FURTHER DISCUSSION OF LOCAL SCHOOL

At the invitation of the school board, citizens of Manchester met at the high school February 23 to discuss the school board's request for a special five mill levy for five years, beginning in 1945 and continuing through 1949.

The special tax being requested for two purposes: first, to avoid an operating deficit in 1945-46 and, possibly, the following year; and secondly, to begin laying aside a fund for the postwar improvement of the school building. For the benefit of those unfamiliar with local valuations, a covenant tax will amount to \$1,000 in School District No. 2, which includes the village of Manchester. Two million or two thousand dollars are being asked for running expenses for the next year or two, or as war conditions demand. Three million or three thousand dollars for five years will be collected for the building fund.

Discussion at the meeting made clear the ways in which the war has increased school expenses, and at the same time, reduced school income. In response to questions by Herbert Upton of Double A Products Co., the head of the school's operating fund for the past few years was shown as follows:

An operating fund of about \$9000 is necessary to run the school and this the gap between the tax proceeds and state aid payments. The table shows that Manchester's operating fund reached \$9,000 in 1943. Up to this time, enrollment was high and therefore state aid payments were also high. At the same time, as up to 1943, the need for raising money to meet living costs was not so acute.

By 1944, the situation changed sharply. The Army draft reached down into high school and enrollment fell off. With it, state aid payments fell off. At the same time, it became apparent that teachers' salaries must be raised. Thus, in 1944, the school board proposed that the operating fund for about \$9000 be increased to \$10,000 more of the operating fund.

On the question of salaries, it was brought out that Manchester's are in line with other schools of this size according to L. C. Taylor of the state Department of Public Instruction, the average school salary in the state, this year is \$2,116. Average teacher salaries cannot be reduced. To maintain a staff in these days of war-plant competition for manpower, adequate salaries must be paid.

The question was raised whether the money could be raised by cutting the curriculum, and doing with one or two teachers less. The general opinion was that this is undesirable. Manchester's school at present is offering a good range of studies including home economics, agriculture, music, commercial and vocational subjects, but other courses could well be added, among them manual training. The opinion of the meeting was to maintain our staff and the quality of our school during the emergency.

In all likelihood, the condition will only last a year or two. The state has advised the school board that our state aid will be about \$4,000 greater next year. An adequate budget for 1945-46 shows that with a special levy of two mills, the school will operate next year without further reaching in to its operating fund. The board strongly recommends that the school district take action now to guarantee sufficient revenue for next year.

Two proposals will be offered at the meeting of electors Monday evening, March 26, at the high school. The first will ask that the school district take action now to guarantee sufficient revenue for next year.

The second proposal will ask that three mills of the five be devoted to a sinking fund for the improvement of the building. Only taxpayers can vote on this. (The above article is the second to be presented by the school board and next week will discuss the needs of the school building.)

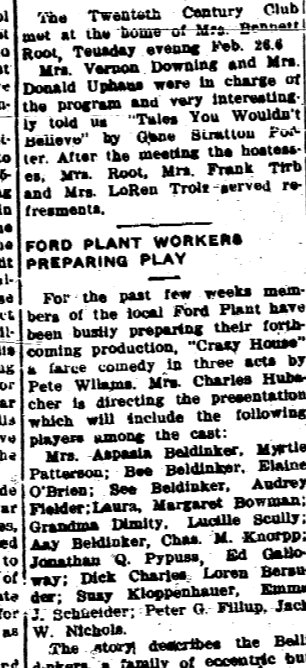

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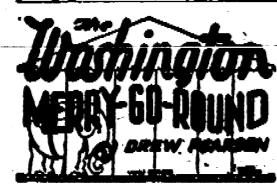

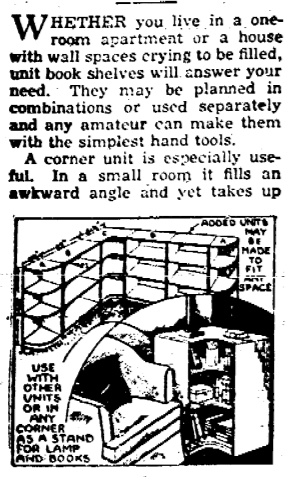

In most cases these same ships couldn't be got off the ground when the Japs came over, sometimes they were caught three or four times by Zeros, and consequently they were in a continual state of repair.

One of these was old Number 104, the ship that Ajax had been flying. The ground crew had worked on it for days, but whenever they'd have it just about ready to be taken back to the factory in Kunming for overhaul, the Japs would catch it again. Finally one morning Ajax must have said, "The hell with it." For when the "Jib-bao" came he went and got into the cockpit, fighter to take off before the Japs could get there to strafe it again. He told me later that he was tired of seeing it sitting on the ground as a target, whether it would fly or not, he was going to get it flying as fast as it would go and at least make it harder to hit than it had been in the rearmost. Well, Ajax did better than any I've ever got off. But the story of it all resumed me later on.

I was on the ground that day, and didn't see it. But I heard Ajax talking on the radio, and I heard his six guns when he caught one of the Zeros. Just a little later I saw the trail of black smoke that marked the enemy ship going down. I was glad to hear Ajax talking that morning for a minute I'd thought that miracle might be flying, going down in that luckless Number 104. All the time he'd been flying the ship he'd been having to pump the landing gear manually, for the hydraulic system had been shot up by the Jap strafers days before. Added to this, an exertion which is no pleasant task in fighting altitude, was a more painful experience.
