There are few reporters. Little effort has been made to preserve authentic Mormon buildings. But to the traveler, St. James will be remembered as a sunny happy haven of the Irish—the Gallaghers, McCannas, Martins, and McDonoughs.

Fish is not rattoned and prices are soaring. The Irish on Beaver Island, always inclined to gaiety, are happier than usual. Maybe our gas-line newspaper friend, George Stephenson, is right. There is only one place like Beaver Island—at least in Michigan.

New Lima Developed
Forkhook 342, a new bush lima, has been developed by researchers of the U. S. department of agriculture, and it is expected to aid in production of limes during 1948.

Last year, for all locations, the average for Forkhook 342 was 8,037 pounds per acre, a 37 per cent increase over the regular Fordhook yield of 5,822 pounds and 98 per cent more than concentrated Fordhook's 8,398 pounds. It has been selected for six years.

land from Canada. A sea-faring people, we have always gone to the sea, either to fish or to sail. Sure, some of the Irish do farming, but not many of them. It's easier to make a living on boats than farming—one reason why you see so many deserted farms on Beaver Island.

St. James with its lay atmosphere was named by King Strang. When John H. Fortner, a federal surveyor, visited the Beaver in 1838—just 90 years ago—King Strang was at the height of his bizarre career. Along the glaucous harbor was a cluster of log buildings. A log tabernacle dominated the landscape.

Strang, lawyer, editor, visited the Mormon settlement at Nauvoo, Illinois, in 1844 and became a convert. When Joseph Smith, Moses of the Mormons, was killed by a mob at Carthage—a chapter of early American intolerance—Strang claimed title as Smith's successor. The Mormon "college of twelve" elected Brigham Young who then led the historic trek to Salt Lake City. Strang established a rival kingdom, first at Spring Prairie, Wisconsin, then later at St. James on Beaver Island.

His defiance of conventional morality led to his undoing and ultimately his death. The Irish on Mackinac Island and Pine River (Charlevoix) regarded him as an infidel and a pirate. Two Irish Mormon followers, some of whom were characterized by surveyor Fortner as the "lowest kind of white trash—ignorant, superstitious and homicidal," were the assassins who waylaid King Strang and escaped on a U. S. Mail boat to Mackinac Island.

Today 12 miles off the prosperous Traverse City-Petoskey tourist route, Beaver Island is a haven of peace to its 250 white and 125 Indian inhabitants.

White Ash.
The white ash is not only America's leading hardwood but its most important ash. It grows from New Scotia westward to Minnesota and southward almost to the Gulf of Mexico. It is a stately tree 75 to 125 feet high.

The wood of the white ash is heavy, hard, strong and stiff, seasons well, takes a good polish and is free from taste or odor. Its principal uses are for handles, cooperage, furniture, motor vehicle parts, sporting and athletic goods, as well as railroad ties, veneer and staves.

1. Ample digestive capacity, which means good length, width and depth of body.
2. A good constitution as shown by great chest capacity.
3. A large udder of soft quality.

Man and Animal Depends Upon Fertility of Soil

Hope for better health for Americans in the postwar period lies in fuller conservation of our soil resources, according to Dr. William A. Albrecht of the University of Missouri.

"It is the fertility of soils that has contributed to our prosperity as we followed through our subscription to the advice of Horace Greely," he said. "It is the fertility equivalent in prairie soils in the different parts of the world as a whole that has determined the places where human population centers of great densities have established themselves.

4. The rump should be long, wide and level and the hip bones should be wide apart.

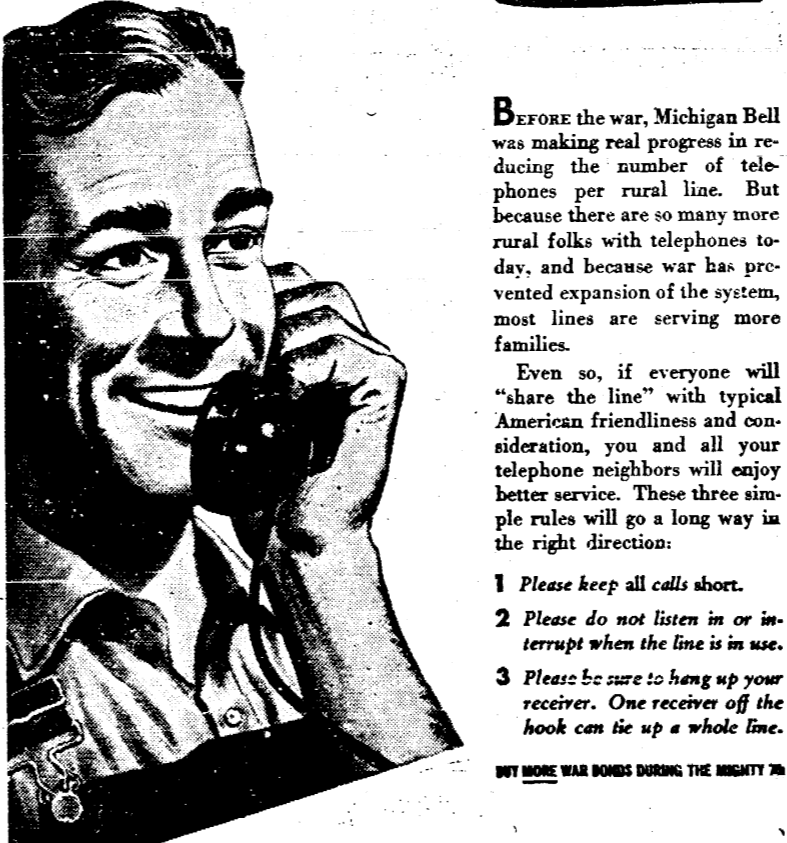
