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## GAS - WEIGHT TAX DOESN'T KEEP ROADS

The average citizen who reads the papers, thinks that all money for roads comes from the Gas and Weight taxes. Practically, it is not entirely true, which fact was brought to light in checking up on some of the counties. This checkup was brought about by a recent article in "Highways and Byways" indicating that no outside funds, that is, outside of Weight and Gas Taxes, was raised as it used to be. If the total thus raised was added up and definitely known, it might not be so great, but it does indicate a desire on the part of some county citizens to speed up their road programs, beyond the possibility of present revenues that the road commissions receive.

The amount raised by popular subscription varies from county to county and for different purposes. The method of raising the money differs also, and in some cases, the money is raised with the understanding that the road commission will provide some portion of matching funds and in other cases, it is specifically earmarked for a definite purpose. It will be "Prayer for the Preservation of the Church."

**LIBRARY RECEIVES STATE AID FUND**  
The Manchester Township Library has received \$108.41 as the first payment from the Library State Aid Fund this year. The money is distributed on a population basis for the area served by the library. The per capita rate for 1945 this year, a slightly larger amount than heretofore, due to a larger grant by the legislature.

This gift from the state has been added to the book budget and will be used to buy new books for the summer and fall seasons.

**VETERAN TRAINING IN AGRICULTURE**  
Training and education is possible for veterans interested in the field of Agriculture. The Washtenaw County U. S. D. A. Council, an organization composed of state and federal agricultural agencies of this county, has studied the problem of veteran training. As a result the members of this council are ready and anxious to help.

The first step for a veteran who wishes to become eligible is to contact the superintendent of schools or the vocational agricultural instructor in his local school. The superintendent will explain the program and assist in making application for the training. The greatest portion of the instruction will be done on the farm in what is called "On the Job Training."

The training will be of no cost to the veteran. It is possible for veterans to receive payment for subsistence while in this agricultural apprenticeship. By their own persistence, he can earn a good reasonable living wage and at the same time increase his farming power.

In another county, Ontario, in the heart of the deep snow and plenty of it, there is another problem that has been recognized. When the Ontario County Road Commission spending approximately 90% of their total revenue on snow and ice control, these money is left for normal construction and maintenance. As one way of helping to offset this deficit expense, the townships have been raising about 3 mills annually for snow and ice control. They do not wish to raise more in the winter and want their roads plowed out. The economy of the county is based on farm and commercial car and truck transport. Without proper snow removal and ice control, this economy is threatened. With out this outside help from the township, this county would be in a very serious condition for finances to handle summer maintenance.

The idea of this article is to show that some help can be obtained if the county citizens appreciate the financial condition of their road commission. Speak up from a state-wide standpoint, so thinking person expects any road commission to provide for demands beyond their power to finance. In 1935, \$28,000,000.00 was spent on the county road system all over. The greatest return for the road commission have had to operate with since that time, was in 1944 when a total of \$28,000,000.00 was received. Last year the revenue returned from gas and weight taxes to the road commission was approximately \$12,500,000.00. Everyone knows that labor and material costs have

## NO SIGNS ON HIGHWAYS

Candidates for public offices in the county and state appear to be among the most flagrant violators of Michigan law which prohibits the posting of advertising signs and devices within the limits of highway according to Kenneth Hallenbeck, county road commission superintendent and manager.

Such signs not only deface roadsides trees and fences but distract the attention of drivers and cause the public to lose the proper respect for official warning and instructional signs which are placed at considerable expense and only after investigation shows the need for such signs.

Hallenbeck stated that Michigan statutes prohibit placement of any signs along road right-of-way except those advertising a place of business on directly adjacent property. Property owners who such signs must first obtain permission from the proper highway authority to post them.

All highway employees have received orders to remove any advertising found on the highway including commercial and the more unethical political variety.

**NEW NATIONAL ANTHEM**  
WASHINGTON—Joseph P. McCarney, who is doing a better job as commander of occupied Germany than most people think, likes to sing. And when he comes up to Berlin for his regular visits with the other Allied commanders, he always engages in a song fest with the Russians.

As a result, the Russians have adopted a new song which they usually regard as the American national anthem. They sing on any and all occasions. They think it brings pride and pleasure to the hearts of Americans and the Red Army in Berlin, at least, is anxious to please Americans.

Usually, the song may bring pleasure to the hearts of Americans, but other American citizens are getting a bit weary of it. The Russians have learned the English words, and to the tune of "The Stars and Stripes Forever," here is what they sing as the new American national anthem.

"Three cheers for the Old Glory, Junior high school, The best Junior High School." The fact that they have learned the words illustrates a point which is very important. It shows that they don't always realize—namely, despite our difficulties with the Soviet Government, we have no quarrel with the Russian people. Not much has been said about it, but relations between the American and Soviet armies in Berlin have been extraordinarily good. At present, the Russian war was suspicious, didn't want any fraternization of their troops with ours. But that suspicion has largely disappeared. The Red army is a large, unwieldy, badly disciplined, very human cross section of the Russian people, and that part of the Red army which is in Berlin looks like a Russian.

**FRUSSIAN JEWRY**  
Robert Murphy, political adviser to General McNarney in Berlin, has recently sent a letter complaining that the state department because the Russians have redistributed the estates of the Prussian Junkers in the Soviet zone of Germany. The Russians have broken up some 175,000 large estates among about 775,000 peasants. Despite the fact that the Potsdam agreement specifically called for breaking up large estates, Murphy has warned Washington that this land reform in the Russian zone is endangering the western zone of democracy in East Germany.

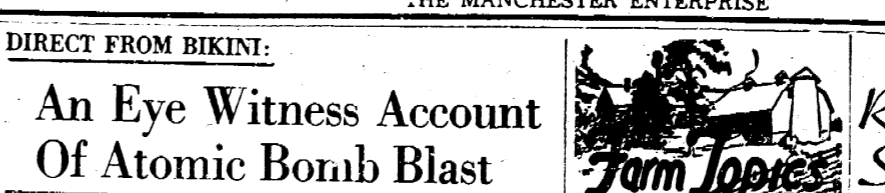

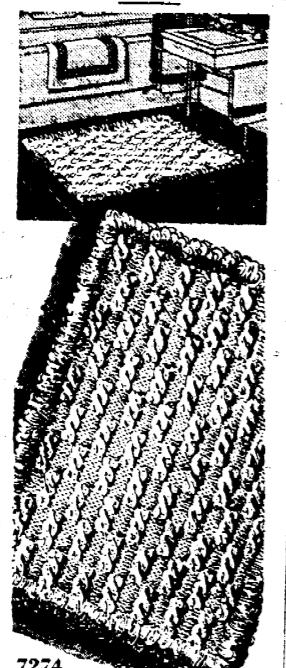
