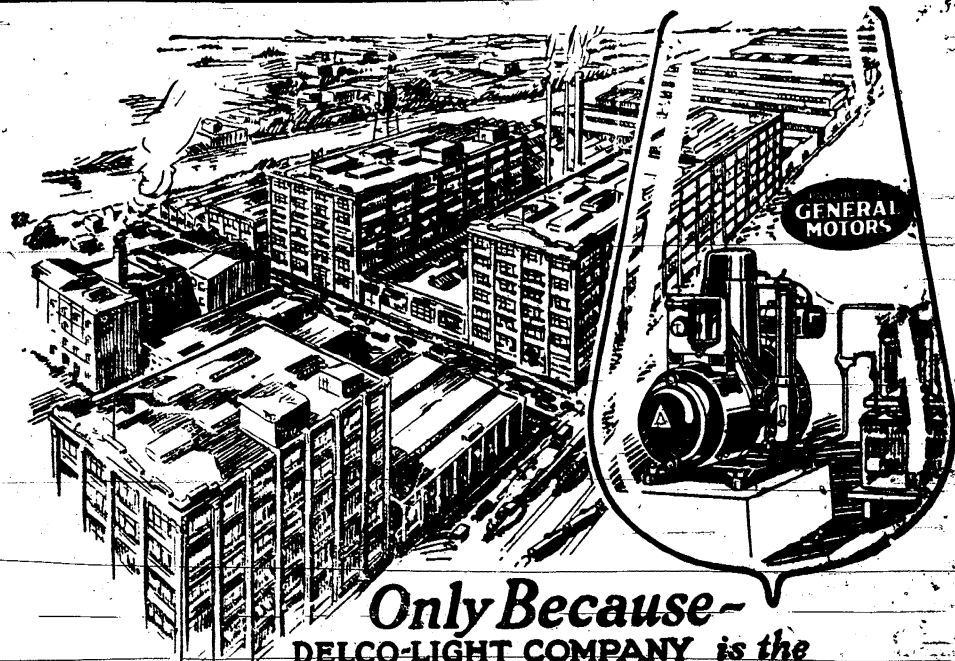
It is expected that work on the trunk line road over the Irish Hills next season will cause traffic to detour by way of Wampler lake, as well as by way of the Monroe pike.
