The name of no person but an Actual Resident of the Township at time of said registration, and entitied under the Constitution, affecting such resident to vote at the next election, abab be entered in the registration book.

Section 2796, Compiled Laws—All the provisions relative to registration in Townships and Cities shall apply and be in force as to Registration in Townships.
