FEATURED IN CAPPERS' FARMER

Warren Finkbeiner, of Bridge-water, is featured in an article in the July issue of Cappers Farmer, entitled "Breeder From 4-H Start." "A start with a Berkshire gilt as his 4-H project made a purchased breeder of Warren Finkbeiner," the story the nationally circulated farm magazine points out. "Now he carries an average of 12 brood sows, and produces hogs of good enough quality that 75 per cent are sold as breeding stock. The best sow he has owned produced 13 litters. His success with hogs encouraged him to start a purchased herd of Red Polled cattle. He has a demand for more heifers than he can produce from a herd geared to the size of the farm on which they are raised."

In fact, the people of the state in the closing days of the campaign were treated to the unusual spectacle of high elective officials of the state doing a sort of "train seal act" in favor of one candidate.

Cook warned, however, that Sigler has a "finished job to do" to win the election, and will be fought by "many of the influential interests which opposed him in the primary."

Frank Morris, political writer of the Detroit Times, believed that Sigler received votes of many Democrats. To quote: "Having no close fight in their own ranks, a large percentage of Democrats obviously gave their support to Sigler because of his former allegiance to the Democratic party and because of his popular appeal for 'clean and honest state government.'" Morris said that Murray D. VanWagoner, the Democratic nominee, "hopes the rancor in the administration machine will split the Republican vote in November and make it possible to break the 30-year rule that no Democrat can be elected in an off-year." Another quotation: "Sigler is no friend of General Delmers and is expected to do Delmers' political head. It is likely, too, that he will down the candidacy of Secretary of State Herman Dignan who wants another term."

"Perhaps he may demand a complete new slate of Republican candidates. And usually the candidate for governor gets what he wants from a Republican convention."

The Detroit Free Press, which received a Pulitzer award for its Lansing grand jury crusade, has called the ballot results as satisfactory evidence that many voters demanded a "house-cleaning" at Lansing.

To quote: "The real issue was over Sigler as the symbol of clean government." Sigler made articulate the yearning for a cleansing of the whole State."

Hub M. George, Free Press political writer, said the Sigler victory "brought bloom to the Capitol" for it forewarned of the approaching shadow of a "house-cleaning." George said: (Continued on Page 3)

Not to be overlooked is the return of Dr. Eugene C. Keyes to the state political picture. Keyes resembles Sigler in many ways. He is an idealist, a crusader, a reformer. He declined to play along with Governor Kelly in the first term when Kelly sought to make the highway commissioner an appointive office. Keyes' forthright stand caught the public fancy and the governor went down in defeat on this legislative issue.

This column recently said that Keyes was spending \$20,000 in the 1936 primary. The actual figure was less—approximately \$18,000, all paid by Keyes from his own pocket.

Governor Kelly never took Keyes into his counsels during a legislative session. Thus indirectly, snubbed by the governor, Keyes takes particular delight in the ballot tornado of June 15.

Richard Cook, editor of the Hastings Beacon, which championed the Sigler cause, saw in the returns that the average voter is pretty much of an independent, and hence resents what appears to be a machine attempt to put over one of its own members.

To quote: "The regular Republican party machine did everything possible to defeat Mr. Sigler."

FISHING SEASON OPENED TUESDAY

Tuesday, June 23, was the first real day of summer for many thousands in Michigan who were opening of the bass and bluegill season above astronomer's calculations that six summer months are beginning officially on June 21.

Tuesday all waters in the state were opened and all species of game fish may be taken. This season the fisherman may have the bass and bluegill as well as trout with something tasty to grace a meaty table.

Except on a dozen or so expertly managed waters where local rules are more liberal than the general regulations, there have been no changes since a year ago in size and creel limits, according to the state department of conservation.

On inland lakes these limits still stand at five black bass over 10 inches long; five northern or walleyed pike over 14 inches long; 25 perch, crappies and rock bass over six inches long, with not more than 12 bluegills in the total; and 10 white bass seven inches long.

Fisherman worries this season, insofar as subsistence laws are concerned, are not about the supply of fish but of such specialties as those fishing tackle, tackle accessories and, in some localities, boats and bait.

WINDOW SILLS OPEN THIRSTY

Badly weather-beaten window sills offer quite a problem to the homemaker. The weather has taken off all of the finish and the pores of the wood have become enlarged. Frances E. Wilson, county home demonstration agent calls this "chippy wood" and says the thing needed is a "drink of oil."

For women who are doing some spring refinishing and come into difficulties like this, she has a suggestion. First sand off the old varnish and give the wood a good drink of penetrating seal. Rub in plenty, until the surface stays moist.

After the seal is thoroughly dry, put on the varnish. Of course, Miss Wilson adds, she is presuming that the rest of the window frame has already been varnished. If you cannot find any penetrating seal for the window sills, make a mixture of one-half linseed oil and one-half turpentine. Rub this into the bare, chippy wood, then let it dry and finish to match the rest of the workwork.

SORRY—NO GAS THIS YEAR

Natural gas service in Manchester will be instituted as soon as materials are available for the construction of the necessary pipelines, mains and service lines.

Shortages of materials will make it impossible to bring natural gas to Manchester this year, but we are hopeful that the work can be undertaken in 1947.

We had hoped to do the job this year, but materials are much tighter than we had expected them to be.

Consumers Power Company has just signed a contract with the Panhandle Eastern Pipe Line Company which assures a plentiful supply of natural gas to all communities served by Consumers Power Company. This includes 240 communities in 23 counties. Among the larger cities are Flint, Saginaw, Kalamazoo, Bay City, Pontiac, Midland, Royal Oak, Mt. Clemens, Jackson, Marshall, Ferndale, Ionia, Lansing and Owosso.

The agreement provides for conversion of the Winterfield and Cranberry Lake natural gas fields in Clare, Missaukee and Osceola counties into one of the world's largest natural gas storage areas, where natural gas transported 1,500 miles from Texas and Oklahoma during the warmer months will be stored for use in helping to meet the peak demands of winter.

A 150-mile pipeline 24 inches in diameter, will be built from a junction with Panhandle's pipeline five miles southeast of Chelsea to the storage fields. Construction of this pipeline, originally scheduled for this year, has been deferred until 1947 by the shortage of materials.

The storage project will offset the declining production of Michigan gas fields and give Consumers plenty of gas with which to meet the growing needs of Michigan users, including prospective customers in Manchester for at least a quarter of a century.
