## NEW YEAR BRINGS POLITICAL MURNURINGS

Mayor Edward Jeffries of Detroit expects to succeed Harry F. Kelly as governor of Michigan. Victor over a U. S. O. endorsed ticket at two successive mayoralty elections in the Motor City. Jeffries is confident that he possesses ballot strength among voters of Detroit which would contribute materially to the state-wide political chances in 1946. The U. S. O. has been in the Democratic camp for several years, dating back to the era of Murray D. Van Wagner at Lansing. Jeffries received support from the American Federation of Labor, thus splitting the labor ranks.

If Jeffries meets the pleas of his friends and loses the proverbial chapeau into the G. O. P. ring, as now appears to be imminent, the entry would introduce a number of interesting new factors into the state political picture. In the first place, he would oppose Lieut. Governor Vernon J. Brown for the Republican nomination. Brown has the solid support of the Kelly administration, and his candidacy for lieutenant governor in opposition to Dr. Eugene B. Keyes of Dearborn is regarded by many observers as having been contingent upon an open understanding that he would be a candidate for governor in 1946.

Kelly announced last July that he would not aspire to succeed himself. The decision followed the governor's conference at Mackinac Island, attended by many Republican leaders.

Kelly and Jeffries clashed last week at Lansing over the thorny issue of state aid to distressed municipalities. While Jeffries insisted that the critics be given financial relief through a cut of the state surplus, Kelly maintained the state aid should be given priority for state funds and that the city bonds were being provided for under the legislature's compromise enactment of higher liquor taxes.

Kelly has relied upon the Republican votes in upstate counties rather than any plurality possible in Detroit and Wayne county, as a practical formula necessary to achieve victory at the ballot box. In fact, the Democratic party has been repeatedly in the city mayoralty contests since the state's reapportionment of getting the normal G. O. P. strength in the upstate area in Wayne county and to territory. Thus he expects to achieve this by his program of educational, public and for Detroit and Wayne county plus the public reaction to U. S. O. camp of Michigan automobile plants.

He also counts on a continuation of the American Federation of Labor endorsement which has led to a long way toward Republican tickets in recent campaigns. In fact, some unemployment benefits and modernization of the workmen's compensation act were made possible by the AF of L contribution to the Republican ticket.

## MANY YEARS MUST RECEIVE PRIORITY BEFORE FINANCIAL RELIEF GRANTED TO MICHIGAN MUNICIPALITIES

Based upon an estimate made by Auditor General John D. Ferguson, Governor Kelly forecasts that Michigan will have a treasury surplus of \$27,500,000 by July 1, 1946.

Present building needs of the state's educational institutions and hospitals far exceed this amount. With the needs for the University of Michigan, the State Normal School and a new supreme court building, the total will easily approach \$40,000,000.

To Jeffries' plea for more state aid to Detroit, Governor Kelly retorted: "Well, you were re-elected by the people of Detroit to take care of their problems and I was elected by the people of Michigan."

## STATE TAX COLLECTIONS SHOW WARTIME INCREASE

Collectors from state excise taxes on motor fuel, general sales, alcoholic beverages and tobacco were 22.1 per cent higher in 1944 than in 1943 on a state-wide basis, 1944 receipts from the four major excises were higher in 31 states than in 1943, while in 17 states collections from these periods declined.

Largest percentage increases over the 1943-year period occurred in Washington, 83.3 per cent, and Colorado, 48.4 per cent, whereas the sharpest decreases were noted in Vermont, 23 per cent; New Hampshire, 26 per cent; and New York, 18.4 per cent.

## CONTINUED STRIKES MAY INJURE LABOR'S CAUSE

THE WAVE OF STRIKES is upsetting the economic apple cart of the nation at a critical time. Directly or indirectly every community is affected. Regardless of what merits their demands may have, strikers are injuring themselves with their own weapon. If it goes so far that the government would interfere by nationalizing industry, for those who are striking to "make America great again" it would be a disaster.

The public generally feels the demands were too drastic and the public will resent any interference with reconstruction, and the supply of peacetime commodities we must have if we are to escape disastrous inflation. In the end public opinion will decide, unless we should have a runaway congress that nationalizes industry. In either case the union stand to lose, if not by their own weapon, the strike, called at an inopportune time.

## WATER BOARDS PROVIDE EXAMPLE OF FORESTRY

Some of the best examples of forest management in this country are to be found on areas under the control of the water boards. The public is willing to spend money freely for the protection of its drinking water and more and more water boards are employing foresters as regular members of their staffs.

All of the arguments for forests in relation to water apply to these areas. These water commissioners have the best opportunity of all of our public agencies to really show what can be done through forest management. They are not hampered by lack of funds and they can carry out experiments that would be difficult on other publicly owned forests. Some of our water boards in New England have had forest work plans for more than a quarter of a century and in a few places they are now cutting savings from the plantations made when the lands were first acquired.

It is common practice for the water board to supply the water department with fuelwood each year through improvement cutting. The needs of the city for lumber for fence posts and other building are also met. Thus profits from the forest products reduce the cost of water to the citizens and at the same time are cutting savings from the tax bill. There are certain cities, such as Seattle, Wash., and Springfield, Mass., where the water boards are located on high land and the water is utilized for power before it is turned into the mains.

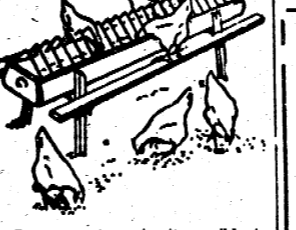
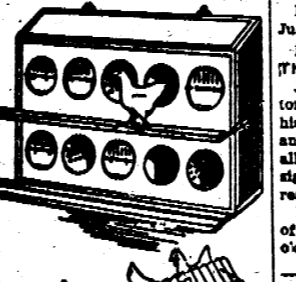
**Tire-Tube Method Of Post Treatment**

**Life of Fence Posts**  
Fence posts of non-durable wood can be made to have 20 to 30 years of life, or even more, by the simple method of tire-tube treating. By this method the bark is peeled for a distance of 4 to 6 inches from the large end of the post, to provide a smooth, clean surface.



A section of old inner tube about two feet long is slipped over the peeled surface and bound in place. The post is then laid on a rack with the large end about two feet or more higher than the small end. In a short time the preservative, contained in the tube, will begin to flow into the sapwood of the post, forcing the natural sap out at the small end. When all the preservative has flowed from the tire tube into the wood, the tube is removed and the post taken from the rack. The length of time required for the preservative to flow will depend upon quantity used, condition of wood, season, and other factors, and will vary from 8 to 24 hours. The preservative can be either creosote or mixture of creosote with other suitable oils.
