This is the first Farmers' Week in two years and added facilities and new developments in agriculture will make it one of the biggest in the 33 year history of the show. All departments of MSC's school of agriculture are joining to present programs that will cover Michigan's agricultural resources, including prominent state and national speakers, exhibits, demonstrations—these are only a few of the many features of the week.

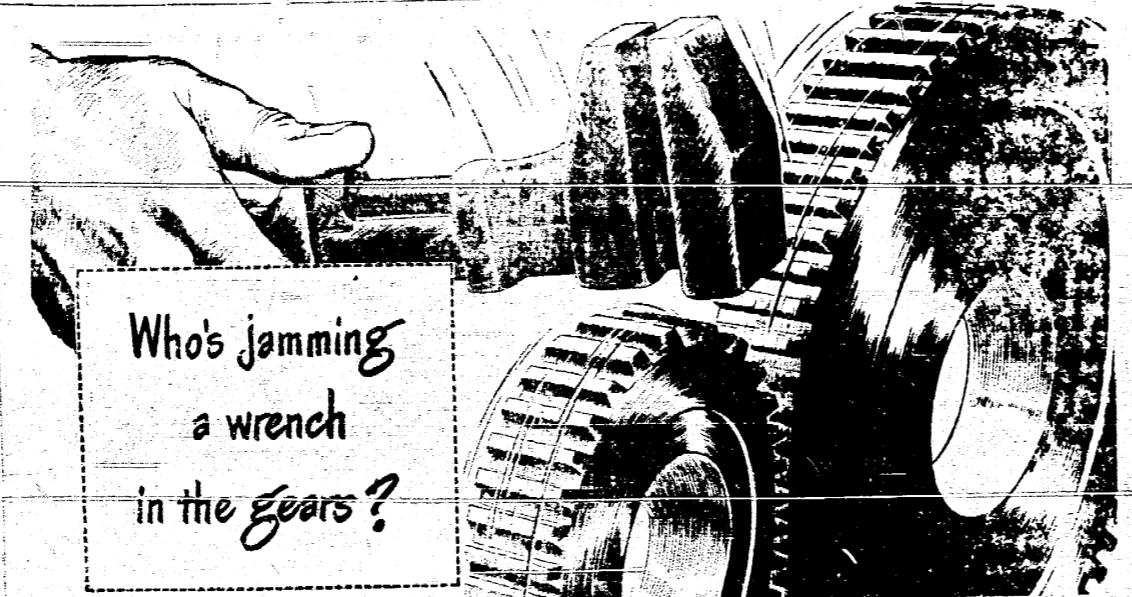

3 Unions Block Labor Peace—Refuse Wage Boost Already Accepted by 19 Other Railroad Unions!

The Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, Brotherhood of Firemen and Enginemen and the Switchmen's Union of North America, representing 12,000 railroad employees, have refused to accept the offer of the Railroad of a wage increase of 15% over an hour.

The same increase awarded 1,000,000 non-railroad employees by an agreement with the Railroad in 1947.

The same increase accepted by 1,170,000 employees, represented by nine unions, but these three unions refused a 20% wage increase, and are trying to get more. They are demanding also many new working rules and changes in the settlement with the conductors and trainmen.

Incidentally, the Switchmen's Union of North America represents only about 2% of all railroad employees, the other 98% being represented by the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen and covered by the settlement with that union.

Strike Threat

The leaders of these three unions spread a strike scare, which negotiations were still in progress. This is not a secret vote but is being spread by union leaders and votes are being taken by the employees in the presence of union representatives.

When direct negotiations failed, the leaders of these three unions refused to join the railroad in settling the National Mediation Board to attempt to settle the dispute, but the Board now jurisdiction of the three unions and has been established since November 24, 1947.

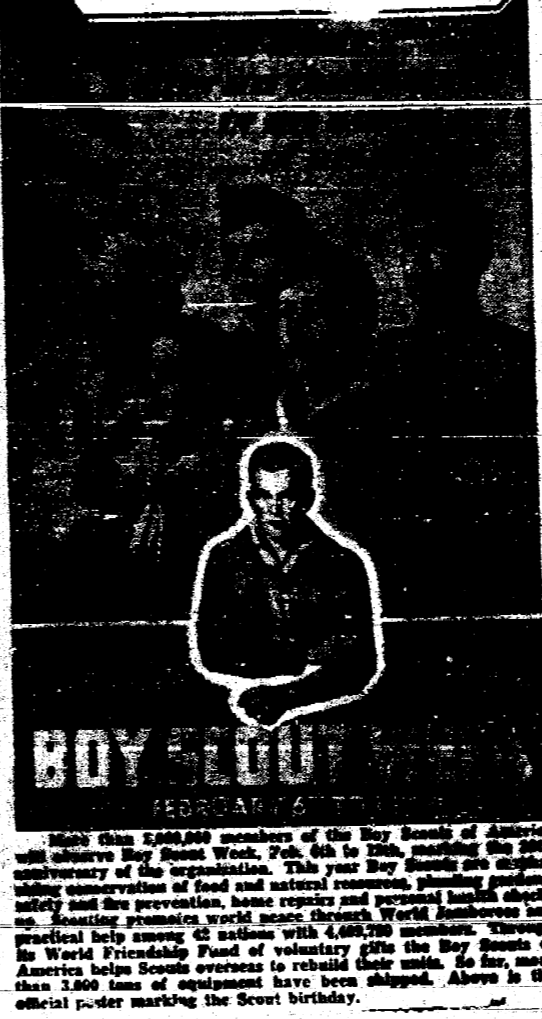
