SKELETONS FOUND IN IRISH HILLS

Steam Shovel on Trunk Line Road Digs Up Human Bones and Indian Relics

It is well known that what was known in the early days as a stage route between Detroit and Chicago was originally an Indian trail. Early settlers knew that, in fact saw In-dians traversing the route, and men and women yet living have often listened in fear and trembling to the recounting of exciting adventures with the red men.

It is probable that along that trail

the remains of many an Indian were buried. And it may also be pos-sible that the remains of white men

buried. And it may also be possible that the remains of white men and women were likewise buried in more or less secluded spots.

Some of them may be those unearthed by workmen in the Irish Hills district, about two miles east of Cambridge Junction, Saturday, Sunday and Monday. Indian relics also found would indicate that the benes wee those of Indians buried perhaps a century ago.

Leland Brighton, foreman of the steam shovel gang, made the first discovery. As the huge shovel arose from the ground he detected what his quick eye told him was a human bone on the shovel. Work was halted and two leg bones were found. This prompted a further search in the team's and within the space of a rod end-a half the skeletons of what might have been a woman, two children and six men were uncovered. As all were found facing the sunrise, known to be an Indian burial custom. the workmen were uncovered. As all were found facing the sunrise, known to be an Indian burial custom, the workmen came to the conclusion that they had indeed found an old Indian burial prace. But none of them were able to judge conclusively by the skulls; which were, however, well preserved, whether they were really those of Indians or white people. In one the teeth were said to be in almost perfect condition, showing the lustre of the ename!

to be in almost perfect condition, showing the lustre of the enamel. Relics found with the bodies would indicate they were Indians. There was a tomahawk, a stone hammer with oval shaped head, arrowheads, strings of beads, three metal kettles, two basins, one of wood and the other of metal, pewter table and tea spoons, a pipe of red clay and a bottle painted red and green. The bodies of the people had apparently been wrapped in blankets, as pieces of heavy material of different colors, and armulets of metal inscribed with holes where they had been attached to clothing were there.

The location of the find was near what was long known as the Allenfarm, later owned by Herbert Watkins, son of the late L. D. Watkins. The farm is now occupied by Sylvester Marr, and the bones and relice, can be seen at the residence by those who may be curious to look upon them. From the spot, looking south across Wolf lake, can be plainly seen a grove where several years ago were taken-up what were claimed to be the remains of Tecumseh, one of the famous chief-The location of the find was near Tecumsel, one of the famous chief-tains mentioned in history. They were shipped away to some museum, but no evidence was found to prove the claim. It had been sup-posed that Tecumseh was buried in

Etiquette of The Flag

Adopted at Washington, D. C., June 14, 1923, at a Conference of Representatives from 68 Patriotic Societies.

A Flag should be displayed only from sunrise to sunset, or between such hours as may be designated by proper authority. It should be displayed on national and state holidays and historic and special occasions. The Flag should always be hoisted briskly and

special occasions. The Flag should always be hoisted briskly and lowered slowly and ceremoniously.

2. When the Flag of the United States is displayed in a manner other than by being flown from a staff it should be displayed flat, whether indoors or out. When displayed either horizontally or vertically against the wall, the union should be uppermost and to the Flag's own right, i.e., to the observer's left. When displayed in a window it should be displayed the same way, that is, with the union or blue fled to the left of the observer in the street. When festoons, rosettes, or drapings of blue, white and red are desired, bunting should be used, but never the Flag.

3. When displayed over the middle of the street, as between buildings, the Flag of the United States should be suspended vertically with the union to the north in an east-and-west street or to the east in a north-and-south street.

4. When used on a speaker's platform, the Flag should be displayed above and behind the speaker. It should never be used to cover the speaker's desk nor to drape over the front of the platform. If flown from a staff it should be on the speaker's fight.

5. When flown at half staff position, but before lowering the Flag for the day it is raised again to the peak. On Memorial Day May 30th, the Flag is displayed at half staff from noon until sunset, for the Nation lives and the Flag is the symbol of the living Nation

6. Do not place any other flag or pennant above or to the right of the Flag of the United States.

7. Do not let the Flag of the United States touch the ground or trail in the water.

8. Remember that the Flag of the United States is never dirty.

9. No not place any object or emblem of any kind on or above the Flag of the United States.

10. Do not use the Flag as drapery in any form whatever. Use bunting of blue, white and red.

11. Do not drape the Flag over the hood, top, sides or back of a vehicle, or of a railroad train or boat, When the Flag is displayed on a motor car the staff should be affixed firmly to the chassis or clamped to the radiator cap.

