Section 3. The license fee shall be the sum of \$10.00 per annum per vehicle. All licenses issued shall expire one year from the date of issue.

Section 4. Any taxicab license issued under the terms of this ordinance may be revoked by the Village Council after giving notice and opportunity to be heard to the licensee.

Section 5. The licensee shall not charge any passenger a sum in excess of the rate schedule so fixed and adopted by the Council.

Kudzu Saves Soil And Provides Feed Increasing Use Seen On American Farms

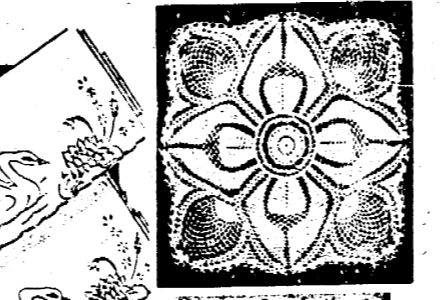
Ernest Galter, once the bubble of farming, are becoming rapidly to a versatile, luscious vine known as kudzu.

In addition to growing vigorously, with proper management, under many unfavorable soil and moisture conditions, kudzu has the advantage of permanency. The crocus or root system will remain over a long period of years without replanting, if the vines are not exterminated.

When introduced to the soil it has a feeding value as high as that of alfalfa, and also provides a nutritious forage for livestock. It is especially recommended for ruminants or other sites that are too badly drained to be used for cultivated crops. It is equally important on more level acreage where it can be cut for hay as well as serving to conserve the soil.

From Dadeville, Ala., comes the report of an increase of 25 bushels per acre for corn that followed the plowing under of 40 bushels of kudzu in an acre. More corn yields in that section averaged 15 bushels.
