CONSOLIDATED SCHOOL EASIER IN MICHIGAN

The "little red school house" traditional recipient of rural school funds and a target for modern educators, is rapidly becoming one of the Michigan casualties of World War II.

The reason is economic. Teachers are being lured to other occupations—more compensation is more attractive.

"The shortage of teachers in Michigan this year is estimated to be 2,500," said Dr. Eugene B. Elliott, state superintendent of public instruction. "Next year it will increase, we estimate, to around 4,000. The average salary of a teacher in Michigan is \$1,614 a year. This means that many teachers receive less than the minimum wage."

"Approximately 100 communities in Michigan are now reorganizing their school districts. Parents are demanding better programs for their children, and on the larger schools can afford such courses as music, art, domestic science, and manual training, and can pay salaries adequate for skilled teachers."

The hope of representative legislators is that the bill, if passed by the legislature, would require voluntary consolidation and would not compel a school consolidation where taxpayers did not want it.

"We do not advocate the closing of Michigan's 4,000-plus school districts," he added. "Consolidation is not practical in all cases, and it should be effected only where benefits can be realized by the taxpayers in behalf of their children. It is not to be done unless the consolidation school, even if abandoned, may continue to serve as a rural country center to meet the social needs of the rural community."

Madison township, which has replaced the horse and buggy in rural school districts in one of the economic districts which has favored consolidation of school districts.

MANCHESTER SOLDIER RECENTLY PROMOTED

Corporal Clarence E. Pius with the 82nd Airborne Division on the Western Front, whose wife, Mrs. Edna (Ottie) Pius, lives in Indianapolis, Indiana, has been promoted to Corporal from rank of Private First Class.

WHAT GOVERNMENT IS DOING TO HELP US AS TAXPAYERS

WHEN WE, AS A PEOPLE, had set up all the bills for World War I that we had a national indebtedness of just 20 billion dollars. In 1921 we began cutting that down, and continued to do so even after the enactment of a reduced tax rate in 1922. By 1931 that debt had been reduced to about 17 billion.

For the past 14 years, including the last year of the Hoover administration, we have had deficit government financing, spending more than we received. By 1940 that national indebtedness had again increased to nearly 30 billion dollars, and then a year later came the war.

With the opening of World War II congress began increasing the federal tax burden. The amount collected each year has jumped from some 2 billions up to more than 40 billions of dollars but the extra taxes, heavy as they seem, have paid only about 61 per cent of the war cost.

The civilian activities of the federal government have continued to cost more each year than the present taxes will pay. Without the war costs, and with only present taxes with which to pay, our national debt would now be well over 60 billion dollars.

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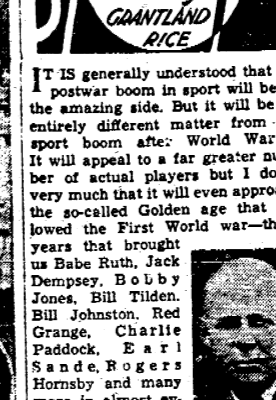
