## LOCAL GOVERNMENTS AND STATE INSTITUTIONS COMPETE FOR STATE FUNDS

Who's going to get some badly needed pairs of shoes in the tax payers' family—the state's own children, the educational institutions and mental and tubercular hospitals of the local governments' children, each of the municipalities, townships and villages?

That is the issue at Lansing where the state legislature is now in special session.

All state is an estimated billion surplus by June 30, 1947—one year next June 30—of \$27,800,000.

Let's take a look or two at what it is all about.

It is the recommendation of Governor Harry F. Kelly, supported by leading committees of the state legislature and the state officials, that the bulk of this surplus should go to meet the long neglected needs of the state's own responsibilities.

These include the University colleges, as well as other institutions throughout the state. No state appropriation has been made since 1927 for an educational fund at the University; 61 per cent of the university's present building facilities were financed by private donors or through self-liquidating student dormitories.

The plight of Michigan state colleges is equally as great.

Mental and tubercular hospitals are unable to admit patients because of limited building facilities. From 1930 to 1945 the mental hospital population increased from approximately 15,000 to more than 25,000 for an average gain of 750 persons a year.

Who benefits from state hospital funds, anyway?

A checkup of the hospital patients as of Dec. 1945, reveals that Wayne county (Detroit) benefits to the extent of more than 40 per cent of the total—10,289 out of 25,310. Kent county (Grand Rapids) had 1,180 citizens in hospitals; Oakland (Pontiac), 865; Genesee (Flint), 863; Ingham (Lansing) 577, and so on.

Who benefits most from the educational services of state colleges and schools?

The facts are equally revealing and again it is the metropolitan areas which derive the greatest benefit by number of students at state supported colleges. Enrollment at the schools totals 21,287, and more than half of these come from cities of 10,000 population and over.

This it appears logical—and the logic has received support from the American Legion, Veterans of Foreign Wars, Michigan Farm Bureau, Michigan State Grange, American Federation of Labor just to mention a few—that Governor Kelly's case for giving priority to the state's own "children" is founded on the fact that the entire state cities as well as well as rural areas will benefit from the 1946 state building program now before the legislature.

Certainly the cities will get their fair share. Mayor Edward P. Jeffries of Detroit notwithstanding, the suburban areas of these "children" possess the power to levy taxes. And the local governments—cities, townships and villages—do have the right, A. V. Phillips, executive secretary of the Michigan Educational Association, has conceded that many school districts are in a position to pay for the problem of school lunches must come from local governments through raising their valuations or increasing their millage of local taxes.

The school's plight, admittedly, is a by-product in part of the state's sales tax and limited portion of the state property tax.

Local governments look to Lansing University for a solution of their financial problems. The state's own "children"—colleges, hospitals and cities—have been crowded out for years in the pressure group scramble of local governments to get more money at Lansing.

It is the conviction of Governor Kelly, whose concern in meeting the state's needs has elevated him in the esteem of many people, that if the state can't or doesn't look out for the interests of its own "children," when times are good and when times are bad, and when there is money available, in the treasury, then it never will do so when conditions are unfavorable.

Building contractors and representatives of organized labor have expressed their opinion that the state building program can be completed by September 1947, and that adequate materials and labor can be obtained.

**QUALIFICATIONS FOR LEGION AUXILIARY MEMBERS**  
Scores of women in March have recently become eligible to membership in the American Legion Auxiliary and many more will become eligible as soon as the veterans in their families join the American Legion.

1. Mothers, wives, sisters and daughters of members of the American Legion.  
2. Mothers, wives, sisters and daughters of persons who lost their lives in either World War I or World War II.

3. Mothers, wives, sisters and daughters of veterans of similar war who have died since honorable discharge from war service.  
4. Women who themselves were also enrolled in the armed forces in either war.

Women of families with men still in the service are eligible if the service man has joined the American Legion. All members of the armed forces became eligible to the Legion upon the attainment of 16 years of age. Many have returned or their families have seen them a gift membership in advance of their return home. If the service man has not yet become a Legion member, the women of his family are not yet eligible to the Auxiliary.
