TWO FIRES CAUSE LARGE LOSSES

Fire, evidently caused by spontaneous combustion, destroyed a 240000 barn on the Charles Carlton farm on VanTuyke road, three miles northwest of Clinton, last Friday night, just two days after the modern building had been completed.

Among the contents destroyed were approximately \$10,000 worth of farm equipment and 250 tons of hay, 1800 bushels of oats, a large quantity of wheat, a calf, cow and hog and a separator. The modern tile silo near the barn was considerably damaged but still standing.

The barn, completed only Tuesday was burned to the ground before the Clinton fire department could bring the blaze under control. The fire was discovered at 8:15 p. m. in the upper part of the barn by Tom Carlton, son of the owner, and it was 12:15 a. m. before the fire was extinguished.

The barn was considered to be one of the finest in the county and was constructed of hollow tile and had accommodations for 40 head of cattle.

On Friday night fire destroyed the home of John Kennedy on the town line road two miles northwest of Clinton. The Kennedy's were away from home when the fire was noticed about nine o'clock in the evening. Neighbors saw smoke pouring from the house and summoned the Clinton fire department, but they arrived too late to save the building, but succeeded in saving some of the furniture. The firemen were engaged in rescuing the scene of the fire by a traffic jam which choked the narrow road near the scene of the blaze. It is indeed unfortunate that curious people can be so thoughtless at a time like this. No insurance was carried on the structure or contents.

This was the third blaze in two weeks in this immediate area and the sixth this summer and this fact led to considerable speculation that they might have been of incendiary origin.

The State Police from the Clinton post checked this angle but found no evidence to support such a theory. The Carlton fire evidently was caused by a spark of hot box from a separator which had been used that day on the barn floor and the fire at Kennedy home seemed to have been caused by defective wiring in or near a refrigerator.

MICHIGAN PEACHES FOR EVERYBODY

The recent rains gave an additional boost to the peach crop in most of the peach growing areas of Michigan, and more than likely will help Michigan break all peach production records this season.

Charles E. Fry, Director of the State Department of Agriculture stated that according to the Federal-State Crop Reporting Service, Michigan's peach crop for 1946 exceeded this year. Their estimate as of August 1 shows 4,425,000 bushels. If this record production materializes, it will be 70 per cent over the 10-year average.

This year's crop will be of good quality. New methods have been developed which have aided materially in the control of brown rot of peaches, and the dry weather has helped control pests and diseases.

The early peaches are now being harvested. The harvest of the major portion of the crop in northwestern Michigan, usually starts this week, with the peak of the season around Labor Day.

Dr. Hans E. Reese, University of Wisconsin professor of neurology and Dr. John G. Frack, Madison dentist, found that decayed exposed nerves in teeth were one invasion route over which polio virus entered the bodies of children.

With their findings, they issued the urgent plea to parents, doctors and dentists: Have all cavities in children's teeth sealed off by dentists.—Pittsburgh Magazine.