12. Do not use the Flag as a portion of a costume or of an athletic uniform. Do not embroider it upon cushions or hand-kerchiefs or print it upon paper napkins or boxes.

13. Do not use the Flag in any form of advertising nor fasten an advertising sign to a pole to which the Flag of the United States is flying.

14. Bunting of the national colors should be used for covering the speaker's desk, draping the front of a platform and for decorating in general. Bunting should be arranged with the blue above, the white in the middle and the red helow.

15. During the ceremony of hoisting or lowering the Flag or when the Flag is passing in a parade or in review, all persons present should face the Flag, stand at attention and salute. Those present in uniform should remove the headdress with the right hand and hold it at the left shoulder. Women should salute by placing the right hand over the heart. The salute to the Flag in a moving column is rendered at the moment the Flag passes.

16. When the National Anthem is played those present in uniform should salute at the first note of the anthem, retaining this position until the last note of the anthem. When not in uniform, men should remove the headdress and hold it as in the salute to the Flag. Women should render the salute to the Flag when there is no Flag displayed, all should face towards the music.

It may be well to remember that the Flag represents the living country and is itself considered as a living thing. The Union of the Flag is the honor point: the right arm is the sword arm, and therefore, the point of danger and hence the place of honor.

WINTER PROTECTION * SHOULD OBEY FOR HONEY BEES

Is Absolutely Necessary to Give Proper Care If Bees Are to Be Vigorous in Spring.

It is perhaps about time to put hives of honey bees in the cellar, or in some building suitable, as cold weather is liable to visit this part of Michigan at any time after Thanks-

giving.

The honey makers do not hiber-The honey makers do not hibernate in winter like butterflies and wasps, but huddle together to maintain a temperature of about 57 degrees if possible. If the hives are to be left out doors they should have about 40 pounds of stores or be fed syrup made by boiling equal weights of suzar and water adding a smallof sugar and water, adding a small amount of weak acid, for 10 to 20 minutes, and feed it to the bees in the evening to lessen the danger of robbing

The hives in pairs or fours can be packed in dry goods boxes large enough to allow four inches of packing on the bottom, six inches on the sides and 12 inches on top of the hives. A case made of tar paper is also good.

GET IODINE IN SEA FOOD

Increased Consumption of Fish Will Lessen the Thyroid Disease, Doctors Claim.

According to a fisheries service bulletin of the Department of Agriculture, it has long been known that the functioning of the thyroid gland in man and animals is conditioned upon the presence of an adequate amount of iodine and that the lack of iodine is associated with disorders such as goiter, cretinism, etc. Iodine usually is administered in some form as a preventive of or treatment for thyroid enlargements, but as a general preventive of such troubles in a whole population it is recognized that some more generally applicable means must be found. Physiologists and physicians recently have called attention to the probability that sea foods might constitute an agreeable and convenient source of odine for the public at large. If so, it would be necessary only to encourage the consumption of sea foods to prevent the thyroid troubles referred

In order to supply exact information on this subject an investigation of the lodine content of sea foods has been undertaken in the fishery products laboratory of the bureau of fisheries. The iodine in oysters, clams, lobsters, etc., several important species of food fishes from salt water and fresh water, and those that pass part of their lives in salt water and part in fresh is being determined quantitatively. Dr. Donald K. Tressler is conducting the investigation, which is expected to continue for two or three months. At present the only precise information available on the subject deals with species of fish found in Europe.


relied upon to keep accurate time if the weather makes a sudden jump It will either gain or lose, and yo will wonder what is happening to it When the weather becomes norma again, the watch will behave properly Expensive watches are adjusted for temperatures varying between 35 de-grees and 95 degrees.

above freezing point. Its movement is observed very carefully, and adjusted from time to time, until the watch is going correctly.

The timekeeper is then moved from the cold chamber, and gradually heated in a specially constructed oven, the temperature of which is between 90 and 100 degrees. Here its internal arrangements are still carefully watched and adjusted from time to time. When the watch is going co rectly in this temperature, it is re-turned to the cold chamber for further

adjustment, if necessary. It spends about a week in each chamber, By the time a watch has passed the temperature tests, it will go correctly in any climate. Chronometers ordered specially by explorers and travelers who are going to places where great extremes of temperature are encount-ered undergo very searching tests to make them thoroughly reliable.—London Tit-Bits.


