READY FOR SUMMER READING PROGRAM HERE

Reading is only a key, and a key however ornate it is, is useless unless we can use it to unlock something. The reading program at the Manchester Township Library offers every boy and girl in Manchester and the surrounding countryside the key to Summer Adventure. Many new books have been added to the shelves for the program. Parents are urged to come with children who are making their first visit to the library so that the following rules are understood:

PROGRAM DATES—June 1 to September 1 and all note books turned in at the library by September 15.

Enroll at once (May 25 to June 15) and get "Books I Have Read" note books at the library.

AGE GROUPS—Books for the Reading Program are divided and shelved at the library according to approved reading lists for age groups as follows:

1. Five through eight year olds
2. Nine through twelve year olds
3. Teen age boys and girls

MINIMUM REQUIREMENTS FOR CERTIFICATES—Certificates or stars on former certificates will be awarded to all who participate in the Reading Program if they meet the following requirements:

1. Five through eight year olds shall read 5 books from the approved list and keep note books (five and six year olds may need adult help with their note books)
2. Nine through twelve year olds shall read 6 books from the approved list and keep note books
3. Teen age boys and girls shall read six books from the approved list and keep note books
4. Boys and girls from all groups may make original drawings (not tracings or copies of drawings already in the book) for one or more books in addition to keeping a complete note book. Drawings will be exhibited separately and will have no connection with the listing of the note books.

Credit shall be given for books read from the individual approved list (see Age Group paragraph) or the next order approved list. Books or credit other than those obtained from the library should be checked by the librarian for an approved stamp or the decision of the judges shall be final in such cases.

PRIZES—Certificates or stars on former certificates will be awarded to all who meet the requirements of their age group and turn their note books in by September 15. (Note books will be returned to owners after they are judged.)

Prizes will be awarded in each age group for the best note books. Note books will be judged on the quantity and quality of reading done as well as the care and thought given in keeping the note books. The decision of the judges shall be final.

Drawings shall be exhibited at the library.

A party date to be announced later will be given for all the boys and girls participating in the Reading Program if they turn in their note books for judging.

When getting books at the library the following library hours should be strictly observed:

- Monday 1 to 5 p. m.
- Wednesday 10 to 11 a. m. 1 to 5 p. m.
- Friday 1 to 5 p. m.
- Saturday 10 to 11 a. m. 1 to 5 p. m. 7 to 10 p. m.

Also be sure that the library rules which may be found on the bulletin board at all times are read and understood.

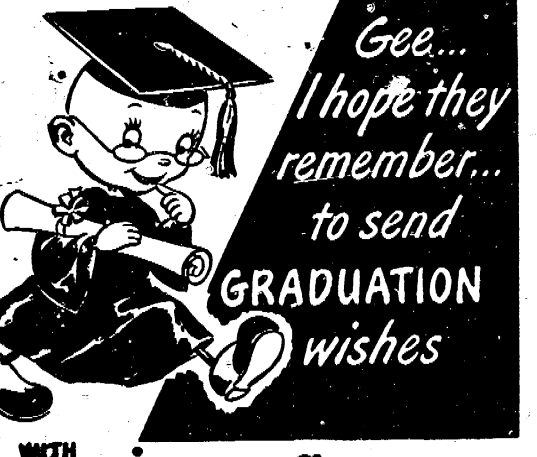

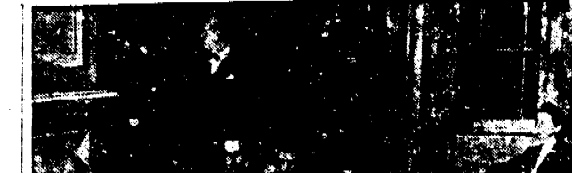
