NEW FARM EXPLOSIVE

Sodatol Demonstrations in Lower Peninsula Counties Result in Orders From Farmers.

Sodatol the new war salvage farm explosive which has been made available to Michigan farmers through the land clearing department of the M. A. C. extension division, has proved—its value to farmers of the southern counties of the state in a series of demonstrations held during the last two weeks of October. by explosive experts headed by L. F. Livingston and A. J. McAdams, which took them into Kalamazoo and Jackson counties. Lifting rocks, stumps and other impedments from fields that were already under cultivation, and doing the work with a smoothness and ease which was a revelation to the crowds which attended the meetings, these demon strations have stirred up more interest in farm explosives than any other event of recent years in the

territory visited. Sodatol, which is the cheanest agricultural blasting material ever made available—for state farmers, was compared with former war salvage materials and with 40 per cent dynamite in the tests, and did as good work as the other materials in

all cases,
Jackson county farmers ordered between 6,500 and 7,000 pounds of the material during the three days of the demonstrations there, and a carload order is being made up now More demonstrations in the south-ern part of the state will be made next spring, and it is expected that hundreds of farmers will take ad-vantage of the cheap explosive during

Hundred Electric Railway Companies Now Are Using It to Supple-

The motor bus grows in use. There arė now, says Financial America about 100 electric railway companies motor buses. Flume Filled With Water Offers tains of Sierra Nevada.

. In the mountains of Sierra Nevada. the water chute, or flume, is used as a means of traveling from one spot to another. The flume is V-shaped and made of wood, It stands on wooden trestles, sometimes, where it crosses deep ravines, of immense height. A swift and strong current of water, chiefly used for floating logs and

in about an inch of water. Only one passenger is carried at a time, and he has to sit as far forward as possibel in order to tilt up the back of the little craft. In steep places the pace is great, quite twenty miles an

But when once it has started on its journey it cannot be stopped until it reaches its destina-tion. The sensation of rushing alone through space at such a speed is wonderful. Fight Fire With Steam. In the great oil fields of the West where the ever-present danger of fire baunts the drillers, steam has been found to be one of the most effective means of combating the flames. As a flash of lightning, a spark from a piece of metal, or a lighted match, may start a blaze that will result in the destruction of millions of dollars' worth of property, ceaseless guard is maintained over the wells. Nevertheless, fires are frequent and bat teries of steam bollers are kept in readiness to fight them, as water would only aid their spread. When a gusher turns into a volcano of liquid fire, it is surrounded by a sand em-bankment to catch the blazing oil; then huge boilers are brought up, and jets of live steam are turned into the heart of the flames, slowly smothering them.

The arctic bear is not an hibernating Nobody Seems to Know Where It Came From or Who Lighted It.

> Last Friday night the streets were almost deserted at 9:45 o'clock. The Riverside Confectionary, the drug stores and barber shops, Sloats' and the Candy Kitchen were about all the business places open. Two yellow taxicabs were seen coming from the west. One stopped near where the Welfare bandstand stood the past summer, the other crossed

the bridge. A man was seen to take something from the car that stopped and place was seen to take something it on the ground and in a few moments there was was a report from the east side of the river as loud as a cannon. Then those who were watching saw a flaming cross and the men with the cab departed, driv-

ing southward. The cross was about five feet high made of wood, the upright being about 2x2 inches and the base and braces of about 3-inch strips, all of new lumber and the workmanship was that of a mechanic, for the unburned remnants showed the joints were accureately sawed and well nailed. The cross had been covered with burlap and saturated with kero-

What it all meant can only be guessed but Saturday morning the affair was thoroughly discussed. It is said that one car at least had the license plate covered with cloth, but beneath could be seen a small plate reading "Jackson." Further than that nobody seems to know the whereabouts of the visitors.

A few minutes after the cross was lighted a small coupe came from the west, stopped nearby as though the driver were contemplating the thing then wheeled about and backed into it, toppling it over, and drove away. So the spectacle as a burning cross was of short duration.

"CARROLL OF CARROLLTON"

Was Last Survivor of the Fifty-Six Signers of the Declaration of Independence.

Charles Carroll of Carrollton, Md. was the last survivor of the 56 signers of the Declaration of Independence. He survived by six years all the other signers. He died in Baltimore, November 14, 1832, aged ninety-five years

To make certain his identity, he add-"of Carrollton" to his signature, thus distinguishing himself from another by using the name of his family

In 1775 Carroll became a member of the "committee on observation" at Annapolis, and in the same year was chosen member of the provincial convention. In 1776 he was one of the commission sent to Canada to per-suade Canada to join the war of tadependence. He was elected to the Con-tinental congress in 1775, and with the other members signed the Declaration of Independence August 2 of the following year.

After many more years of important public service to the state of Maryland and to the new republic, as drafter of the Marviand constitution, state senator, and a member of the Maryland and Virginia boundary commission, in 1804 he withdrew to private life at Carrollton, which was his patrimonial estate. There, as his life advanced, he became an object of universal veneration. July 4, 1828, he drove the spike that marked the beginning of American railroads. Detroit News.

SPRAYING IS NOT HARMFUL

There is No Danger if Proper Methods of Eradicating Pests Are Used. A good many people have asked the

"Will fruits and vegetables. which have been sprayed be dangerous

It can be said that if they use the methods recommanded for the differ ent pests by the Department of Agriculture and the experiment stations there will be no danger. Of course in some instances, simply because of heavy spraying or spraying late in the season, there may be comparatively large quantities of spray material stuck to the fruit and vegetables at harvest time, especially where such products are grown in a dry climate. When heavy coatings of spray mate rial are found, washing and wiping will remove much of this, usually almost all of it, and peeling will remove every bit.

Considerable fear has been expressed by some that spraying of fruits and vegetables might leave enough arsenate of lead or copper on the surface to be injurious to any one who might eat the fruit.

Right in this line experiments have been undertaken by the United States Department of Agriculture to determine whether there might be left on such fruits and vegetables which are sprayed enough chemicals of a polnous nature to be injurious.

Are Hiccups Rheumatism? That hiccups may be due to rhee matism is the contention of Dr. Martin J. Chevers, a member of the British Medical association and a well-known Manchester physician.

most obstinate case by a few doses of antirheumatic medicine," Doctor Chevers states in a letter to the British Medical Journal. He admits that morphine may relieve the spasms, but adds that it does not go to the root of the cure.

His suggestion is particularly timely in view of the reported "hiccup" epidemic in France, which, it has been suggested, must mean that "hiccups" are infectious. One of the cures used in France is to apply severe pressure to the eyeballs.
