NEWS ABOUT OUR BOYS IN SERVICE

The following letter was recently received from Lloyd Smith by his mother Mrs. Edwin Schabel: "Mattersell, Germany, May 25—It is getting harder to write as the days go by. There just isn't anything new happening. In fact there isn't anything happening. I wish there was but I haven't seen or heard about them.

Boy, I had a great time this afternoon. I laid down after dinner and went to sleep and had a dream—talk about sweet dreams. I had one for good and did go to work getting my civvie together. I kind of felt foolish when I woke up with my civvies on though. It might be not so far off, who knows, maybe it will happen.

I set out the rice and quiet out where you are now. I don't know. We have all kinds of traffic here, many cars going to the coast, civilian motor pool trucks hauling potatoes, and we have laborer's board; hundreds of them not thousands straggling by day in and day out, on foot, hauling little two-wheeled carts loaded with overflows—others are riding bicycles sometimes with little trailers on both sides.

There's some Czechs close by here. They tell us different stories of how the Germans treated them—gave them beatings, didn't feed them half the time but forced them to eat salt or mud. They said the Russian prisoners were kept penned up in an enclosure of barbed wire and had a barracks about as big as the barnyard of the place we stay in now. The Russian guard dogs were kept Old Joe, the policeman, is having very tight and gets the black out boards upon the windows. We told him the war was over and he made motions like aiming a gun and said "Civil", meaning the guerrillas, so we don't kid him any more. I suppose the civilians aren't overjoyed about the situation, but nuts to them.

We got tired of checking pass-ports and ex-Nazi soldiers going by with discharge papers in their pockets, going home, and we have on account of the dirty so and so.

Well, Mom, no mail today but get some tomorrow. Hope, Well, I could be in a worse place than here so I better not complain but cause after all I've had a lot of good breaks, and probably a lot more of them coming that I don't know about yet.

Carl Trenz is rewriting or rather copying a poem that somebody found of a soldier in Italy and sent to him. It was probably very hard to the poor fellow. He most likely wrote it while sweating out a big push. They do sweat them out too with plenty of prayers. But it's not all the feeling a poor man being being could write in a poem.

Private James Day of New York found the poem on the body of the soldier who presumably wrote it. Up to now he hasn't been identified.

So so long, your son Lloyd.

I sure had a swell day today—met one of the town boys and he sure treated me swell. He was some other than Bobby Clark, and he really looks swell and a little tired as all our boys are but he and myself are feeling good and getting plenty to eat and plenty of sleep, so we don't have much complaining to do. We talked about an hour and we talked about how many points we had to get out. I have enough but Joe doesn't. PRODUCE QUANTITY MAY

Tests conducted at the Wyoming experiment station indicates that the maximum yield of digestible nutrients of hay is dependent upon the stage at which it is cut. Alfalfa should be cut when one-third in bloom. Timothy and grass hays should be cut when the plant is in full bloom. Leaves of grass or alfalfa hay carry the heaviest portion of nutrients so every attempt should be made to harvest hay when it will retain the leaves.

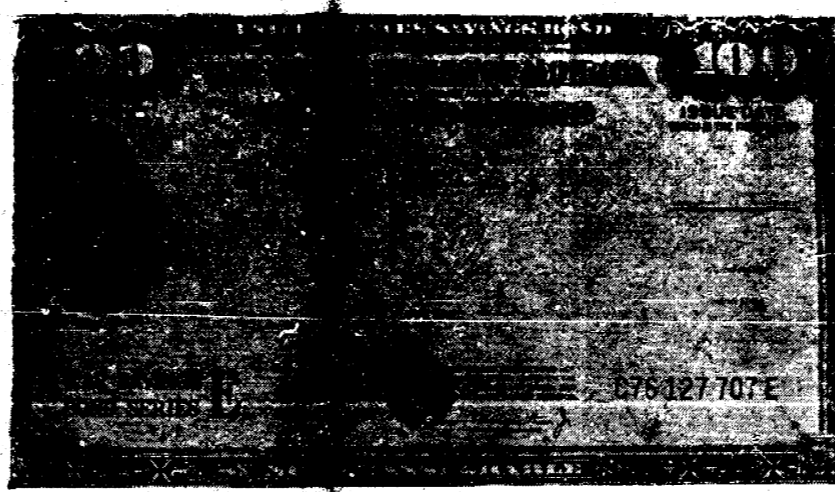

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STATE WAR WORKERS RETURN TO HOMES

The homeward return of Michigan war workers to small towns and rural communities is now under way.

Announcement of the closing June 15 of the boom-time Willow Run bomber plant, owned by the federal government and operated by Ford Motor company, is one of numerous signs in the window that the army is continuing its policy of creating huge stockpiles of surplus war goods on the military theory that war are won by surpluses and lost by deficits.

VE Day was a signal to the public for a reduction in spending. As Louis M. Nims, state revenue commissioner phrased it, "The pinch is on" sales tax collections dropped approximately in May.

