



Through warfare in the past 50 years, Japan has grabbed land, totaling 2,796,600 square miles in area, with a population of 368,212,000, that belonged to eight countries: China, Britain, France, Thailand, Russia, Portugal, the Netherlands and the United States, our territory being Guam, Wake and the Philippines, according to Collier's.

Including its own people, Japan therefore controlled, one year ago, 21 per cent of the population of the world.

In World War I our currency attained a high point, in 1918, of less than 7 billion dollars. Today it stands at over 25 billion, and is steadily and rapidly increasing. In 1918 there was sufficient money in circulation to provide each of 130 million people with a bit under \$50. Today if all our currency, and currency does not mean wealth, was divided equally between 130 million people each would have \$192. Such a difference would not seem to be dangerous, but practical economists realize it is very dangerous. It is a danger that is growing at the rate of about

is growing at the rate of about one-half billion a month. It is largely a result of the purchase of government war bonds by the banks. If the people would buy bonds out of their newlyter and because the banks. their savings, and keep the bonds the banks would not buy, and would not have the collateral against which to issue bank note currency. 




