AMENDMENT NO. 2 STILL UNDER FIRE

The controversial sales tax revision amendment, sponsored originally by mayors of Michigan big cities and now supported by public school teachers, is due for a showdown in about 30 days.

On November 5 the registered citizens of Michigan—those who qualify by registration laws to cast a ballot—will make a fateful decision.

This column has presented both sides of the issue pertaining to a revision of one-third of the state sales tax revenue to local governments, plus freezing of state aid formula into the state constitution that would remove public school appropriations from the legislature.

It is becoming increasingly apparent that public school teachers are being underpaid and are in need of better salaries. Kim Sigler and Murray D. Van Wagener will not dispute this fact.

It is also becoming more and more apparent that something has got to give way if Michigan voters authorize a \$70,000,000 bonus for Michigan war veterans and also authorize a bumper state aid formula for schools and cities.

Both of these proposals will have to go into effect without badly disrupting state services, which for the most part involve people in home town communities. It has been a subject of considerable concern with administrative officials at Lansing.

Democratic nominees Van Wagener has referred recently to the likelihood of the two proposals being approved by the voters on November 5. This likelihood, he says, increases the need of Michigan having an experienced state administrator in the governor's chair who knows how to handle the new problem.

State Treasurer D. Hale Brako who is a nominee for the same office of the G. O. P. ticket, has sharpened his pencils recently and arrived at an estimate that \$35,000,000 extra state money would require additional expenditure from the state general fund of approximately \$17,000,000.

For many years to come, this amount, significantly enough, is a little more than the surplus account in the general fund during the 1945-46 fiscal year after all disbursements had been made.

Latest figures from the office of John D. Morrison, State Auditor General, indicate a year's surplus of approximately \$18,000,000. Had the veteran's bonus been in effect during the past year there would have been no surplus at all.

It is generally contended that the veteran's bonus (Ballot Proposal No. 8) has a much better chance of being approved by the voters than the state tax revision amendment (Ballot Proposal No. 2).

We have noted little of any aspect of the ballot proposal. We have noted considerable controversy—pro and con—about the proposed school aid and city extension to secure state money.

Therefore, when the latter issue is being considered, it is our feeling that the money will be approved. Naturally, we believe that such is the case.

After a trip through northern Michigan the couple will be at home at 1900 State Street, Ann Arbor.

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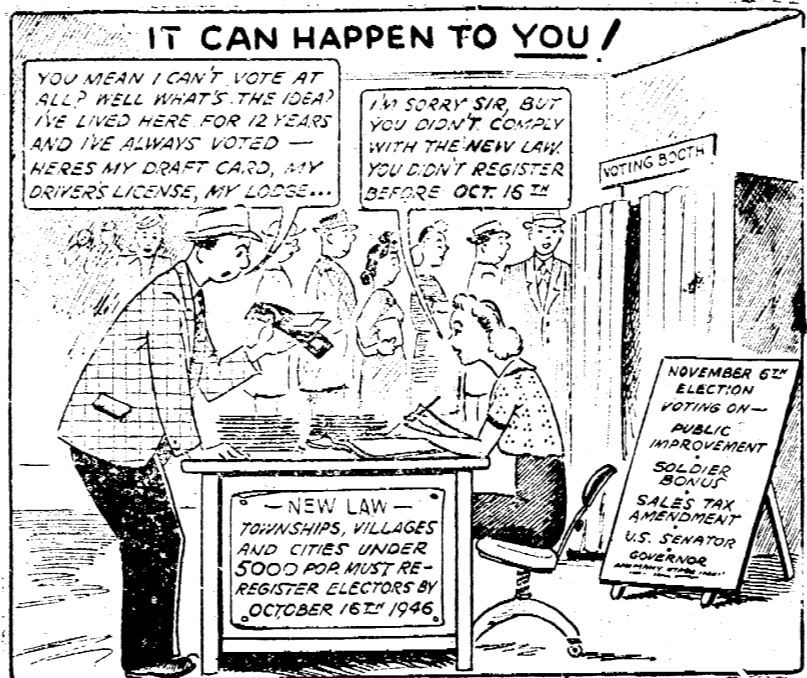
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MANCHESTER CHAPTER OES HAS HONOR NIGHT
