#### TRAIN FOR TRADES NOT CLEAN HANDS

Only 10 Per Cent of Those Training For "White Collar!' Work Can Get It.

Secretary of Labor James J Davis told the National Society for Vocational Training, at Buffato: "Too much stress has been laid on the academic in the educational system academic in the educational system of the country Today we are realizing our mistake, for we find that we are tarning out 90 per cent of our youth equipped only for the so-called white collar occupations. Which can provide jobs for only 10 per cent of them. We cannot continue to keep America in the vanguard of civilization if we permit the American people to become exclusively a 'white collar' people.

The soundness of our whole economic structure—and our political institutions as well—depends upon the man who works with his hands.

Story of the Strenuous Exploring Ex pedition of Maj. S. H. Long Into Northwest.

The exploring expedition conducted by Maj. Stephen H. Long of the United States army took its departure from with the view of traversing the American territory in a northwesterly direction and returning by way of the great northern lakes, says the Franklin Gazette of October 27, 1823. The gentlemen composing the expedition accordingly proceeded by way of Wheeling, Fort Wayne, Chicago, Prairie du Chien and Fort St. Anthony to the source of the River St. Peter.

They then traveled over the valley of the River St. Peter to its junction with the Assiniboine, having ascertained, agreeably to their instructions the point at which the forty-ninth de gree of north latitude, the northern boundary of the United States, crosses that river. . Thus far they had gone by horses, but at this place they em barked on board bark canoes, in which they reached Lake Superior. Here they exchanged their canoes for a battear and, amid severe gales and storms with snow, proceeded to Mackinaw where they met a revenue cutter, which took them to Detroit. There they

Pursuing their journey they found passage on board of one of the New York canal packet boats at Rochester the customary route to Philadelphia. The tour extended to the fifty-firs degree of north latitude and embraced a circuit of more than 4,600 miles, upward of 3,000 of which were through a savage wilderness. #### **MOTOR VEHICLE** TAX PROBLEM

me Suggestions Given by County Engineer Bailey Worthy of . Consideration

A. R. Bailey, engineer and manager of the Washtenaw county road commission, gives his vews on "What shall motor vehicles pay for the use of improved roads?" It is agreed that there should be a way to det-ermine and to collect a sufficient amount to not only build, but to maintain them, just as the railroads must maintain their roadways. Now what amount of money should

he raised by law for that purpose and how much should motor vehicles pay. "Apparently," according to Mr. Bailey, "it is the intention of

hose in charge of our state highway program to use the motor vehicle fees for three purposes: for the maintenance of state trunk roads, for helping construct and reconstruct such roads, and to give a portion. now 50 per cent, to the counties for similar uses on county trunk roads." In order for legislators to arrive

at an intelligent conclusion the state highway department and the various counties must find out from past records and a study of the probable re-quire for the next three to five or ter years.

"The logical measure of the last fee is the amount of fuel consumed. Such a, charge makes every user of the highway pay mere nearly according to the wear he gives the road surface and certainly one who drives his car 5,000 miles should not pay as much as the person who goes 30,000 miles. Furthermore, in this way the man from Ohio, Indiana or any other state will while in Michigan pay something toward the service he is receiving from our road system. We do not believe in putting these fees or charges under the heading of taxes, for they are not. They represent the payment by the motor vehicle owner for the service rendered him by the improved highway "The logical measure of the last dered him by the improved highway the same as the passenger pays to the railroad a fare for the service he

receives from the railway.

"There recently has been discussed by the League of Municipalities in Michigan, the question of the cities and villages receiving a portion of the motor vehicle fees for use in maintaining city street." maintaining city streets. There is certainly some merit in their demand, for we all know that in nearly all the villages and in some of the smaller cities the maintenance of street surfaces is poorly managed. It is suggested that all streets that connect the improved connect the im connect the improved county roads with the business sections of the city be turned over to the county road commissioners for maintenance as a part of the regular county system. Such procedure would give the traveier a continuous good road from the center of one village or city to as imilar location in the next."

### F. G. LEESON TO BE **NEW POSTMASTER**

Congressman Earl C. Michener Rec commends Appointment of Frank G. Leeson.

Following a friendly contest be-tween Frank G. Leeson, farmer, and ex-supervisor of Manchester town-ship, and Miss Marian S. Farrell, an empleye in the postoffice here for many years, Congressman Michener has recommended the appointment many years, Congressman Michener has recommended the appointment of Frank G. Leeson to succeed the present incumbent, Frank Koebbe.
Mr. Michener in a letter to the Enterprise giving first news of the

appointment says: "The list of oli gibles furnished me, in the order named, is as follows: First—Frank G. Leeson. Second—Marian S. Far-

"The Civil Service Commission deermined the rating of the above candidates by a written examination and by confidential vouchers sent out to leading patrons of the office and ousiness houses, inquiring as to the fitness and qualifications of the can-

"I have nothing to do with the matter up to this time and am now asked by the Post Office department." asked by the Post Office department to recommend from this list the appointment of a postmaster. If no recommendation is made by the congressman from the list, then number one on the list is appointed by the Post Office department.

"I have therefole, this day (Dec. 17th) recommended the appointment of Frank G. Leeson, the first on the list, and in due season this recommendation, I believe, will be confirmed.

"Manchester was fortunate in having two candidates, either of whom, in my judgment, would have made an efficient postmaster, and I trust that the people will appreciate that both of the candidates could not win and not win, and that my recommendation in this case follows the recommendation of the Civil Service Commission. I might say that the community has shown much interest in this contest, but it has been a friendly contest and I have yet to friendly contest and I have yet to hear a word spoken disparagingly of either candidate. All seemed to agree that either was capable, but, of course, each candidate had his or her respective friends. There has been no mud-slinging, although, as is oftimes the case, numerous peois ofttimes the case, numerous peo-ple have endorsed both candidates, but concurring in the recommenda-lion of the Civil Service Commission I can only say that I regret that there are not two postoffices in Man-chester at this time."

Postmaster Koebbe's term expires Ian 26th and if the new appointment is propally confirmed by President Coolidge, Manchester may have a new postmaster next month.

Too Many Secret Treaties.

In the midst of a lively tilt in the chamber of deputies at Paris, Premier Poincaire reversed that Eng-land and France had a secret mili-tary treaty before the war. Deputy Claussat declared that if the treaty had been made public Germany would not have declared war. Premier Poincaire replied that he personally wrote the king of England urging a public announcement of the treaty but was refused.

Damage Done by One Bush. A special study to determine the extent of infection and loss from a single bush was made by one of the state leaders of barberry eradication, says the Scientific American. The outbreak of stem rust which started from a bush traveled in one direction, at least, for about five miles. The total wheat area affected on 18 different farms was 263 acres. The average yield for that year was only 37 per cent of what it would have been without the black stem rust, or a total loss in yield of 12,250 bushels. At a dollar a bushel the combined money loss from this single bush in this one direction was \$12,250, of an average loss to each farmer of \$696 worth of wheat. A barberry bush with a \$10,000 potential damage possi-bility can be destroyed with fen pounds of salt or an hour's work with grub hoe. -

The months, together with the chilly nights, America's Lavorite take more out of animals than months of feeding will restore. This is particularly true of brood mares that are low in condition and of the young colts.

They should be stabled every night from now on, and should be sed a small feed before being turned out in the morning to fill up with cold or frozen, grass, which is very ligble to chill and even stop the work of digestion. It never pays to let mares and colts stand around shivering during the cold autumn nights and then attempt to make up by extra feed during the win-ter. Protect the mares and keep the colt growing, if results are wanted.




