

Most people are aware that certain eaweeds are used for food. But the making of dyes from seaweed is a new discovery due to the war.

A beautiful green dye is obtained from a seaweed found on the Welsh coust, and stuff dyed with it was shown at a recent meeting of the Weish Industries association. A Japanese seaweed known as "Jug-

amo" provides a fiber which can be spun and woven exactly like cotton. The weed is first boiled in an alkaline solution, and afterward bleached. The weed being a comma one, the discovery may prove very valuable.


BIG TELESCOPE FOR RUSSIA

nstrument Manufactured in British Factory Weighs Nine Tons and Is 45 Feet Long.

In view of the present condition of Russia, it is rather surprising to find that the Soviet government has ordered a telescope which is one of the largest in the world. This telescope has just been completed in a British factory, and will shortly be transported to an observatory on the shores of the Black sea. It weighs about nine tons, and the inside length of the tube is 45 feet. Heavy as the telescope is. it is so admirably fitted that it can be moved by electrical means as easily as. if it were a small portable appafatus. The push-button system of control has been adopted, so that all operator has to do to the telescope to any part of the second telescope, almost as large as this, is being made at the same Brit ish factory for another observatory in Russia. So delicate is the work on Russia. these giant instruments that about three years are occupied in designing and constructing them.







## More for Your Money

Swapping things—as when our grandmothers traded eggs for calico at the cross-roads store -gives a better understanding of values. By measuring one thing against another we too can often judge values more clearly.

Coal and wages make up more than half the manufacturing cost of cement.

The chart above shows price fluctuations for portland cement, coal and wages during the past ten years. In each case 100 is used to represent 1913 figures, by the Government departments which compiled these statistics.

Translated into "eggs and calico" language, this chart shows that a ton of coal would buy nearly twice as much cement in 1922 as in 1913. A day's wages also would buy more cement in 1922 than in 1913. This means that even though coal and

wages make up more than half its manufacturing cost, cement is now relatively lower in price than either coal or wages. So, considering these increased costs, it is plain that in buying-cement you get more for your money than before.


