New Bomber Greatest Yet

Giant Flying Wing With No Fuselage Dwarfs B-29; 10,000 Miles Nonstop.

LOS ANGELES — Official secrecy from its flying wing bomber, the XB-35, a radical design has been removed by the Army Air Corps, says the Associated Press. The plane dwarfs the B-29 and has an announced range of more than 10,000 miles — about one-fourth greater than the world's distance record.

The bomber was designed and built by Northrop Aircraft, Inc., at Hawthorne, Calif. It is expected to fly in a short time. The XB-35 is shaped like a colossal boomerang. It has no fuselage, no wings, no engine nacelles. Crew, engine, fuel and armament are housed inside the wing. Crew quarters are in the rear.

The plane spans 172 feet and has a center width of 37 feet, 6 inches. From the center the tapered wings sharply to end widths of 9 feet, 4 inches. Although its normal gross load is 160,000 pounds, it is designed to fly with an overload up to 200,000 pounds. The empty weight is 89,000 pounds, and the useful load—available for bombs and bombs—comes from 73,000 pounds at normal gross load, 100,000 pounds at overload.

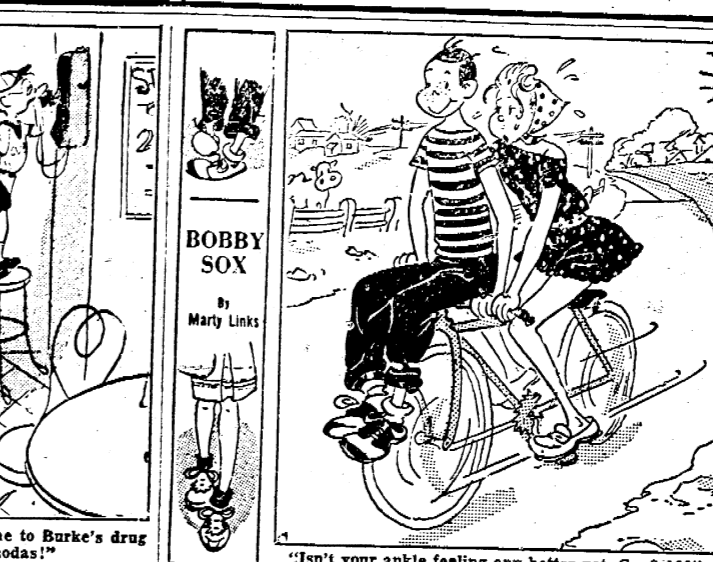

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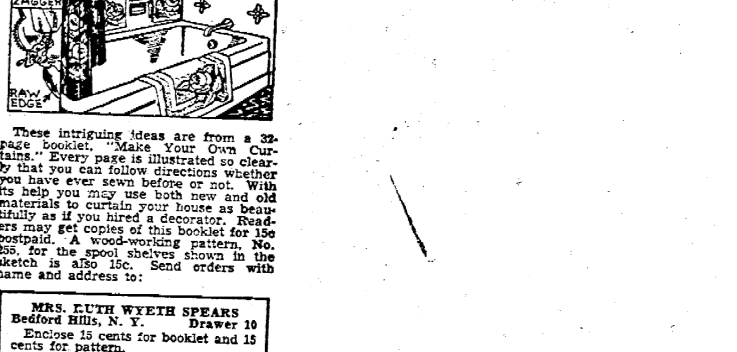

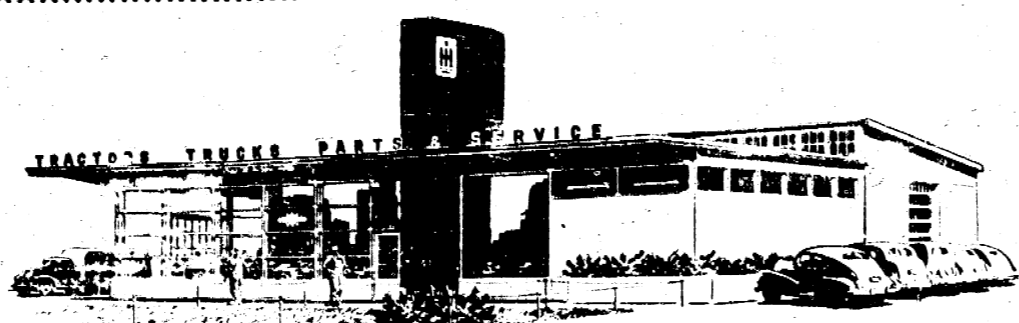
The Association's growth has likewise been paralleled by constantly increasing safeguards for the protection of the public health.

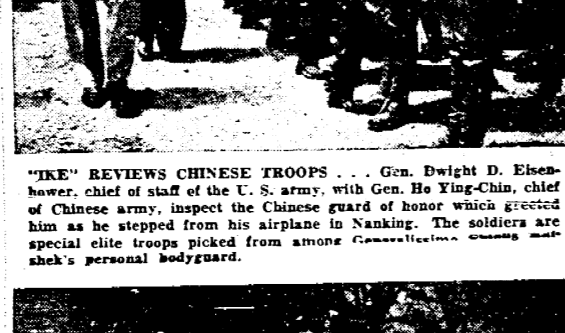

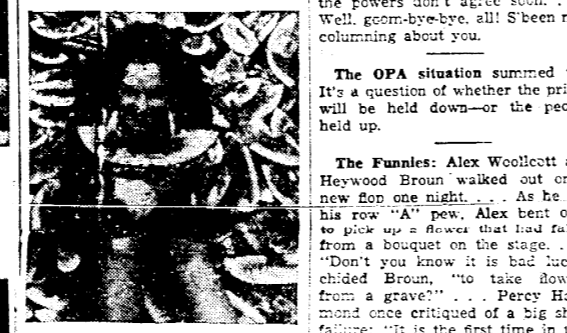

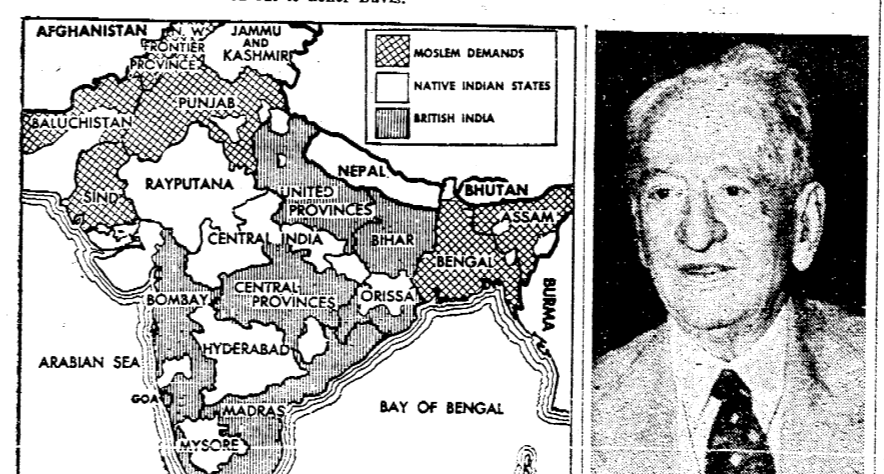