Thus the war boom has started to debate. And with it, the tide of population will be reversed—back to the small of which the state war bond, may we count on you.

A realistic picture of what's ahead for Michigan was given a few days ago by C. O. Carlson, vice president of the Motor Wheel Corporation, Lansing, and chairman of the Michigan Committee for economic development, to the members of the Michigan state planning commission of which Dr. Eugene B. Elliott is the chairman and Don Weeks the director.

Cancellations by July 1 will total only 10 per cent, he emphasized. By September 1, however, 120,000 layoffs in Detroit alone may be expected. Not until the end of 1946 when a third 100,000 war workers are due to let off will an employment condition exist in Michigan, he predicted.

Where are these war workers going?

A recent survey at Willow Run revealed 14 per cent of workers had disappeared from the area within two weeks. They had about employment with the government demanding that the job was temporary, for war purposes only. Family savings in many instances were substantial—hands to war bonds and savings stamps. Many workers were returning to their former homes in Michigan and other states—Kentucky, Tennessee, Arkansas, Missouri, and other states.

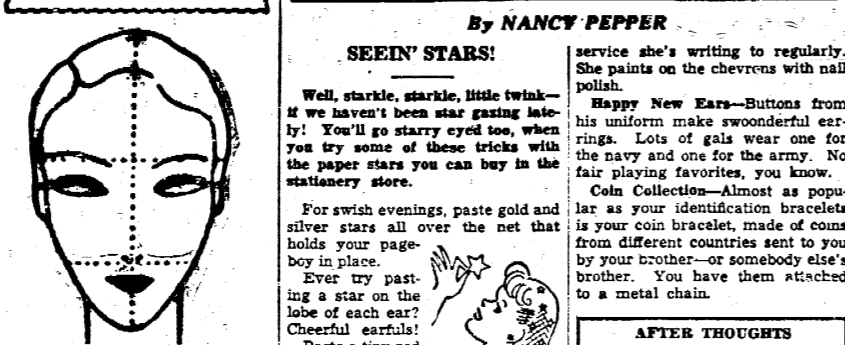

WASHINGTON, D. C.—Existence of a new, "secret" "chemical torpedo" in the navy's arsenal has been officially disclosed, but requests for further information on the weapon result in no information from the navy except that the subject is "secret."



GERMAN PRISON LABOR

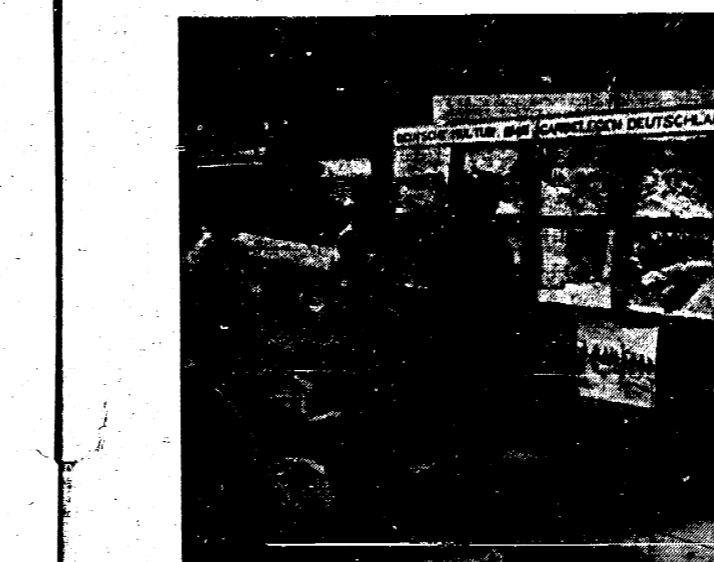

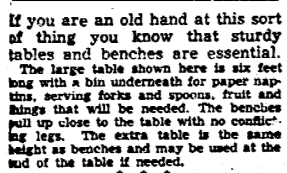

Agriculture In the News W. J. BREYER

Next to ask, the world's most valuable seasoning is the onion. It has come to be recognized as a leading "seasoning."

Send Onions A new hybrid has been produced in California which yields 25 tons to the acre.

In 1897, John Gerard reported that onions were good against the biting of a mad dog, for cold, bites, to grow hair, for burns or gun wounds. He also said it caused headaches, weakened the eyes, dulled the senses and provoked oversleep.

The volatile oil of onion has been found by Russian scientists to contain a bacteria-killing substance. Onion paste is being used in Russia to heal wounds and guard against infections.

Dehydrated onions have proven a most important item for overseas shipping. French dried onions seasonings to become more popular as the supply of odorless onions becomes larger.

Feed Needed by Cows In planning the dairy cows requirement, two tons of good quality legume or mixed legume hay should be harvested per cow, or one ton of good quality legume hay or mixed legume roughage, and three tons of silage per cow.

Twenty bushels of corn and 20 bushels of oats should be harvested for each cow. In addition five bushels of soybeans, when silage is provided, or 2 1/2 bushels where silage is not available.
